The old Jenolan Caves Post Office is now standing again on its new site. The reconstruction was carried out by the Department of Public Works using a grant of money from the Department of Tourism. This building is the first stage of the Society's museum.

### DEVIL'S COACH HOUSE TO BE CLEANED

Many years agosa film company painted some of the walls of the Devil's Coach House. The paint, although fairly easy to remove, is still there. But it will not be there much longer if enough members turn up, equipped with scrubbing brush and bucket on Saturday 9 February ( the same day as the meeting). #### RECENT ACQUISITIONS

The society has received, from the family of the late James Cummings, a display case containing specimens of calcite and cave formations, collected in the days when such activities were condoned. James Cummings' grand-daughter, Mrs Janet Bryant, has supplied the following information.

James Cummings first went to Jenolan in the late 1880's when he was employed by the P.M.G. Department on the lighting of the Caves. On 26th September, 1893, in a ceremony conducted by the Rev'd William Dunslaw at Caves House, James married Margaretta Dorothy - a daughter of Jeremiah Wilson. Following their departure from Jenolan, they resided at Redfern. Since 1908, the specimen case has been on display in the house they built at Centennial Park -"Lucindaville".

#### NOVEMBER MEETING

The guest speaker at the November meeting was Mr Theo Barker, President of the Bathurst District Historical Society, who spoke on The Needs, Problems, and Capacities of Local Historical Societies in New South Wales.

Among other things Mr Barker remarked on the problems of getting into the museum business. Now that this Society has the nucleus of a museum we must consider these problems seriously. 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#### NEW POSTMARKER FOR JENOLAN CAVES

A new pictorial postmarker depicting cave formations, with a stylised Broken Column, came into use at Jenolan Caves Post Office on 1 April 1974.

The society has purchased a supply of covers bearing first day cancellations with the new postmarker and covers cancelled on the last day of use of the old postmarker. These are available for sale to members. Enquiries to Noel Rawlinson, c/- Guides' Office, Jenolan Caves.

The society tried to obtain the old postmarker for display in the Old Post Office Museum. For security reasons the Australian Post Office was unable to oblige. The old postmarker will, however, be kept in the APO's own collection.

### CLEANING OF DEVIL'S COACH HOUSE

On Saturday 9 February a team of volunteers attacked the paint on the Devil's Coach House with enthusiasm, detergent, scrubbing brushes and a hose. A good deal of energy was expended in scrubbing, using brushes insecurely tied to long handles. Then it was found that a spray of concentrated detergent, left for half an hour, loosened some paint which could then be hosed off.

Although a significant start has been made, there is still a lot to be removed and some of it will only be reached from a caving ladder. Another lesson learnt was that a notice explaining the action would be useful. Some of the bedraggled and grubby band spent a considerable time in explanations and public relations work.



#### RECENT COMMUNICATIONS

The May meeting heard two papers.

The prolific Ronald Newbould read a detailed account of the discovery of the, officially named, Barellan Cave. He pointed out that the discoverers of the cave called it Barralong. The meeting subsequently resolved to request that the official name should be changed to that given by the discoverers.

Mrs Pam Williams read a paper, prepared in 1954 but never delivered, by Ernest Mellor, who was at Jenolan in 1900, when he was 26. This entertaining paper was entitled The History, Mystery and Jenolan Romance. Mrs Williams has provided us with a copy of this paper which we hope to publish as an occasional paper.

#### DONATIONS

Recent donations to the society include a small organ and a collection box, presented by Mr Russell Perry of Lithgow. It is claimed that this organ is similar to one which used to be played in the Cathedral chamber of Lucas Cave - it may even be the same organ.

#### THE OLD POST OFFICE AGAIN-

The floor of the old Post Office has been coated with a hard varnish and electric lighting is soon to be installed. There is a new sign outside the building and a concrete path has been laid all around. The stone wall in front of the site is now about half finished while concrete steps up to the site have been completed. Workers on this project include the curators, John Culley and John Callaghan, and Ron Newbould - there are probably others who hide their lights.

The initial display, consisting largely of selected historical photographs and some relics is being organised by Warren Targett and the curators.

### OLD POST OFFICE RE-OPENED

On 10 August the old Jenolan Caves Post Office which, on its new site, forms the first stage of the society's proposed museum, was officially opened by Mr T.L. Lewis, Minister for Lands and Tourism. A plaque, set into a limestone boulder beside the building, commemorates the event.

Following the unveiling of the plaque the Minister unlocked the door of the old post office and the official party inspected the society's first permanent display. A sumptuous afternoon tea was served in Caves House before the official party left for an old time cave inspection, by candlelight.

The opening celebrations were a complete success, thanks to the many members who worked to bring it off. These include our patron, Ald. H.G.Coates, who presided over the ceremony, Warren Targett and David Rogers who organised the display, John Culley who arranged and led the old time cave inspection, Sandra Heaney (invitations and publicity), John Callaghan (plaque), Noel Rawlinson (souvenir envelopes) and many others. Ernie Holland and Ben Nurse organised everyone else. Thanks are also due to the Manager and staff of Caves House who assisted in many ways.

#### BARRALONG CAVE

At the May general meeting Ron Newbould read his diaries describing the discovery of the cave which he and his co-discoverers named Barralong. The cave was later named Barellan by the Department of Tourism. This meeting was probably the first time that many people had heard of the use of two different names. The meeting decided to ask the department to restore the original name and authorised our patron, Ald. H.G. Coates, M.L.A., to approach the Minister for Tourism.

Negotiations took some time, but Mr Coates persisted and we are now happy to report that the Minister has approved that the cave be known, in future, as the Barralong Cave.

The meaning of Barralong is the same as Barellan, namely meeting of the waters.

The annual general meeting of the society decided to publish Mr Newbould's Barralong diaries.

# SOME THOUGHTS ON MUSEUMS

Because of an interest in historical museums aroused by association with JCH&PS, the Secretary has been looking at historical and folk museums in various places.

No doubt the most successful museums are the well-funded reconstructions of houses to a particular period (e.g. Vaucluse House in Sydney or Entally House near Launceston or the collection at Hill End). This is beyond our resources.

One interesting historic house is in Kangaroo Valley; there the house has been faithfully reconstructed and some old farm equipment is displayed behind it. However, associated with it is a museum in which a multitude of unlabelled objects resides without any real attempt at sorting or dating.

By contrast, the museum in Burnie, Tasmania, is a re-creation of the life of the town in the last century with a reconstruction of shops and an inn. This is very well done; the museum behind has collections which are well sorted, dated and documented. The museum has sections devoted to themes (light, typewriters, heating, photography for example) of obvious interest to local schools as well as the general public. This sort of philosophy of a museum is perhaps most appropriate to Jenolan; to reconstruct a turn-of-the-century post office and use the museum to display thematic collections of specialist items.

The museum at Port Arthur also contains some lessons for Jenolan. One half contains fascinating and well-documented convict relics, including documents which suggest that during imprisonment, reading and writing as well as trades were taught to convicts. The other half of the museum contains a mass of bits and pieces, largely unlabelled and unrelated to convict days (e.g. shell collections and an oil painting of Napoleon).

My impression, from all this museum visiting, is that JCH&PS should aim, in its museum, at excellence in limited areas, and should be prepared to label, organise and annotate any material included in the museum. The post office building itself ought best to be re-created and furnished as a post office in about 1890.0 347

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#### MEN OF JENOLAN

At the November meeting Basil Ralston spoke on Men of . Jenolan, prepared from an unpublished book of his which he has deposited in the Mitchell Library. His account was absorbingly interesting and, after reading the preface, answered questions at length rather than present a completely prepared paper.

He commented on the lack of real history known in 1964 when he was working at Jenolan. J.J. Foster's book on Jenolan is accurate and excellent. Mr Ralston; using this book as a guide, did some practical research and rediscovered a number of caves and sections of caves (e.g. Paradise, Elysium).

Jeremiah Wilson worked on the northern limestone and no subsequent major discoveries have been made in the area where he worked. Major discoveries since his time have been made in the southern limestone. The River Cave, in the southern limestone, is officially recorded as discovered in 1903; Mr Ralston regards it as certain that at least part of the cave (down to the river level) was known prior to 1903.

On McKeown : Mr Ralston feels that he was more likely an escaped convict than a bushranger and that his hut might have been where Caves House now stands. He argued that the real discoverers of Jenolan were those who found the dark caves and these people are unknown.

In 1860 Whiting wrote to Bathurst Free Press stating that he was in a party which discovered Lucas Cave (through the Cathedral section) because anyone who had preceded that party would have broken formations while entering.

#### EXTRACTS FROM

## REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT RESEARCH OFFICER November 1974

B. Ralbton

I contacted Mr Wes Whalan of Cronulla, who paid a year's subscription.

I saw Mrs Whalan of Katoomba, who claims to be descended from James Whalan from Ginkin. She told me that her son Rex worked at one time in the State Archives, where he was able to trace the story of Sergeant Charles Whalan. He interested Ronald Whalan of Liverpool who eventually produced The Whalans of Australia. Mrs Whalan lent me her copy of this book. I found it a wonderful story of the family, beginning with the story of Charles Whalan's sentence of transportation to the colonies for seven years, for having trout fishes in his posession. There is a long description of the discovery of Jenolan Caves, written by Alfred Samuel Whalan in 1920. Unfortunately, Alf was at this time nearly seventy years of age, so some of his story, particularly with respect to the Lucas Cave, is inaccurate.

I saw Mrs Janet Bryant (a member of the Society - ed.), who showed me her collection of photographs of Jeremiah Wilson's time at Jenolan. These pictures were apparently used by Havard, and have been copied by Warren Targett. She gave me particulars of Jeremiah's family, and is trying to get me a copy of his death certificate.

In company with guides Ernie Holland and Peter Morris, I traced Wilson's route of discovery of the Jubilee Cave from the Gem of the West, to the Jubilee, Red Cave and Paradise, right through to his last cavern of 1900. These areas I had previously rediscovered during researches into my work on Jenolan history. We found an area which could be the 'Shipwreck Cavern' as described to us by a previous Society speaker. We noted in particular the work of R.I.Bailey, who left his name in remote sections of the Red Cave on March 1st, only eight days after discovery of the area.

#### BITS AND PIECES

Noel Rawlinson recently acquired some copies of W.L.Havard's paper, The Romance of Jenolan Caves, which he resold to members and others at a profit. He told us that he would be donating the profits to the Society.

Although Sandra has performed her task well and willingly she says that she enjoys it - it is not really fair to expect her
to continue unaided forever. The Society still needs members

#### CURATORS' REPORT

### ASSISTANT RESEARCH OFFICER'S REPORT

#### February 1975

Basil Ralston

I visited Ronald Whalan, author of the book The Whalans of Australia. He is a descendant of Campbell Whalan, so claims he is not biassed in the James/Charles controversy. Campbell was their brother.

We had a good discussion. He feels that because of the contour of the land from Ginkin to Jenolan, James would have followed valleys down into McKeown's Valley, and thus through the Coach House and Grand Arch to find McKeown. So he would be first through them, as the family claim, although he would do no more.

He has a photograph, of which we have a copy, and corrected me on our names. There is a man on a horse holding a gun, I think, and Jerry. Reading from right to left, it is Jerry Wilson, the little man with the hat and bow tie is Campbell Whalan, his ancestor. Near him is Fred Whalan. On the horse is Fred Wilson, then the young Wiburd and Edwards (or Edwards and Wiburd?).

I followed the old Six Foot Track from the Explorers' Tree down Nellie's Glen (1884). It drops 600 feet in a quarter mile - they were keen. It is a testing beginning to walking 26 miles to Jenolan Caves. From the bottom I found a couple of miles of level walking, but that is as far as I went.

I asked the Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences about . electric torches available to early explorers. They replied that "electric torches were not practical till the First World War, and then were rather bulky ".

#### JANUARY SMOKE CONCERT

About 150 people attended the Smoke Concert in the Grand Arch on Australia Day, January 26. Artists included Warren Targett, Robby Sanderson, "Harmony Pie", Kerry Lewis and a bag-piper called Michael. Other artists who had prior engagements expressed interest and "Harmony Pie" are interested in coming again. Gross takings were \$32, but we don't know the expenses yet.

Because of a total fire ban there was no smoke at this concert. We may be able to warm you up and smoke you out at the next Smoke Concert, tentatively scheduled for the October long weekend.

JCH&PS is now receiving regular notices and newsletters from Bathurst, Lithgow and Mourt Victoria Historical Societies Most of these arrive too late for inclusion of notices in this Newsletter. Local members may be interested to know that the Bathurst District Historical Society meets on the 3rd Thursday of the month in the Nurses Recreation Room of the Bathurst District Hospital.

#### **BROWSINGS**

Ure Smith has recently (1974) published a facsimile of volumes 1 and 2 of the *Picturesque Atlas of Australasia* which was originally published in 1888 (Australia's Centenary Year) and edited by Andrew Garran. The facsimile is published in one volume under the title *Australia*, *The First Hundred Years*.

The book contains a chapter on Jenolan Caves with seven pages of text and seven engravings, two of which show Wellington Caves. The description of the caves is written in the rather flowery romantic style of the times.

Another book of interest to Jenolan buffs is a reprint of the 1900 edition of Charles White's History of Australian Bushranging, republished in 1970 by Lloyd O'Neill. Volume 1 of this work contains the traditional story of the 'bushranger' McKewin (sic) and his capture by Charles Whalan and two troopers. The short (2pp) account is illustrated with a drawing of the entrance to "The Bushranger's Cave".

Which leads us to the subject of next month's talk. This will be based on a recent paper by B.S.Nurse and R.A.Ellis in the Journal of the Sydney Speleological Society (19, pp 29-35) for February 1975: The Nomenclature of Bushrangers Cave and Bow Cave, Jenolan.

There is an earlier article on the same subject by JCH&PS Vice President John Dunkley in the Sydney University Speleological Society Bulletin, 13, 6, pp71-72, 1973. This paper is called The Nomenclature of Bushrangers Cave and Diggins Diggins.

# MUSEUM REPORT

Since signs pointing the way to the museum were erected the response has been tremendous. However, as many people are unaware that the old post office is a museum, not a functioning post office, a sign to clarify the situation has been ordered.

Amongst the exhibits, some slides of Barralong Cave, lent by Noel Rawlinson, have proved popular.

As an experiment, Sandra Martyn made some copies of an old photograph of the post office which she offered for sale and donated the proceeds to the society. Since then we have produced a set of seven photographs and six slides. The photographs are popular with visitors.

The curtains have made a difference to the post office museum. It is now necessary to have the lights on throughout the day, but people can no longer peer in through the windows. They have to enter to see the display. With the curtains in place, there is no longer the bright glare, noticed before.

In the seven months to May 1975, the museum was opened on at least 60 days, mainly at weekends. Sandra Martyn has continued to be the principal museum supervisor and is to be congratulated for her enthusiasm. Following improvement in the number of visitors, the committee was able to increase her expense allowance so that she is no longer quite so much out of pocket. Some local members have also assisted with accommodation.

Early in May Mr W.F.Heiron visited Jenolan and, in his spare time, opened the museum.

#### MUSEUM REPORT

The number of visitors has continued to be large throughout the winter. Between August 1974 and June 1975 we have had just on 3000 visitors. The greater number have come since Easter when the signs were eretted.

The sale of Occasional Papers is very good. In fact, since the Barralong paper was introduced in May it has almost overhauled the other two.

The photographs are selling very well, though there are some complaints about their price. Unfortunately the slides are not selling. Since their introduction only 18 have gone, compared with 200 photographs.

A large number of cracks has appeared in the old post office. The rather large crack in the back wall near the roof has widened and the wall near the fireplace has come away. The door is also beginning to cause some alarm; putty along the pane of glass is coming away and there is a large crack in the left panel.

## CURATORS' REPORT

This year we have received a large number of historical items which have been mentioned in other reports throughout the year. Since our last meeting in May we have received a donations box from Mr Heiron.

The lower jaw of a thylacene (Tasmanian tiger or wolf) was found in the Imperial Cave during redevelopment of the track. This, together with other animal bones, has been put aside and will be displayed in a limestone cabinet which is being constructed opposite the sink in the Imperial Cave. The work is being carried out by the Department of Tourism.

We have had a number of problems with storage of the items collected. Mr Culley has two suit cases of photographs and papers and I have a large number of items at my home. All the items which were in the Guides' Office haven been taken to the old post office. It has been suggested a number of times that a fire-proof cabinet should be purchased. This could be placed in the Guides' Office. We feel that because of the lack of storage we should not receive any more items until a satisfactory system of storage has been arranged. (Since this was written, the President has informed us that a steel cabinet has been purchased.

The cabinets and honour roll which Mr Heiron presented to the Society are still in the hands of Mr Bramston. He is still waiting on polishing materials to finish the items before they can be displayed.

The wall which was to be constructed on the far side of the old post office will be done when daylight saving starts again.

Our most recent acquisition is a pyramid switch board, obtained for us by Mr H.J. Peters of Rose Bay.

# MUSEUM REPORT

November 1975

No further widening of the cracks in the walls of the old post office has been noticed. The door has been patched up by Dave Rodgers, who replaced the putty round several of the glass panes. There has been an increase recently in the number of resident spiders. I would appreciate any offers of eviction.

The occasional papers are selling very well, no. 3 especially so. No. 1 (Steam Cleaning) has almost sold out, only 45 remaining in stock.

Slides are moving very slowly. The initial stock was 728. We have now sold 21. This was discussed at the committee meeting and it was decided to sell them at 25 cents each or \$1.50 the set. These slides are very clear and sharp when projected on a screen.

The postcards are still selling well. We recently received further supplies of some of the subjects. Two of these photos were slow starters but lately they have picked up; these are the divers and the Edwards party. The other five subjects have maintained a steady rate of sale. The committee has decided to have two more subjects added to the postcard range - these will be The First Caves House and The Punt in the River Cave.

Early in October we added some photos from the Department of Mines archives to the museum display. These have already proved popular with our visitors, the favourites being The Skeleton and The Punt and Boat on the River Styx. Those of Caves House and the Lucas Cave Exhibition Chamber are close seconds. Copies of these and other new photos are available on order at the museum. The copies will be the same size, 10 in × 8 in and cost \$3. Orders will be filled once each month, then forwarded to buyers.

The sales of envelopes have dropped slightly in the last few weeks. This is only partly due to the slightly lower number of visitors. I feel that the major contributing factor is the stamp itself. The current souvenir envelope has the blue star sapphire stamp on it. This stamp has been out for some time and is not as colourful as some previous stamps.

Now on display is the pyramid switch-board recently acquired. A great many visitors comment on it, the most frequently asked question being "what is its age and history?"

A recent visitor brought up the subject of the Jenolan postmark - design, length of service etc.. I would appreciate any help in answering these queries.

Thanks to Tom Freily who manned the post office, especially during the week. Thanks also to Ernie and Elaine Holland who, for some weeks, lent me their caravan during the weekends.

# JENOLAN CAVES HOUSES

Before the building of any guest house early visitors to the caves made good use of the Grand Arch. Its far reaches were used for accommodation for almost forty years. Gentlemen retired to the northern side and ladies to the south.

In 1869 a raised dancing platform was erected in the Arch. Dances were held by firelight, flickering candles and lantern light. Music was provided by accordion, fiddles and even a brass band which came from Bathurst. At midnight the Keeper of the Caves, Jeremiah Wilson, would end revelries by cracking his stockwhip. It was found that by tying a canvas from the side of the dance floor a rough tent could be formed. This procedure was often carried out by the more timid visitors.

The first Caves House was erected in 1880 by Jeremiah Wilson. Made of wood with an iron roof, it measured 14 feet wide and 40 feet long. It had a small verandah and five bedrooms. The kitchen and dining room were separate from the main building, as was the caretaker's cottage. Additions to the building were made over the next few years.

In November 1887 a large two-storied wooden building with wide verandahs was erected. This made it possible to accommodate some thirty persons.

Shortly after midnight on 14th March 1895 fire destroyed the old building, including the first and second class dining rooms, sitting and billiards rooms, 12 bedrooms, kitchen and pantry. All the household effects were lost. The new building was saved after two hours of exertion.

On 4th July 1896 two acres of land were dedicated for an accommodation house. Believed to be the first building erected from native limestone, the northern wing of the present Caves House was completed early in 1898. It was designed by the Government Architect, in a modified Queen Anne style, and was built on the site of the first house.

In 1907 a contractor removed the remaining wooden building and erected the present two-storied building. Completed in 1909, it is very inviting with its red gabled roof and long verandah. Its ground floor walls are built of squared rubble masonry and the upper walls are of rough cast brick.

A new addition, in modified Elizabethan style, was commenced in 1914 and was completed two years later. Its ground floor walls are of stone, the first and second floors are rough-cast concrete, and the third floor walls are asbestos cement panels with wooden frames.

#### RESEARCH REPORT

February 1976
Since the last meeting in November several members have been very helpful and we have been able to co-operate as a team.

ABALDERIC BENGLIEF DUSCHES ESTEL ESTAGE FALLE VAR VAN DEN HA

On 21 December information was gained from Jenolan visitors that a Mrs Phil Edwards of Westmead is a daughter of Mr Forster who was a guide at Jenolan, apparently in the 1920's.

Another visitor to Jenolan was Mr D.J. Harrison of Armidale, a grandson of Isabella Whalan who is descended from James Whalan's side of the family.

The research officer has also spoken with a young lady who is a direct descendant of Samuel Cook.

Miss I. Jefferson of Castle Hill replied to our call for information and has donated some old photographs. Another contact from Castle Hill, Ethie L. Young, who is 89, has provided some information about her mother, Sarah Parsons, who visited Jenolan as a child in 1862. Her note is printed elsewhere in this issue. Ron Newbould is corresponding further with these two ladies and is also following a lead to the Luxton family, who were associated with the Lucas Cave in about 1870.

Ron also has a new lead on the capture of James McKeown in 1838. A person named Reid, 13 to 15 years old, is supposed to have been present at the capture.

Names and addresses of people who claim to have any link with Jenolan, and their part in our history, are being recorded.

#### Extracted from a report by Ron Newbould

As mentioned in the research report, Sarah Elizabeth Parsons, visited Jenolan in 1862, and it is claimed that her name was carved over the entrance to the Devil's Coach House. A recent search has failed to reveal this inscription. Here is Ethie Young's account.

In the year 1854 Sarah Elizabeth Parsons was born at Yetholme, that being the year after the Convicts finished the Bathurst Rd. When a small child she remembered travelers passing through on their way to Bathurst talking about the wonderful caves they had seen. Then in the year 1862 when she was eight years old, her parents decided to form a party and see the caves themselves.

Traveling in Bugies and Sulkies they cut down saplings to tie behind the Buggies to act as brakes to help them down the steep incline. [When] they arrived at the caves, Jeremiah Wilson [who] was then living at the Caves in a very [primitive] fashion, took them through the caves that had been explored at that time. To go through the caves they used the reins and bridles tied together then around their waists in case of an accident ; they used the lamps placing one on a ledge and carried the other to light the way.

They had many funny things happen such as one of the party emptying a small cask of water they had brought with them [only] to find water was not wanted as there was plenty of water. So he filled the cask with rocks and dropped it into the under ground river, then waited to hear how long it would fall into the water below; it took so long they thought it would never splash and let them know it had hit the water.

Before they left the caves, as Sarah Elizabeth was the first child to enter the caves, they carved her name above the entrance to the Caves. [ A covering letter makes it clear that this inscription was carved over the Devil's Coach House - Ed. ]

# CURATORS

This quarter the Curatons position has been an easy one except for the weather. On our days off we have had bad weather in most instances and have been unable to build the rock wall near the old post office.

Members will be pleased to know that the "Bone Case" in the Imperial Cave has been completed and we are now waiting on a plastic mixture to set the bones in before they can be properly displayed. E. Holland is obtaining this mixture from the Australian Museum in Sydney.

The crystal collection in the foyer of Caves House, which was prepared by E. Holland, is causing a lot of interest by visitors. As time permits there will be more specimens of crystal added to the collection.

We have now received the accession forms on which we will record details of what the society owns and what is on loan. Since we have numbers of suit cases of items and photographs this will take a while.

We have received a tea leaf spoon, with Venolan Caves stamped on it, from Mrs Norma Berriman of Lithgow.

# ASSESSING THE HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE OF CAVES

## INTRODUCTION AND GENERAL CRITERIA

Historical significance implies associations with people, including famous or notorious individuals, social or political groups (e.g. the conservation movement) and large numbers of people seeking recreation or adventure.

Historically significant caves may include those which interest, or have interested, historians, geographers and other writers.

Many cave areas have also been the subject of intense interest by the public since their discovery in the early years of the colonies. Parties of visitors often made arduous journeys to visit remote caves. Newspapers, from the 1830's onwards, contain numerous accounts of these adventures and popular geographical works have included lengthy descriptions of popular caves. Around the turn of the century guide books to popular cave areas appeared.

It can be argued, therefore, that visiting caves is a significant social activity and that the principal cave tourist areas have a significant place in our social history. Jenolan can be considered to be the archetype of such areas. Much of its history is well documented and it has been written about by many authors. For many years it has supported a small unique community which has a strong sense of its own history.

Many contemporary tourists display great interest, not only; in the natural beauty of caves themselves, but also in the history of their discovery and development and in the lives and work of their discoverers and explorers. We would guess that for many people their appreciation of the significance of any part of the National Estate is greatly enhanced by historical associations.

## SPECIFIC CRITERIA

#### 1. Priority

One test of historical significance is priority (e.g. the first man on the moon). A cave area or any single cave within an area may be considered significant for similar reasons, for example :-

- (1) the first cave discovered by European settlers,
- (2) the first cave protected by an act of parliament,
- (3) the first tourist cave,
- (4) the cave in which paths, steps, etc. were first built,

(5) the first cave to be lit by electricity,

(6) the first cave associated with some other significant improvement (e.g. self-guided tours, steam cleaning),

(7) the site of the first discovery of particular bones or fossils.

## 2. Uniqueness

Other caves may be significant because of some special or unique use, for example :-

- (1) a cave which is used, or could be used, as a museum,
- (2) a cave used as a church, dance hall, storage or shelter,
- (3) a cave used by a notable historical figure, e.g. a bushranger, an explorer or a settler.

#### 3. Other Criteria

A cave may be seen to have some historical significance for some of the following reasons.

- (1) It was used as an aboriginal shelter and contains artefacts, paintings or other evidence of occupation.
- (2) It has been written about by a significant author or by many authors.
- (3) It has been painted or drawn by a significant artist.
- (4) It has been the subject of an historically significant dispute, e.g. over mining, conservation or development:

A cave may have historical significance without necessarily being worthy of preservation on other grounds. For example, some caves which have been partially destroyed through the activities of visitors may, nevertheless, be significant illustrations of man's past use of caves.

#### REGISTRATION

In compiling a register of the National Estate it may be preferable to list groups of caves, or cave areas, rather than scattered individual caves, especially if the number of registered places is to be limited. This argument applies particularly to places like Jenolan which is not merely a collection of caves, but a distinct community. The physical evidence of its history is to be found in its buildings as well as in its caves.

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#### CONCLUSIONS

We feel that there can be no doubt of the significance of any area which is considered to be historically important by large numbers of people. For example, one cave area in Australia, Jenolan, already supports an active local historical society whose members are keen to preserve documentary and physical evidence of man's use of the caves. We regard this, in itself, as an indicator of historical significance.

We recognise that the perception of significance can be largely subjective; people assess significance in terms of their own interests and enthusiasms. However, the criteria we have suggested provide some possible guidelines for assessing whether or not a cave is historically significant.

## RESEARCH OFFICER'S REPORT 1975-76

During the twelve months that I have been the research officer for this society, I feel some gains have been made.

I inherited many problems that have been prevalent with this society since it was formed several years ago. I have endeavoured to sort out many of the problems, and many of the problems have begun to sort themselves, as I believe time will tell.

A number of people have come forward with specific information that is beneficial to our society. A tremendous amount of follow-up work is now needed.

It is interesting to note that major identities of Jenolan Caves' earlier years have been linked up with during 1975-76. It was some time ago that one of our inaugural members had an interview with the family of Mr Oliver Trickett. This information is yet to be brought forward for further research. Mrs K. Robey, daughter of eminent Jenolan historian Mr Ward L. Havard, has been in contact with JCH&PS and intended to become a member of the society. Mrs Dunlop had sent a parcel which contains various papers and notes that pertain to Jenolan.

Some people have sought information from the society regarding tracing their own family histories. These enquiries are beneficial to the society in so much as they draw attention to specific areas of Jenolan history that otherwise could have been overlooked for some time. A recent example is Mrs J. Webster's belief that her paternal grandparents, named Kennedy, were keepers of the Jenolan accommodation house prior to Government's taking control. Another example is Mrs Sharp of Oberon who believes she could be a descendant of the Wilson family. She has, as recently as 11th August 1976, given to me, on behalf of our society, a stereoscopic viewer and 48 stereoscopic views of Jenolan Caves area, taken by the photographer Mr J. Rowe. I presume the photographs were taken in the 1880's or thereabouts.

At the present I am in the process of listing all contacts that have been made with Jenolan over the recent years. This listing incorporates names, addresses and whatever historical link the person may have with Jenolan.

My future intentions were to compile a year by year account of the Jenolan histories where possible. I look forward to the ensuing year's bearing us results for our continued efforts even though some years are complete blanks.

At this stage I would like to suggest that from time to time, if it were possible, we produce a history sheet of Jenolan that could be published and distributed to our members.

## MUSEUM REPORT

The museum was opened on 110 days during the year ended 30 June 1976. The number of visitors was less than that expected, especially over the last few months. After adjusting revenue to allow for the cost of saleable items and deducting attendants' expenses the net surplus was \$146.18. Revenue was less than attendants' expenses on 34 days. Expenses were donated back to the society, either fully or in part, on seven occasions.

Since May we have had three new operators at the museum. All report having a great time once the newness had worn off. Four other people have expressed an interest in giving it a go. Their chance is rapidly approaching. Our main problem lies in the making of definite arrangements; most people are unable to make long-term appointments. Looking after the museum must be planned ahead and this can sometimes be difficult to do.

Our recent active members have been Bill Buckley and his young son, Richard Stacey and Peter Wellings. During the week Sandra Heaney and May Ebberton have occasionally opened the museum. My thanks and appreciation of their help go to all these members.

Visitors comments remain the same as previously mentioned; among them are :

steps down from the road at the side of the P.O., display of the plans for the new building, further information sheets, more occasional papers, more photographs for sale.

The majority of visitors are extremely interested in the history of Jenolan and the most popular photos are still the skeleton, boats in the River Cave and those showing caving parties.

Other information I am seeking for the period [880-]890 is of the J.D.Brown family. If any person can give any information on this name I would appreciate it gratefully.

Sydney Smith was Member for Bathurst in the NSW Legislative Assembly from 1894 to 1898. In 1889, while MLA for East Macquarie, he became Minister for Mines in the last Parkes Government. He was Member for Macquarie in the first Commonwealth Parliament and became Postmaster General in the Reid-McLean Government, 1904-05. He died in 1934.

#### SMOKE CONCERTS AND OTHER EVENTS

## ANY OLD LAMPS ?

The society has acquired a new member, Mr F. Stewart, who is curator of the Ferrowatt Electrical Museum, Great Western Highway, Faulconbridge. This museum contains over 5000 items (lamps, radio valves, fittings, components etc.). The earliest lamp in the collection is an Edison dating 1882.

Mr Stewart is interested in obtaining duplicates from other collections and has offered assistance in dating and identifying old lamps found at Jenolan.

The first time a cave was lit electrically at Jenolan, and probably also the first time in the world, was on 22 July 1880 when E.C. Cracknell installed temporary lights in the Margarita Cavern, a section of Chifley Cave. In 1884 arrangements were made with Cracknell for the installation of lights in other parts of the caves. This work was well under way by 1886 when a steam driven generator was installed in the Grand Arch. The lighting of the Imperial Cave was completed in January 1887.

In 1889 Cracknell and J.S. Fitzmaurice supervised the purchase and installation of a new dynamo capable of running 100 lamps. By 1890 a new dam had been completed and the erection of a water-powered Leffel wheel to drive the dynamo was completed in May when the dynamo was connected to the Imperial Cave circuit.

In 1893 a new dynamo, to run the lights in the Lucas Cave, was purchased, cables were laid to the mouth of the cave and the Leffel wheel was moved to a new site. The lighting of Lucas Cave, consisting of six arc lamps and 70 incandescent lamps, was completed in June and July of 1894 by Mr Fitzmaurice and an assistant.

During this time magnesium lighting was still being used in many parts of the caves and in 1900 an acetylene lamp was tested, but it was found to be objectionable. In the same year a new magnesium lamp was found to be successful. Acetylene lighting was not completely abandoned; it was used for a concert in the Grand Arch in 1901.

F.J. Wilson continued with the installation of electric lights. He did the wiring in the Mafeking Cave (part of Lucas Cave), which was opened in 1902, by himself.

By 1904 the Leffel wheel, which had done 13 years service, needed repairs. Its water supply was improved by the construction of the dam, which impounds the Blue Lake, in 1908.

# Jenolan plan to boost tourism

The Federal Government should aid NSW in plans to develop Jenolan loaves as a tourist resort to court the flow of people spending their holidays overseas, the State Minister for Tourism. Mr Booth, said yesterday.

Mr Booth said the NSW Government was planning to spend up to \$4 million to develop Jenolan: Caves into a tourist attraction capable of attracting visitors from interstate and overseas.

However, the State Government's plans could be delayed unless Federal aid was granted to the project.

Mr Booth said Cabinet had approved plans for a \$2,2 million cable car, a \$1.9 million information centre and the provision of luxury and low cost accommodation at the Caves House.

All the work would be subject to an environmental study.

"However, \$4 million is a lot of money for a State Government to spend on a tourist attraction, so I think the Fe deral Government should be asked to help," Mr Booth said.

Mr Booth said action had to be taken to turn the trend of Australian tourists spending their money overseas rather than on visits to attractions within their own country.

#### Late Mr Rod Murdoch

Mr R E Murdoch, who died in Sydney on 8 September at the age of 52, had been Director of Tourism from December 1968 until his death, and held other important positions in the tourist industry.

His distinguished career included war service, long service with both the Department of Education and Department of Tourism, and association with community service organisations.

Mr Murdoch was a Bachelor of Arts (Sydney University) and Master of Arts (University of California, Berkeley, USA), and held the Diploma of Physical Education (Sydney University).

He served with the AIF in World War II (1942-46), and was in the Citizen Military Forces (1947-61) with the Sydney University Regiment, where he rose to be second-incommand.

Important positions in the tourist industry held by Mr Murdoch were: Member of the Australian Tourist Commission 1973-75; Board Member of the Australian National Travel Association (ANTA) from 1969 until his death; Member of the Board of Directors of the Pacific Area Travel Association from 1972-74 and Chairman of PATA's Australian Chapter from 1973; and Member of the American Society of Travel Agents (ASTA) and Chairman of the Executive Committee for the Society's 1971 Congress, held in Sydney.

He was also a member of the Sydney Rotary Club, the National Fitness Council of New South Wales, the Impertal Services Club and the SKAL Club of Sydney.

There were a number of very important developments within the tourist industry in New South Wales while Mr Murdoch was Director.

These included the subsidy scheme to assist Regional Tourist Associations in the State: the appointment of Regional Tourism Laison Officers in various Regions of the State; legislation to license travel agents, and pending legislation to assist with tourist development; and the opening of the NSW Government Travel Centre in Adelaide and the NSW Government Tourist Information Centres in Albury and Tweed Heads.

Mr Murdoch is survived by Mrs Murdoch, four children (three of them married) and two grandchildren.

## NATIONAL ESTATE AND NATIONAL TRUST

At its February meeting the committee decided to nominate the Jenolan Caves area for inclusion in the register of the National Estate being compiled by the National Heritage Commission.

We also decided to ask the National Trust to consider classifying three structures, Caves House, the engineer's cottage and the limestone bridge. The suggestion to classify Caves House had been raised a few years ago but had apparently been forgotten.

## JENOLAN CAVES MASTER PLAN REPORT

# INTRODUCTION

The Jenolan Caves Master Plan Report, dated April 1975, was prepared by the Special Projects Section of the Government Architect's office, Department of Public Works. The report is presented in two volumes, of which I have seen only volume 1 containing the report itself; volume 2 contains appendices.

The report consists of seven sections :

- 1. Introduction,
- 2. The Site.
- 3. Existing Administration Policy,
- 4. Planning Principles,
- 5. Review of Administration Policy,
- 6. The Master Plan,
- 7. Implementation.

Sections 1 to 3 are mainly descriptive and will not be summarised here; our main interest is in the principles and recommendations of the plan.

# PLANNING PRINCIPLES

The plan is based on the recognition of the Jenolan Caves area as a major tourist asset and also on its importance as part of the national estate. Economic viability is also considered to be important. The report states

.. the first aim of management and planning principles should be directed at the conservation of the integrity and diversity of the geological features and life systems associated with the caves for these have aesthetic, recreational, educational and scientific values.

#### Conservation

Conservation principles include recognition of the surface reserve area as a place for activity by visitors and also as a buffer zone which can be managed to prevent pollution of the caves. Development of new caves for public inspection should be suspended until methods of controlling pollution can be established. Items of historical interest should be preserved provided that this does not conflict with other aims.

## Education

Educational sessions, using modern equipment and techniques with trained personnel in appropriate buildings are a necessary part of future development [for school and university groups].

Similarly, there is a need for a centre where the general public can seek information .... by displays, photos, maps and models.

# Recreation

The development of recreational facilities is necessary, not to induce more visitors, .... but primarily to provide necessary associated facilities and alternative activity outlets to help relieve peak congestion visitation loads from within the caves.

## Research

Scientific research is necessary both for conservation and for the maximum use of the tourist attraction. Accommodation, workshops and storerooms will be needed for research workers.

# General Principles for Public Use

During periods of high visitation the use of motor vehicles within the reserve will be restricted to guests staying at Caves House and other authorised people. Much of the area now used for parking will be used for new accommodation and service buildings and for day-visitor facilities.

The reserve is to be divided into three zones for different intensities of use.

A high intensity zone contains the immediate vicinity of Caves House and a visitor reception area at the top of Five Mile Hill.

The medium intensity area includes the hinterland of Caves House. The system of paths is to be extended and picnic facilities will be provided. There should be no new service roads.

The low intensity zone is the remainder of the reserve which is regarded as a buffer zone for conservation purposes.

## Fire Plan

The principal objectives of the fire plan, prepared by an officer of the Forestry Commission, are :-

a) to prevent uncontrolled fires,

- b) to develop the controlled use of fire in order to reduce fuel quantities ....
- c) to fully maintain the existing system of roads, trails and breaks,
- d) to assist and encourage the development of further trails and breaks ....,
- e) to provide a basic fire-fighting force ...,
- f) to promote and encourage fire awareness ....,
- g) to re-inforce and to assist in the co-ordination of efforts of the Forestry Commission ... etc.,

The plan proposes a system of controlled burning, in autumn and winter, along trails and breaks not more than 3 chains wide. Snag felling of trees previously damaged by phasmids and wild fires should be carried out in strips at least 1 chain wide adjacent to roads, trails, breaks and houses.

## Cave Exhibits

The carrying capacity of the caves can be increased by re-opening three old show caves: Arch/Nettle, Elder and Jersey. It may also be increased by devising methods of reducing deterioration caused by visitors and by the construction of improved paths, steps and viewing platforms.

The effects of artificial elements, such as stairs, concrete paths and electrical cables, on the cave environment (e.g. water flow and growth of formation) should be investigated. Until such research is completed, new facilities in the caves should make minimum contact with the cave.

Such a system would consist of modular component parts, ... that could be assembled and disassembled as required to form paths, viewing platforms and stair structures. They would stand on adjustable height legs .... with minimum physical attachment to cave surfaces and [would] be of chemically inert materials. Electrical services and path lighting would be a concealed integral part of the components ....

Display lighting would be fed from the walkway structures and may even be supported on poles or cantilever beams from them. ....

Attempts at concealment by the burying of cable within the caves' surface shall be discontinued.

The new aesthetic philosophy .... intentionally visually separates natural and artificially introduced elements, the one an organic varying free-form structure, the other orderly, geometrical neat and consistent and not detracting from the cases by unsuccessfully attempting to blend.

# General Principles of Landscape Design

The area around Caves House must be hard paved. Garden areas around the house will use colourful exotic trees and shrubs, in order to preserve historical associations and to blend with the pseudo-English buildings. Deciduous trees will admit sunlight in winter.

Outside the Caves House precinct all exotic plants will be eliminated and replaced with locally indigenous plants.

## REVIEW OF ADMINISTRATION POLICY

A technical and scientific research and advisory committee is to be established to investigate the full impact of all policy decisions to give guidance in the formulation of policy. Such a committee would include representatives of the Trust, the Department of Tourism, management, speleologists, conservationists, guiding staff, relevant specialist scientists and [the] public...

Additional staff will be required for field research , rangers and gardening.

The Caves will not be required to make an annual profit.

### THE MASTER PLAN

# Reception and Information Centre

A reception and information centre, together with a car park, cable-car station, picnic areas and caravan park will be constructed on flat to undulating land near the top of Five Mile Hill. The road will be diverted through the car park but will remain a public road through to the caves. However, drivers who proceed through will be warned that parking is not available at the caves, except on certain off-peak days.

The reception and information centre will include a ticket office and an automated display hall where visitors can be occupied while waiting for the cable car. The picnic areas will relieve pressure on the facilities at the caves.

## Cable Car

The proposed route of the cable car is a straight line from the reception centre to the caves. It follows the ridge and the old six-foot track for about half the distance and then descends rapidly into McKeown's Valley. The lower terminal will be located on the present bus-parking area beside the post office.

The report includes a comparative analysis of cable-car and mini-bus transport. The reasons for favouring the cable car are summarised.

It provides an exciting drawcard mode of transport.

It can be made profitable.

Safety relies on mechanical function only and not on human judgement in addition.

The maintenance is related to mechanical function only and not other items ... .

It does not involve the major practical limitations of staffing.

It initially provides an adequate carrying capacity and the capacity can be modified to daily demands and increased to cater for future demands.

# Caves House Precinct

The cable-car terminal, ticket office, guides' office, kiosk, first-aid room and locker rooms will be located on an elevated deck opposite the existing guides' office and ticket office. The ground level will be predominantly a pedestrian area with an outdoor restaurant. The speed of through traffic will be limited by law and by sett paving within a narrow road.

Car park no. 2, near the existing tennis courts, will be retained for week-day visitors. Car park no.1 will be converted to a games area, child-minding centre and adventure playground. Picnic and barbecue facilities will be provided on a riverside walk upstream of the old car park.

Further picnic facilities will be provided by a communal barbecue and long banquet (sic) tables beside the Blue Lake.

# Service and Staff Buildings

Existing service and staff buildings behind Caves House will be removed and replaced by a new set of buildings on the area occupied by car park no.3 (the report says no.1, but the plans show no. 3).

## Caves House

The area freed from service buildings shall be used for guests' car parking at ground level and, over this, terraced levels of dormitory and family unit accommodation [will be built]. Common rooms shall be located and glazed to catch available sun, draped to provide evening warmth and some shall be capable of use as seminar areas.

Part of the ground floor of Caves House shall be used as a small museum, library and specialised information rooms. A theatre shall be provided.

Caves House guest rooms shall be retained above the general level of activities but there shall be a general upgreding of accommodation standards. Some rooms shall be converted to provide more and higher quality en-suite bathroom facilities.

## Caves House Hinterland

Below the Blue Lake the pedestrian path shall be ... developed into a circular walk. The hydro-electric generators shall be rehoused to permit external viewing .... Limited tent camping by organised groups may be permitted on the old pig farm site ....

The tracks through the McKeown's Valley to karst indscape features shall be developed and adequately signposted .... Although a plan for the re-introduction of native animals to the area would be encouraged the animal enclosure as a display future would be disbanded. No development is proposed within McKeown's Valley ... for this area is the drainage area that feeds the caves.

## Pedestrian Paths

More walking tracks, providing round trips, will be constructed using natural materials and signs will encourage people to keep to the tracks.

# Roads and Transport

Although the existing main road will remain, it is proposed that access via the zig-zag road from Oberon will be closed after the improvement of the road to Hampton.

A standing area for setting down and picking up passengers will be provided near the post office on days when car park no.2 is used.

One or two mini-buses will be provided for people unable to use the cable car.

## Cave Exhibits

The re-opening of the Arch and Nettle Caves will provide an additional high-capacity alternative to the Lucas Cave. If a natural connection between Nettle Cave and the Architect's Studio in Chifley Cave were enlarged, a variety of different inspections, including a through trip, would be available.

The re-opening of Elder Cave, for an inspection with a historical theme, is also proposed.

For the 'genuine enthusiast', the unlit Jersey Cave may be re-opened.

The report notes difficulties caused by crowding in the Lucas Cave and proposes limiting Lucas inspections to 70 people, the present average size of a party. The size of parties in Imperial Cave should be reduced to 40.

### Services

The report reviews existing water, electrical, sewerage, drainage, mechanical & heating, telephone, public address and garbage services and proposes various improvements to cater for present and future needs.

# Kiosks, Concessions and Restaurants

Only a souvenir shop will be provided at the reception and information centre, but it is suggested that outside enterprise may be allowed to provide a kiosk, pony rides and other concessions at the centre.

Existing kiosk and Caves House dining facilities will be retained and an outdoor restaurant, barbecue meat sales area and new souvenir shop will be provided.

## Toilets

The men's toilet adjacent to the guides' office will be demolished, together with that office, and new toilets will be provided. The latrines in the Grand Arch will be removed and new ones will be built near the Blue Lake.

# Security and Staffing

A resident ranger will be needed at the reception and information centre. The self-service nature of much of the proposed additional accommodation means that the number of extra staff needed for Caves House will not be great. The information centre and cable car will require only a small number of operating staff.

## IMPLEMENTATION

Several of the recommendations in the report can be completed without affecting the complete master plan. These include the removal of exotic vegetation, a replanting programme, necessary improvements to the Arch/Nettle, Elder and Jersey Caves, and a number of essential services.

## COMMENTARY

I have tried to give a fair summary of the main points of the Master Plan Report as far as they affect JCH&PS and the general public. This was not always easy since much of the report is written in a convoluted style beloved of public servants. See, for example, the quote on top of page 3.

Some of the assumptions behind the plan may be doubted. Most notable of these, I think, is that a cable car will be a "drawcard". Some people will like it, but I imagine that many will not like being compelled to use it in order to get to the caves. And I am sure that many potential visitors will be scared stiff of the contraption. Other aspects of the transport system appear not to have been thought out: how, for example, will visitors get home when the cable car breaks down or is closed due to high winds?

It seems that the report was completed and presented to the government in a hurry. It could have been a much better report if the issues had been considered more thoroughly and if the public had been invited to comment on the draft before it was accepted, almost two years after the date on the report, by the new government. This report should be published in full and the government should defer major action until the recommendations have been publicly debated.

The only worthwhile mention of previous histories since the November report is a letter received early in January 1977 from A.E. Stedman, treasurer of Sutherland Shire Historical Society. He wrote to say that he has in his possession a book published in 1922 by Gullick, the Government Printer at the time. Mr Stedman has not indicated whether the book pertains to Jenolan Caves or not.

During the January tourist season Mr T. Wallace of Clovelly visited Jenolan and showed Senior Guide, John Culley, a photograph of horses and sulkies with family depicted. Mr Wallace's family came from the Bathurst district last century and this could be a worthwhile prospect for research.

# A NOTE FROM THE TREASURER

Although the annual statement of accounts has been prepared and sent for audit, it is not available for publication as we go to press. However our diligent treasurer, Dick Guy, provides some comments.

The operation of the museum is a real problem that we have to find solutions for immediately. We were only able to open on 37 days for the year in comparison with 110 days the previous year. However the society has maintained its overall solid financial position. The maps continue to be good sellers. We have some supplies of Mitchell's map of the colony and I am sure that there will be interest shown in this map.

#### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

I have been talking to several Jenolan visitors and I have been thinking over some ideas; perhaps other members would be interested in discussing them. I wonder if some of the old tourist caves at Jenolan could not be used for historical and/or 'adventure trips'. It is acknowledged that the old caves are less beautiful than the present tourist caves. Therefore a visit in to them would have to offer something different.

There are many people who, having seen all the well-lit, well-paved tourist caves, would enjoy visiting (in a small group, with a guide) less well-developed caves. Many, particularly family groups, do not want to join a speleological society, but would enjoy a challenge. I feel that the Tourist Bureau might consider running occasional visits to undeveloped caves - logically old tourist caves - as historical or adventure trips. Visitors could be instructed in advance to bring torches for an adventure trip; candles and magnesium flares would be provided for historical visits. Even if such trips were run only occasionally (say, the first Saturday or Sunday of the month, and advertised) I am sure that they would be very popular. If groups were kept small, then all members would be well controlled. Fees could well be much higher than those for conventional trips and visitors choosing such a visit will probably be interested in the aims and objectives of JCH&PS.

It seems to me that a development of this sort, which costs nothing in capital expenditure, might offer a new dimension at Jenolan and could become an exciting and valid alternative to the 'normal' tourist view of the developed caves.

MAY 1977

Since the society's last meeting we have received the following items.

# RESEARCH OFFICER

I find that I am able to pass on some research information to Mrs Sharpe of Oberon, who had requested help with the background of the Doust family. Mr W. Clegg was able to obtain valuable material about the pioneers - Hughes and Whalan, and also of the late Charles Whalan (reprints of articles) and a small photograph, probably of the Hampton Road House.

# CURATORS' REPORT

Firstly, over the last twelve months we have collected numerous items which help add to the history of the society. In the last quarter we have received only ten small black and white photographs of scenes of Jenolan Caves. These were handed to Mr Culley by Mr S.V. Onorato who is at present relieving manager. The photographs were taken all on the one day, 20/1/1928.

We, as curators, would like to thank, once again, Mr W. Heiron for making the display cases for the museum. They have certainly brightened the old post office inside. We would also like to thank Mr D. Bramston for the job of finishing off the honour roll which was made by Mr Heiron.

Mr J. Culley has attended to the grass and the general tidying up around the old post office. I, myself, have been trying to find a suitable rock of limestone to cover the light in front of the post office, to blend in with the rock wall.

Over the last few weeks we have been compiling all items collected by the society; at the moment we are three quarters of the way. It is very interesting to see what the society has to its name: items such as smoking pipes, old watches, numerous books, photographs and maps of Jenolan, cameras, telephones, a dairy separator, a chicken hatcher, old bottles, light globes and reflectors; under my house we have a wash basin, which is close enough to being the kitchen sink.

In June the guiding staff removed the old sandstone plaque at the entrance of the Binoomea Cut and replaced it with a bronze plaque which was supplied by the Department of Tourism. The curators have accepted the sandstone plaque to add to the society collection.

The curators have made available to Mr K. Oliver certain photographs so that he may rephotograph them to assist the publicity officer with her write up for advertising the old post office, and the society in general, in the *Panorama* magazine produced by Ansett Airlines.

We would like to thank the people involved in redispalying the photographs in the new display cabinets.

#### EDITORIAL

The State Government has indicated that the Department of Public Works is preparing an environmental impact study in relation to the Jenolan Caves Master Plan. We also understand that submissions from this society and other interested parties will not be received by the Department of Public Works until the study has been completed.

That is rather surprising to us, since the environment is one of our principal concerns. Does the government, or its advisers, think that we are merely a group of ignorant axe-grinders? In fact, many of our members have a good deal of first-hand knowledge of the Jenolan environment. Some have lived and worked there for many years; they have studied the area and have learned how to interpret it for the public. Others have been regular visitors, studying the landscape and the caves within; some have come to know and understand the flora and fauna of the region; some have taken an interest in the management of cave areas, at Jenolan and elsewhere, for commercial, tourist, conservation and scientific purposes. But the government, or the Public Works Department don't want to hear from us - yet.

We have been informed that the completed environmental impact study will go to the State Pollution Control Commission for its assessment, and that we can make submissions after that. Will that be after the decisions have been made? This sort of thing has happened before. The Master Plan itself was commissioned under the previous government. The first that many people knew about it was when Mr Wran's cabinet decided to adopt the plan and announced the allocation of a large sum of money to implement it. We believe that this decision was rushed - that the government asked for the plan before it had been properly completed. Those who have read the report, which was quite difficult to get hold of for a while, may have noticed that it shows signs, internally, of being a draft document. We would have welcomed the opportunity to comment on that draft; it contains some good ideas as well as some ideas which need further consideration.

Perhaps the authorities don't take JCH&PS seriously because we have not pushed ourselves forward enough. We have never seen ourselves as a ginger group (although we do have a few gingery members). But perhaps we have not made enough public contribution to the problem of the master plan. This journal is available to members, and others, to put sensible, well-argued cases for and against the proposals. There has been plenty of discussion in meetings, and letters have been written, but if we are to convince anybody that we can contribute usefully to planning we must publish.

Members - pens at the ready - forward !

## JENOLAN CAVES MASTER PLAN

At the last meeting a subcommittee of Ben Nurse, John Culley and John Dunkley as convenor was appointed to draft a policy statement on the Society's attitude to the proposals contained in the Jenolan Caves Master Plan Report.

Lengthy discussions were held at Jenolan and in Sydney early in March and a draft statement of policy is now attached. We suggest that members consider carefully the implications and that further discussions be held at a meeting as soon as practicable.

#### COMMENTS

The Jenolan Caves Master Plan Report contains principles and proposals which may well influence public and official attitudes to the development of the caves between now and the end of the century. It was supposed to be released for public discussion but has always been hard to obtain and is now rapidly assuming the status of a working document, a fait accompli.

In the circumstances, the Society seems to have devoted disturbingly little time to consideration of the future, to the preservation of Jenolan Caves. In fact, one looks hard to find the Society's objectives in the area of 'preservation'. Some three years after its release, the Society still has no policy on the Master Plan.

WHAT IS THE WORD 'PRESERVATION' IN OUR NAME FOR, ANYWAY? IS IT JUST PRESERVATION OF HISTORICAL BUILDINGS AND RELICS? WHAT ABOUT THE CAVES? WOULD 'CONSERVATION' EXPRESS OUR AIMS BETTER THAN 'PRESERVATION'?

#### DRAFT POLICY STATEMENT

- 1. The Jenolan Caves should be seen as a major Australian heritage. Accordingly, the caves system should be the centre of planning; all other developments should be subordinate to this.
- Thorough research should precede all proposed development. Where appropriate, the Society should contribute its members' expertise.
- 3. In particular, the Society should be consulted during the planning stage where any proposal to alter or remove items of historical value is made.
- 4. The direction of future tourist development should be towards improvement of the quality and variety of the experience. This should include the opportunity for an appreciation of the colourful history of Jenolan.
- 5. The caves have reached maximum capacity already in terms of daily throughput and in terms of maximum size and frequency of inspections. Different forms of promotion should be undertaken to encourage spreading of the peaks of visitation more evenly over the year.
- There should be research and investment in a continuous programme of maintenance, cleaning and regeneration, to minimise the long-term deterioration of the caves.
- 7. Action should be taken to extend the Reserve boundary to the headwaters of the Jenolan River so as to encompass the entire catchment area upstream of Blue Lake.

#### MUSEUM

One very important acquisition gained by the society on 25/11/1977 was the very much sought after book, *The Whalans in Australia 1791-1969*, which the treasurer handed over to me on receiving the article. I have scanned through parts of the book and would like to pass it on to the meeting today.

The Sands Directory, 1921 I had passed on the the past assistant research officer some time ago.

I would like to hand over to the curators the material which Mr Clegg submitted to me on 13 August 1977. There are two articles, Pioneers - Hughes and Whalan, 1949, and The Late Charles Whalan of Oberon.

I received a letter from Mrs Pettit who indicated that she will bring her father to visit Jenolan and we can have a discussion with him. He is Dr Roy Wiburd.

On 20/1/1978 I had talks with Mr Glasse of Port Macquarie who claims his predecessor built the original accommodation house at Jenolan. His great grand-mother camped on the spot where Caves House is today. That is all the information he could give.

With reference to the first female child claimed to have visited a dark cave at jenolan, information gained by staff at Jenolan Caves leads us to Elder Cave. The period is about 1858. Three different families have requested information on this matter.

REPORT OF THE STATE POLLUTION CONTROL COMMISSION for the year ended 30 June 1977.

### 4.6 Jenolan Caves

The Commission has been requested by the Government to undertake an environmental assessment of tourist development proposals at the Jenolan Caves.

These proposals were outlined in the Jenolan Caves Master Plan Report, completed after consultation with a number of authorities and other interested bodies.

The proposal involves an increase and updating of accommodation, the establishment of a more adequate information centre, provision of cable car access with supporting parking, and some overnight camping and caravanning facilities away from the caves. The report also covers management and protection of the caves and the reserve.

The Commission examined this report and outlined aspects that will need additional coverage in the environmental impact statement now being prepared.

## NOTICES OF MOTION

At the May General Meeting, I gave notice that I would be presenting for decision at the Annual General Meeting, a number of motions, which would, if accepted, bring about significant changes in our meeting dates and the Society's financial and membership year.

The changes being proposed are the result of a suggestion that the Society should change the date of its Annual General Meeting from August to February, a suggestion that has come from more than one member. The main reason given has been that the Jenolan climate in winter is fairly harsh. I am informed that in order to attend three of the last four Annual General Meetings, members have had to contend with snow and rain. This in itself may well be the reason why our Annual General Meetings are not well attended. All things being equal, the February climate would be much more conducive of more of the membership being in attendance.

Additionally, some difficulty has been experienced by members wishing to stay at Caves House during the Annual General Meeting weekend. This is by reason of the fact that it is close to the August School holidays in N.S.W., and schools in other States often begin holidays well before N.S.W. With a change to a February meeting, such problems should be diminished as in all States, the school year has well and truly begun by then.

As well as the obvious changes to meetings dates, the following motions also allow for notice of meetings to be given in the <u>Newsletter</u> and not by pre-paid letter as at present.

Acceptance of the change of the Annual General Meeting from August to February, would obviously require a change in the Society's Financial and Subscription year from the present July/ June basis to a January/December basis. Motions related to election of Office-bearers, Treasurer's Financial Statement and payment of subscriptions are provided for consideration.

On the subject of 'Subscriptions' I am proposing that the period of grace for payment of subscriptions be reduced from twelve months to six months. The Newsletter Editor has often commented about the costs involved in production and distribution of the Newsletter. We experience a turnover of membership each year and it is my observation that very few memberships which are unfinancial after six months, are renewed during the second six months of the financial year.

Included in the motions under the heading 'Subscriptions' is a proposal to introduce the option of FIVE YEAR membership of the Society, at a concessional rate of FOUR TIMES the annual subscription rate.

I believe that this would result in better retention of membership, and also be more convenient for many members by removing the need to pay membership fees annually.

the meeting."

From the purely financial point of view, if wailed of by a good number of members, the Society's accumulated funds would receive a considerable lift. It has always been an aim of the Society to expand Museum facilities, the only restraining factor at present being the much discussed Master Plan. Whether or not we eventually build in the vicinity of the Old Post Office, or whether space is provided in Caves House for Museum facilities, the Society must be ready to act without delay. This is going to require large amounts of money, if only for the purchase of display units.

The amendment to the Constitution concerning 'Accounts' is simply to regularise our investing a proportion of our funds in the NSW Permanent Building Society, at present \$1500.

# 2. AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION - ITEM 6 "ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING"

That this clause be amended to read:

"An ordinary General Meeting shall be held on the second Saturday of the months of
May, August and November, unless the Committee otherwise determines. At least 28 days
notice of such meeting shall be given to each member in the Society's Newsletter,
posted to his/her last known address but accidental omission to give notice to any
member shall not invalidate the meeting."

# 3. AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION - ITEM 10 "ACCOUNTS"

That this clause be amended to read:
"The Society shall keep true accounts of the moneys received and expended by the Society. All monies received shall be deposited in the Society's bank account. The Committee may authorise investment of a proportion of the Society's accumulated funds in Permanent Building Societies at Gall, or in Fixed Term bank accounts. Cheques/withdrawals on all accounts in the Society's name are to be signed by any two of the President, Secretary and Treasurer."

# 4. AMENDMENT TO CONSTITUTION - ITEM 4 "SUBSCRIPTIONS"

That this clause be amended to read:
"The subscription shall be determined from time to time by the Committee. A member who fails to pay his/her annual subscription within six months of the commencement of the then current financial year shall automatically cease to be a member but shall be readmitted on payment of all arrears due by him/her to the Society."

## 5. SUBSCRIPTIONS

- i) That the annual subscription to the Society be:
  - . Single membership (except as provided under Family membership)
  - . Family membership

- \$5 per year

- \$5 per year for one member of the family PLUS \$2 per year for each additional member of the same immedaite family seeking membership
- . <u>Student</u> membership (including Tertiary)
- 🗫 per year
- ii) That FIVE YEAR membership of the Society be offered to interested persons, subscription being FOUR TIMES the annual subscription rates, and that such persons be advised accordingly by individual letter upon expiry of such membership. Further that Concessional Cave Inspection Tickets be sent to such members with the first Newsletter issuing after the commencement of the Society's financial year.
- iii) Subject to approval of the amendments to Clauses 5 and 6 of the Constitution, That subscriptions due by current members of the Society and paid on or after the date of the Annual General Meeting (12/8/78) be deemed to cover the period 1/7/78 to 31/12/79 and be one and a half times the rates stated in item (i), and that membership will be treated as having ceased, in the event of non-payment of the following year's subscription, as stated in item (i), by 30th June, 1980, the same to apply to new members joining prior to 1/10/78.

Also that in the case of subscriptions paid up until the date of the Annual General Meeting on 12th August, 1978, for the twelve months ending 30/6/79, such members will be invoiced for half the annual subscription rate, in the first Newsletter issued after 30/6/79, and they be advised that membership will cease on 31/12/79 in the event of non-payment.

# 6. TREASURER'S FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Subject to approval of the amendments to Clauses 5 and 6 of the Constitution, That the Society's financial records be closed off as at 31/12/78, and an audited Statement of Receipts and Expenditure prepared for presentation at the Annual General Meeting in February, 1979.

# 7. ELECTION OF OFFICE-BEARERS

That the abovementioned proposed amendments to Clauses 4,5,6 and 10 of the & Constitution of the Society, be considered by the Annual General Meeting on 12th August, 1978, PRIOR to election of office-bearers, and that if approved by the meeting, such office-bearers subsequently elected hold office for a SIX MONTHS period until February, 1979.

# THE CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS THE THOUGHTS OF A MEMBER REPORTING HIS IMPRESSIONS

The week got off to a good start on Saturday 10th February, reached some very dizzy heights during the evening of the 17th and soberly arrived at a grand finale on Sunday the 18th.

The Bush/History walks were well received and enjoyed by the public on the weekends but attendances fell away to practically nothing during the week.

The cave inspections of a special type, such as the candle-light inspections of the Chifley-Shambles area, were very well patronised and were always sold out.

It seemed to me that everyone at Jenolan, from Mr Rooney down to the line to the beaut lookin' sheila selling the pennants and manning (or should I say womaning?) the museum really got into the spirit of the event and made it happen as we all hoped it would.

A sight and sound to behold was the guides' working to get the organ into the Cathedral Cave for the church service and then out again; time in - 1 hour (to try and meet the starting time), time out - 1½ very trying hours. "Don't mark it - it's new - and watch the legs please" will be long remembered.

The re-enactments (3) of the discovery of the Imperial System were real gems of dramatic art, the first one especially so when Jeremiah Wilson, alias Keith Oliver, had the misfortune to nearly self-ignite and behave like a surface-to-air missile in his endeavours to remove one lighted candle from the rear of his person whilst descending a rope into Ridley's Short Cut. It did a lot to lighten the proceedings - thanks Keith.

The unveiling of a cast-bronze plaque at Ridley's, after the last re-enactment in front of the invited guests, by the Hon. K. Booth, M.P., Minister for Tourism, was a highlight of the week.

The dinner on Saturday night with the dance to follow was a resounding success by any standards. It proved to be a winner and was made better by the dress of many of the people attending. So many were in costume of the period we were celebrating - little "bubs" of about two years and up to the mums and dads - it was a real beaut. The band, The Rouseabouts, was one in a million. They were a period band and filled the bill to perfection. Their efforts in getting everyone onto the floor and joining in the old bush dances was greatly appreciated.

The church service was well attended and I believe we were very fortunate to have the Very Rev. O. Dykes, the Dean of Bathurst, officiating. The soloist Mr Ian Gordon of Oberon and Mr Hector Lupp, the organist, of Bathurst, both deserve a special mention and our thanks.


## JENOLAN CAVES SCHOOL

Recent correspondence received by the Society contains the following information.

The Department of Public Works has confirmed that an aerial survey, covering the Jenolan Caves Reserve has been carried out. "An immediate use shall be as an aid to detail (sic) planning of the Caves House Precinct and in assessing the impact of alternative transporation systems within the reserve (including the present vehicular traffic)."

From the State Pollution Control Commission we learn that :" In event of any developments being proposed that could significantly affect the Jenolan Caves environment an environmental impact statement would be prepared. In such cases the Principles and Procedures for Environmental Impact Assessment in New South Wales as outlined in Environmental Standard EI-4 provide for public display of the document should this arise. The views of your society on the proposals would be appreciated and taken into consideration."

## REPORT BY CHAIRMAN OF CENTENARY COMMITTEE

This report will deal mainly with facts and figures of the weeks events during the 10th - 18th February, 1979.

Nature and Historical Walks: Twenty six walks were offered to the public but in most cases there were so few people about that they were not conducted. The three day temperatures of 35-38 degrees C (95-100 degrees F) in the shade certainly had an adverse effect on anyone who was considering the walks.

The weekends did attract more walkers and the general feelings of those who participated was that with more publicity and the knowledge that the walks could be a permanent feature of Jenolan would bring them (with their friends) back to the reserve just "to do the walks".

Total attendances of all walks was twenty eight.

Three Re-enactments of the Imperial Cave Discovery were staged, and always more people wished to buy tickets than could be fitted into the cave.

The evening showings of the Audio/Visual (slides) were very popular and two complete showings were held most nights. Attendances were 236 representing 70% of house occupancy.

## Saturday 17th Happenings

The Children's Treasure Hunt in the Coach House was a real fun event. Over one hundred children took part; watched by about an equal number of adults.

The re-enactment for the benefit of the Official Party and invited guests was a polished performance by all concerned and at the conclusion of the re-discovery our President introduced Mr. Clough M.P., the Local Member of the N.S.W. State Government; who in turn introduced Mr. Ken Booth M.P., the Minister for Tourism who addressed a few remarks to the guests and unveiled a bronze plaque commemorating the discovery. This plaque can be seen in the Imperial Cave at Ridleys Short Cut.

At the conclusion of the unveiling and inspection of the Imperial Cave, afternoon tea was served on the terrace area of the Caves House - apparently to anyone and everyone who cared to join in. There was more than enough for all. The Lithgow City Band entertained us during the afternoon with musical numbers and their efforts were greatly appreciated.

The Dinner in the Dining Room was a grand affair. A large proportion of the guests were in period costume, Circa. 1880. Husbands, wives, boys, girls and even little ones just walking - it was a spectacle of colour and history. The setting in the dining room were in excess of one hundred and eighty and the house was full.

The dance to follow was an unqualified success. An estimate of the attendance is hard to figure as people were coming and going all night, but a "turn-over" of two hundred and fifty could be a realistic one.

The band was popular beyond belief. Because they actually taught people Australian Folk Dancing, the floor was always full of willing and happy students of the art.

## Sunday 18th

Commenced at 9.45 a.m. with a Church Service in the Cathedral Cave attended by one hundred and fifty seven persons. The service was conducted by the Very Rev. Owen Dykes who also composed some alternate words for one hymn referring to "the cave men of Jenolan".

At 2.30 p.m. a climbing and abseiling display was held in the Devils Coach House and it was a very professional display, even if it was "heart-stopping". Again an estimate, and because the Coach House is so very big, it is very hard to be accurate, but three hundred plus spectators is my guess.

The Museum was opened every day of the celebrations by a very lovely lady in a charming old world dress - complete with parasol, she was the most photographed "object de art" lady.

Thanks to everyone who helped to make the time of celebration so successful and making it so easy to run because it all seemed to fall into place so easily. I don't wish to mention any names for special thanks in case I miss some one, but several groups do deserve some recognition.

The Committee; of which I had the honour to be Chairman - they worked many long nights and days and wrote many letters and spent a lot of time on phones making every effort to ensure that it would be a success.

The Volunteers (eleven of them) who were prepared to conduct the Nature/Historical walks and the people who wrote the information sheets so that the conductors of walks would appear to know more than the walkers. I would like to think that a copy of all the information sheets are placed in our archive section for future inclusion in a library.

The Guiding Staff for all the extra things over and above their normal duties.

# NEW HISTORICAL MAP 'ARROWSMITH'S DISCOVERIES IN AUSTRALIA' 1834

We have copies for sale of this latest addition to the Central Mapping Authority's historical series. John Arrowsmith (1790-1873), with his cousins Asron and Samuel, aided his uncle in the construction of his large collection of maps and charts at the Samily business house in Soho Square, London.

After his uncle's death in 1823, John Arrowsmith commenced business on Msown account in Essex Street, Strand but finally succeeded to the head of the house in Soho Square on the death of his cousin Samuel.

His first publication in 1834 was the London Atlas, recognised as the best atlas of its day. This was followed by a long system of elaborate and carefully executed maps embodying the results of contemporary exploration, the maps of Australia, North America, Africa and India being especially valuable.

The map 'Discoveries in Australia' was derived from earlier compilations executed by his uncle and cousins and information obtained from the Dolonial Office. The map was published in 1834 and is a fine example of the development in cartography from this period.

John Arrowsmith was one of the founding fellows of the Royal Geographical Society in 1830 and for many years was a member of its council. In 1863 he received the patrongold medal for the important services he had rendered to geographical science.

# LETTER TO THE EDITOR

At the Society's November meeting, members welcomed two guest speakers: . Dr. R. Kinghorn, who spoke about the fauna of Jenolan and

. Guy Cox, who gave an illustrated talk on the exploration of the Spider Cave.

For the information of all members, for the good of this Society and indeed, for the good of Jenolan itself, I feel that some comment is justified in the light of some of Dr. Kinghorn's comments, the reaction of some persons present, and the aftermath during the business part of the meeting.

Reference was made to the re-aligned pathway in the Devil's Coach House. This was done for public safety. The old line of the path, passed directly below the daylight hole in the roof. In recent years a number of visitors narrowly missed being hit by small rocks and pebbles falling from around the hole. The risk of serious, even fatal, injury is obvious.

Further criticism was made of the upgraded pathway and steps from the Carlotta's Arch to the McKeown's Valley. This pathway was constantly eroded and again presented a safety problem. It should be remembered that the number of visitors to Jenolan in the 1960's and 1970's has been somewhat greater than in the 1920's, 1930's and 1940's. The Carlotta's Arch track is without question the most popular walk here.

People of all ages have a RIGHT to enjoy it, with minimal risk of injury.

Concerning the Caves House to Carlotta's Arch path, the unpaved section does in fact become a quagmire injust weather. I would suggest that the use of sandstone in a limestone area is inappropriate. Further I suggest that concrete IS appropriate, in view of the fact that the basis of concrete is CEMENT and limestone is quarried and processed to produce cement.

However the most disturbing statements made, related to the rock wallabies. Many members will be aware that at one time these delightful creatures inhabited the Grand Archway. However their numbers diminished following the widening of the road in 1964, which effectively removed the natural barrier, Camp Creek.

Hand feeding of the wallables by visitors, often with totally inappropriate food like bread, led to their coming down on to the roadway looking for food.

Dr. Kinghorn repeatedly assured the meeting that his criticisms were not aimed at people resently at Jenolan. Perhaps he is unaware that at least two members of the PRESENT Guiding Staff can still vividly remember having to carry out the task of disposing of wallables killed by traffic.

THE WALLABIES WERE NOT POISONED. SUCH A SUGGESTION IS OUTRAGIOUS.

Concerning the talk given by Guy Cox, I am sure that all people present at the meeting were impressed by the extent and quality of Spider Cave. Clearly it is a most important discovery in view of its proximity to the present show caves.

However I ask one question. Does not the carving of faces in cave muds amount to defacement and if not, what is its scientific value?

In conclusion I would like to echo the sentiments expressed to me since the meeting by a number of members, that this Society can ill-afford the loss of John Culley, who was one of the primemovers in getting the Society established. John's decision to withdraw his active support of this Society is nothing short of a tragedy.

A lot of goodwill was created by the Imperial Cave Centenary Celebrations last year.

We are known to be financially sound.

We are poised to expand our activities, just waiting the go-ahead.

A great many people have made major contributions to the Society's success.

The foolishness of 'biting the hand that feeds you' should be obvious. It would be wise to remember that Jenolan will go on, with or without this Society. The Society's future is doubtful, without the support of the Senior Guide of Jenolan Caves.

One of our members, John Flint, has passed on to our Research Officer, Ron Newbould, two copies of a diary written by a visitor to the Caves in 1883. The author has named the diary, "Guide to and Description of Fish River Caves". This book contains some very graphic descriptions of Jenolan at that time.

The third acquisition was purchased by the Society. A limited edition has been printed of "Census of the Colony of New South Wales - 1828" and we were fortunate to obtain a copy. It is expected that this should be a great aid to tracing names associated with Jenolan's early history.

Additionally, Barbara De Roma, the Department of Tourism's Librarian, has forwarded an early photograph of the guiding staff with the names of the guides.

Many thanks to these people for their interest. We are always keen to acquire historical material relating to Jenolan.

#### ALLADIN CAVE INSPECTION

Due to a number of unforeseen circumstances, some members were unable to participate in the Alladin Cave inspection with the result that only fourteen undertook the trip.

The inspection took place on Saturday, 8th November, 1980. We entered the cave at about 2.00 p.m. and spent over two hours clambering around inside. This was the first "public" showing of the cave since 1947 and as such takes its place in the history of Jenolan.

#### ALLADIN CAVE INSPECTION

If you have spoken to one of the members who undertook the Alladin Cave inspection in November 1980, then you will be among the first to register for this year's inspection.

John Culley, Chief Guide, has again given his approval for this inspection and again it will be held in November, on Saturday 7th. Experienced guiding staff will lead the tour. As this cave has not been developed, there is a need for the members to be reasonably fit or at least supple!

As with the previous inspection, if you are interested in participating, ring either Bill Buckley (76.9287) or David Bryant (48.3991).

#### DE BURGH'S BRIDGE

The Department of Main Roads has recently re-sealed the entrance road to Jenolan from the approach to De Burgh's bridge through the Grand Arch to the Guides' Office.

The original road has been re-sealed on a number of occasions and, apparently, has never been graded back to the original level of the road.

As a result, the appearance of the bridge has changed dramatically. Early photographs show the bridge as a clearly defined bridge with stone walls. The road has now reached a level where the bridge looks more like a causeway.

Although the Department of Main Roads has indicated that next time the road is done they will grade the road back to its original level, the re-sealing will not take place for about fifteen years. This is just not good enough. The Jenolan Reserve and its "improvements" are listed on the National Register and as such the Society feels that State government departments have a responsibility to maintain these features in their original condition.

The Society has written to the Department of Tourism, Department of Main Roads and to the N.S.W. Heritage Council voicing our disappointment at the manner in which the roadworks have been carried out and requesting that action be taken to restore the bridge to its original condition.

When the last trams were removed from the Harbour Bridge lines in 1959, the tram tracks, sleepers, wiring, etc, were removed from the bridge decking to enable the roadway to be laid. The sleepers were put to good use ... they now form the posts of the safety fence. They were probably sawn in half and placed into the ground to the present depth and on some may still be seen the large bolts used to affix the sleepers to the bridge decking; on others, the "dog spikes" used for securing rails to sleepers; and on all, the holes drilled for fixing purposes.

These old sleepers would have been cut and placed on the bridge prior to the opening in 1932 and they still look in good order.

As yet, I haven't been able to confirm when they were placed into position at Jenolan.

### TREASURER'S ANNUAL REPORT

If J.C.H.&P.S. has established any tradition it certainly includes the standard and detail of the Treasurer's Report. The following is an extract from the report ...

"I take pleasure in presenting to this meeting, the Annual Treasurer's Report and Financial Statements for the twelve months ended 31st December, 1980.

# Overall Financial Position

Balance Carried Forward 1/1/81 - \$4564.99 + Value of saleable items in stock - 2481.90 \$7046.89

This represents an increase in the Society's financial position of \$1333.39 over the past year. This compares with an increase of \$1181.53 for the previous 18 months, indicating that we have had a very successful year financially.

Total Revenue was \$3625.47, whilst Total Expenditure was \$2164.78. Value of stock in hand is \$127.30 less than last year.

#### Comments

- 1. Trickett's Maps \$460.50 represents sales of 1,535 maps.

  Since becoming available in August 1979, a
  total of 2,415 maps have been sold at a
  cost of 30c each. Total income from these
  maps is now \$724.50. Outlay has been \$158.00
- 2. Functions Costs for Sausage Sizzle and Colonial Dance totalled \$368.74. Return from these events was \$496.52. Last year's Centenary celebrations costs were further offset by another \$35.60
- 3. Membership 41 single, 34 family and 7 student memberships.

  These include 1981 subscriptions paid in advance and "five year memberships"
- 4. Interest \$1,000 surplus funds in bank account to be transferred. Perhaps we should place some funds in higher interest deposits now available.

The Alladin Cave was discovered in 1897 by F.J. Wilson and the following description has been taken from Trickett's "Guide to the Jenolan Caves", first published in 1899.

"This magnificent cave is situated at the foot of a cliff, 3 chains west of McKeown's Creek, 2 chains southerly from the Glass Cave, and 30 chains north of the Grand Archway. The entrance is about 130 feet above the level of the creek. The main chambers are about 80 feet below the entrance, and are reached by scrambling along a passage for some 150 feet. As in the case of the Elder Cave, it has not been found practicable to make the passages as easy or convenient as those of the other caves which are open to the public; but the descent is perfectly safe and is not difficult for persons of active habit. There are two main chambers. The southern one is about 20ft x 23ft x 30ft and is marvellously beautiful. It contains an infinite variety of fascinating forms of cave embellishment. Sparkling crystal "cascades" and "drapery" formations grace walls dotted throughout with crystals, which twinkle like stars, and when the magnesium light is thrown into some remote corner, crystal spangles 'glitter like broken up moonbeams on the wavelets of a summer sea'.

On one hand are bunches of reddish-tinted coral-like crystals; on another are myriads of diminutive stalactites and groups of larger ones - some reddish, others cream-coloured or snowy-white or translucent. Looking through a fringe of stalactites, which remind one of Nellie's Grotto in the Imperial Cave, is seen a fairy-like grotto. In the foreground are some exceptionally graceful and semi transparent columns, whose beauty is enhanced by the remains of an older column which lie in ruins at their base. Beyond this is a crystal basin with a ripple-marked margin. To the left of this, bunches of reddish-tinted crystals reflect a thousand lights from their many facets. It is not easy to convey any adequate idea of the exquisite beauty of this cave, which must fascinate those who are not easily moved by the results of Nature's handiwork."

### SIX FOOT TRACK WALK

# Sunday, 8th November, 1981

"The track is very steep this way and rather a rough ride; the scenery, however, is magnificent; we come down Mount George, 1,600 feet from summit to valley. The limestone belt containing the caves can be seen in the valley, its peaks and pinnacles looking very grotesque from this road. As we get lower we ride over the Devil's Coach-house, then follow a small track leaving the Carlotta Arch on our left; soon the Grand Arch is in sight, and passing down the hill side we arrive at Cave House.

In passing over the Devil's Coach-house numerous holes and openings may be observed near the bridle-track, some of which are very dangerous. One or two of them are railed round, but there are others without any protecting fences, and if the visitor should wander off the track there is a probability of falling through one of them, and being precipitated a distance of nearly 300 feet.

One of these holes is known as "Rowell's Escape", in consequence of a visitor of that name having fallen in, who would have been dashed to pieces in the Devil's Coach-house below had he not, by some miraculous accident, jammed himself by his knees and back against the sides until he could be pulled out by the keeper and guides.

Should ordinary precautions be taken, however, there is no danger either inside or outside the caves; but it is certainly not advisable for strangers to wander about this locality without a guide as some of these openings are so obscured by trees and other vegetation that they are not noticeable until close upon them."

The foregoing is a description of the Six Foot Track contained in J.J. Foster's "The Jenolan Caves", published in 1890. The track is still clearly defined and in good condition.

#### THE 'MAMMOTH CAVE

It is 100 years ago this year that the Mammoth Cave was discovered. The following description of the cave was written by J.J. Foster and published in 1890.

"The Mammoth Cave is situated about 2½ miles north of the Devil's Coach-house, on the right-hand side of McEwan's Creek, being the only one at present known on this side of the valley. It was discovered in 1882, and is not yet half explored, although fully 10 miles of passages are already known in it.

It is the largest and wildest cave yet discovered ...... At the end of this terrible passage it looks as if we are only now just arriving at a new subterranean world, whose territory is without limit. We are at the beginning of a series of deep and extremely dangerous holes. No matter where we move a yawning abyss confronts us, and from the sound when a stone is thrown down, some appear to be almost bottomless. The stone can be heard striking ledge after ledge, and bouncing from one projection to another for several seconds, until the sound becomes so faint as it dies away that even after it has ceased its downward course we fancy we still hear it falling, lower! lower!!!

...... The already known part of the Mammoth is both extensive, rough and sufficently trying to one's nerves without going any further here, every step being fraught with danger.

It is impossible to describe these various openings and chambers fully without filling a large volume. It may be interesting to know that Mr. Wilson, the keeper, found this part of the cave too much for him; and that after twenty-two years of exploring he was lost in this cave for some time, and was only found after a series of very loud cooeying, his assistant hearing him from another part of the cave went in search of him. This was the only time Mr. Wilson ever lost his bearings in any of these underground labyrinths.

We now turn back, and it is with a sigh of relief that we leave these inexhaustible regions behind us, still holding thousands of unknown marvels and mysteries. Our return from here is trying in the utmost degree, but after a hard struggle we arrive at the mouth of the cave and breathe freely once more. Here we make up our camp fire, boil the "billy", and eat a ravenous meal; visitors will find this a very important part of the day's programme in coming to this cave, as it is quite useless to think of spending a few hours here; it takes a full day to see only a small portion of the Mammoth Cave properly, and a good deal of the time is taken up coming and going ....."

The following is really a collection of the important decisions, resolutions and news to come out of two meetings. The first, the Annual General Meeting of 13th February, 1982:

"At 9.20 p.m. the President declared that all positions were now vacant. The election of office bearers would now commence with voting in of a new President, two Vice Presidents, Secretary, Assist. Secretary, Treasurer, Assist. Treasurer, Membership Secretary, two Curators, Research Officer, seven Committee Members, three Trustees and a Department of Tourism representative.

RESULTS: President: Mr. P. Culley; Vice Presidents: Mr. W. Buckley and Mrs. M. Sullivan; Secretary: Miss C. Sullivan; Assist. Secretary: Mr. P. McGuire; Treasurer's position left open until next meeting due to absence of Mr. D. Hearne; Assist. Treasurer: Mr. E. Holland; Membership Secretary's position left open until next meeting due to absence of Mrs. A. Hearne; Curators: Mr. S. Opper and Mr. K. Oliver; Research Officer: Mr. R. Newbold; Committee: Mr. D. Bryant, Mr. J. Pemble, Mr. B. Richards, Mr. J. Dunkley, Mr. G. Morrison, Mr. S. O'Gorman, Miss Chris Ring; Trustees: Mr. G. Morrison, Mr. W. Heiron and Mr. J. Pemble; Dept, of Tourism Representative: Manager of Caves House.

#### GENERAL BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MEETING:

- Mr. B. Richards suggested the preservation of all old electrical equipment acquired over the years, including material still in caves having any historical significance. The Hydro Station was suggested as a possible display area for this purpose, however, problems associated with security and manning would have to be looked at and discussed at length. Mr. R. Newbold suggested that the matter be put to the Head Guide Mr. J. Culley by Mr. Richard and report the results back to the next meeting.
- Mr. S. Opper expressed concern over the material held by the curators, it was suggested by Mr. Opper that this material should be stored safely and catalogued, Mr. Opper further suggested that photographing all materials might be the most practical and cheapest way of doing this. Mr. B. Richards made an offer of the top section of the Sub-Station as a storage area for these materials because of the warm, de-humidified climate in there.
- Mr. K. Oliver mentioned that a lady from the 'Historical Australia Magazine' visited Jenolan for the purpose of obtaining information for publication on Jenolan. A supplement with Photos has been prepared for the magazine, Mr. J. Dunkley pointed out that this was a commercial magazine and as such the Society should benefit financially as the photos were loaned by the Society. Mr. Dunkley also said he could see no point in the Society making a subscription to the magazine because of the 'glut' of magazines of this type, Mr. D. Bryant suggested that the photos used in the magazine should clearly mention that the Society donated the photos."

The second meeting held on 14th August, 1982:

"MEMBERSHIP SECRETARY'S REPORT: Mr. D. Hearn (in the absence of Mrs. A. Hearne), reported that there were currently 132 members, 5 new members joining since the last meeting.

It was reported to the meeting that Mr. W. Rooney had retired as Manager of Caves House and the Reserve. The position had been filled by Mr. G. Dube, who had taken up the appointment a few days previously. He attended the meeting and was introduced to the members.

- Mr. R. Newbold expressed concern over the lack of access to the Society's archives. (At present, moves are being made to have something done about this).
- Mr. P. McGuire suggested that in order for the Society to make known its objectives to the new Department, personal representation would be far better than sending a letter.
- Mr. B. Dube said that Mr. K. Brown would be the person to see at the Department concerning the Society's objectives.
- Mr. G. Dube also suggested obtaining proper storage facilities used for archive material, e.g. archive storage boxes.
- Mr. N. Jones asked 'Why don't the guides mention the Society more during tours of the Caves?' Mr. S. Opper replied that the guides used to, *BUT*, enthusiasm had waned for the Society and its purpose and that this may have had an effect. (Obviously, this is what this very meeting was all about!)

#### THE NEW POSSIBLE OBJECTIVES:

Mr. R. Guy proposed that these possible objectives be published in the next issue of the newsletter. Sec. Mr. K. Oliver. (The reason for this proposal was to attempt to get some 'feed back' from you – the members. Ed.)

The New Possible Objectives put forward at the Committee Meeting earlier in the day were put to the General Meeting.

- 1. Erection and Funding of new museum. The meeting agreed that a fresh approach to this goal should be made when meeting to discuss the Society's objectives with the new Department.
- , 2. Visual displays around Jenolan of Historical significance. This was met with approval, however, the impact of these displays in the area would have to be carefully considered.
- 3. Restoration of the 'Leffel Wheel', i.e. first means of power generation at Jenolan.' This was met with 'quiet' interest but would be looked into further.
- 4. Guidelines for future planning of Jenolan, Society to be more involved.
- 5. Flow of letters to the Department on a regular basis.
- 6. Closer liaison with Heritage Council and other historical institutions.
- 7. Expansion of the Newsletter. This was met with unanimous agreement.
- 8. Planning for the Sesqui-Centennary Celebrations Society's involvement.
- -9. Dark Room facility access to the old 'Graph Building'.
- 10. More caving trips and bushwalks throughout the year,
- 11. Photographic display (rotating on regular basis) at Ticket Box.
- 12. Closer involvement with those groups or persons who wish to prepare material on Jenolan in order to keep information as correct as possible.
- -13. Establishing archives in the correct way, possibly with the help of other historical societies to show us how this is done effectively. Mr. S. Opper moved a motion that this be investigated. Sec. Mr. R. Newbold.

A motion was carried increasing the Museum Attendants Fee — Will be increased to \$20,00 per day. Hours 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. NO Lunch Break to be taken. This is a job for anyone in the Society over the age of 16 years. A most pleasant and satisfying task.

We hope to publish letters and articles — extracts from books — anything which is related to Jenolan Caves and its history; about the Caves — the Reserve — the people of the area and the people who visit the area.

The first of these is entitled "The First Ten Years — Where to Now?" A Letter to the Editor by Phil McGuire, our Secretary and Casual Guide.

#### THE FIRST TEN YEARS - WHERE TO NOW?

Since the first meeting held on the 6th July, 1972, the Jenolan Caves Historical and Preservation has seen some amazing changes, both to Jenolan and the Society itself.

Formed originally to foster the accurate cataloguing of Jenolan's history together with the preservation of the caves and surrounding Reserve, J.C.H.A.P.S. achievements have often extended beyond these two criteria.

The first major achievement for the Society was the re-erection of the old Post Office. Built in 1898, this quaint little building, originally located next to the Souvenir Shop, was dismantled in 1973 to make way for the present Post Office and shelter area.

Many people, who had been visiting Jenolan for years, together with the Guiding Staff and Management, agreed that it was a very sad day indeed, Jenolan had lost some of its charm, some of its history.

In 1973, J.C.H.A.P.S, met to discuss plans for the re-erection of this building and its conversion into a temporary museum, J.C.H.A.P.S, was very fortunate in obtaining approval for this and even more fortunate when the Department of Public Works agreed to carry out this work.

Some time would have to elapse before the Society was in a position to afford better accommodation for a museum. Today, the little Post Office still serves as a museum at Jenolan, boasting a fine collection of historical photographs, books and artifacts with a new building still a little way off yet.

Those early days saw too the first major social event for J.C.H.A.P.S. In 1973, the first 'Smoke Concert' since 1896, was held in the Grand Arch. What's a Smoke Concert? Well, prior to the road reaching and passing through the Grand Arch, dancing and singing were often the order of the night down in that magnificent setting. Jeremiah Wilson, Keeper of the Caves 1867-1896, had a dance floor put into the Arch and the scene, complete with camp fires and music was relived again some 75 years later.

Smoke Concerts were held usually on the October long weekend and again on the Australia Day weekend and were a regular event for a few years. Unfortunately, as a result of certain circumstances, Smoke Concerts ceased. However, who knows, one day music and smoke may again billow from the Grand Arch.

A few members, back in that early period of the Society's development, contributed with their historical knowledge of Jenolan. These members, mostly from the guiding staff, put pen to paper on certain aspects concerning Jenolan and produced what are now referred to as 'Occasional Papers' These include subjects like 'The Steam Cleaning of The Orient Cave' – 'Discovery of Imperial Cave' and a number of others. It is hoped that a few more might be produced soon.

Apart from these items of literature, certain maps have been reproduced including a map of the show caves prepared originally by Mr. Oliver S. Trickett, Jenolan's best remembered surveyor,

Other achievements of the Society include:

- (a) Removal of the coloured paint from inside of the Devil's Coachhouse. This paint was originally put in over certain areas during the 1950's for the filming of the movie 'Treasure Island'. It was supposed to disappear. However, it was only hard and sometimes dangerous work by Society members, led by the Head Guide, Mr. J. Culley, that made it disappear.
- (b) The years have also produced a vast collection of historical artifacts which, very shortly, will be properly catalogued.
- (c) 1979 saw the establishing of an annual Colonial Dance. These are usually held in November and have, so far, proved a tremendous success.
- (d) 1979 also saw recognition of the Society by the then Department of Tourism at the Centenary Celebration of the discovery of the Imperial Cave by Jeremiah Wilson in 1879. The Department's participation in the events was an invaluable one with the highlight having been the re-enactment of Mr. Wilson's descent into the cave and subsequent unveiling of a plaque in the cave by the Hon. Ken Booth, the then Minister of Tourism. This event took place on the 17th February, 1979.
- (e) Bushwalks and Caving trips, led by dedicated members of the Society, first took off with tremendous success during the Centenary Celebrations and have been maintained as often as is possible throughout the year. It is hoped that these types of activities will increase.
- (f) Today the society can boast a healthy bank balance and a membership in excess of 120 persons.

"Where to Now?" - I draw your attention to the list of "New Possible Objectives" - This was

drawn up to promote a fresh approach for the Society's future. Now, here is your opportunity as a member to contribute to that future.

The Society will not survive without your participation and active involvement.

#### THE JENOLAN CAVES - IN THE BLUE MOUNTAINS, AUSTRALIA

Translated from "Les Grottes de Jenolan dans les Montagnes Bleues," par M. Albert Tissandier Spelunca, Bulletin de la Societe de Speleologie, No. 1, January-March, 1895, pp. 50-56.

Translator's Note: Wherever possible, the original text has been translated literally, so that the poetic delights of French prose are retained. Occasional licence has been taken where necessary to clarify obscure phrases. Appropriate discretion has been used in selecting the most appropriate alternative where several meanings are evident. Units of measurement are as in the original.

"When the traveller has reached the Australian continent, he feels deceived when gazing on the scenery which unfolds before his eyes during the long hours of train travel from one place to another. From Brisbane, capital of Queensland, down to Sydney in New South Wales, with some rare exceptions the panorama is monotonous and of little beauty. Always there are boundless plains or eucalyptus-covered ground. It's all the same, from Sydney to Melbourne, capital of the colony of Victoria, and round to Adelaide, in South Australia.

In Sydney, a city whose characteristics are exactly those of an American city, one is happy to learn that some truly picturesque places can be visited closed at hand; these are the Blue Mountains, which can be reached by rail in four hours. They are one of the greatest attractions of the Australian colony of New South Wales and are considered locally to be the equal of a new Switzerland or Pyrenees. They should not be compared to these superb European mountains, but they are possessed of some true geological marvels, which can be counted among the most celebrated in the whole world.

These are the Jenolan Caves, stalactite-filled grottos discovered by Mr. James Whalan in 1841,

during a pursuit with his mounted police to take Ewan (sic), the famous bushranger who was terrorising the countryside. The caves remained almost unknown to the public 1868, the time when the government of New South Wales placed the Blue Mountains in public domain, Mr. Jeremiah Wilson, a geologist already known by his remarkable work, was placed in charge of preparing the caves and was appointed caretaker.

The limestones which make up the mountains of this area are rich in fossil shells. They also contain some gold, silver and lead.

The caves and the Blue Mountains soon arouse curiosity; their reputation grows day by day. All the picturesque places, close to which there are comfortable hotels, are now travelled over in summer by Australian tourists, They come to pick flowers and gather the magnificent ferns which abound at the bottoms of narrow gorges. Families spend whole days in these places, worthy abodes of the fairies, and gather to have pleasant picnics. To meet their needs, they even find the most beautiful spots near pretty waterfalls, some chairs and tables, even a rough fireplace put in the right spot in the rocks by official Blue Mountains men, who go looking for dead wood in the forest, making the few wild kangaroos bound away before them. These gracious animals are respected in this area, where strict laws protect them. The most renowned countryside of the Blue Mountains is near Blackheath; the great fall of Govett's Leap which, falling over a sheer wall of almost 160 metres, loses itself in a pretty valley enclosed by beautiful vertical crags, the magnificent Wentworth Falls forming different stages, those of Katoomba and finally the neighbourhood of Mt, Victoria, can be counted among the most interesting points of this attractive area. The highest points of the Blue Mountains are about 1200 metres above sea level; they make up a sort of plateau with a monotonous outlook. Surrounded on all sides by precipices and high walls, they seem to spring up from the depths of the narrow valleys or deep gorges, a glimpse of which is very rewarding. The stony masses of the heights, always formed of layers of sandstone, as at Mt. Victoria for example, are covered by poorly developed eucalypts with few leaves, whereas the bottoms of ravines are hidden beneath luxuriant vegetation of tree ferns and lofty trees the roots of which, watered by cool streams, disappear beneath the moss.

Jenolan Caves are found not far from the modern little town of Katoomba, at an altitude of 1018 metres, 66 miles from Sydney, the parts so far explored beneath the mountain vary between about 182 and 365 metres in an almost horizontal direction. In depth they go down close to 280 metres. In the undergrown grottos the temperature never varies despite the seasons of the year; it never goes below 10°C, nor above 18°C. The grottos of Lucas Cave alone, discovered in 1860, are a little warmer as a result of the absence of air currents and perhaps also on account of the influence of a small undergrown stream found there. As well, it possesses an interesting stalagmite more than nine metres in circumference. One of its rooms is nearly 50 metres high (the Cathedral). The most curious of all these caves are those which can be viewed in daylight. There are two of these, which are truly of remarkable beauty. The first, the Grand Arch, the floor of which is 745 metres above sea level, is a kind of huge tunnel through which runs a pretty stream named Camp Creek. In former times, before the hotel was built, travellers stopped in this cave to pass the night. They found shelter there.

Mr. E. Holland reported to the meeting the results of his enquiries with regard to the Leffel Wheel Restoration. He approached Wallerawang Power Station and was informed by the Apprentice Master that it would be a suitable project for the apprentices. However, it would require an allocation of money from the appropriate Government Department. We hope a decision will be made in the near future.

The following is an Extract from page 37 of "Romance of Jenolan" by Ward L. Havard. Read before the Royal Australian Historical Society, November 28, 1933.

In 1884, arrangements were made with Cracknell for installing electric light in parts of the caves, so that objects might be seen to greater advantage and the formations preserved from discolouration by smoke from candles then in use. The lighting of the Imperial Cave was finished in January, 1887. A six horse-power vertical steam engine in the Grand Arch drove the "electric-dynamo-machine" capable of lighting twenty-five incandescent lamps arranged in circuits of that number. When the question of extension arose, the existing power being inadequate, a Leffel (turbine) wheel capable of working to fifteen horse-power was erected in 1889-1890 at the foot of the first waterfall below the Grand Arch. Water was delivered to the wheel through six hundred and seventy feet of wrought iron piping from a small dam near the present bridge. The wheel ran a new one hundred-light Crompton dynamo, to which it was connected direct by belting. The Imperial Cave lights were then steadier and more brilliant that they had been with the steam engine.

In 1893, in order to light the Lucas Cave with electricity, a new dynamo and six arc lamps and fittings were procured from the Western Electric Company, Chicago. The Leffel wheel was removed to a position from which it could operate both dynamos. The work of lighting the Lucas Cave was finished in June—July, 1894. The arc lamps were suspended in the principal chambers, and there were about seventy passage lamps. After running successfully for over thirteen years, the Leffel wheel was still in use, after repairs, in 1904.

13/11/83 Sunday Morning — Bushwalk down the historically important Six Foot track. We will be walking the last 2 miles only.

Notes on the "Six Foot" — The bridle track from Katoomba to the caves is the shortest and by far the wildest and most picturesque. It was defined by Mr. W. M. Cooper over a period of 10 days during March — April 1884, offering employment to some 75 men who worked on it during a time of economic recession. It cost over 2000 pounds (\$4,000,00) but it was (and still is) only fit for horses or walking.

#### **CAVES INSPECTIONS**

The postmistress used to sell the cave tickets. I think she got free accommodation for doing that; for running the post office she was paid by the PMG. She had a little ticket window in the post office where she would sell the tickets an hour before the inspections. Her name was Miss Welsh.

The inspections used to go in at 10 o'clock and 2 o'clock. Outside the ticket office they used to have a sign fike a railway station sign. The cave names were written on enamelled sheets beside the guide's number. Each guide had his own number but Mr. Bradley had a star, so he was known as the 'Star Guide'. If you liked a particular guide you would watch out for the cave he was taking.

People used to say "Don't go in with number two, he's awful". And he knew it. "Look", he said to me, "if they're interested, I am. If they're not interested I'll get them out as quick as they like". The trouble was that you could get a couple of people who were interested in geology and would want to know all about the strata and so on. The other people would say "What have they slipped him? — What have they given him?". But number two was all right; I went in with him a few times. It's like everything else; the public are hard to please.

May, 1983

The visitors would all assemble down in the Grand Arch at 10 o'clock or 2 o'clock. But later they started to leave one guide outside in the mornings, to pick up stragglers. People would arrive at half past ten and would not wait till the afternoon to see the caves.

The porters at the house were casual guides. I remember one of them, Arthur Perkins, who was there for thirty years and died a wealthy man with property in Wollongong. I often saw Arthur running down from the house with his uniform on, to take a special inspection. In those days if you had a party of four or five, and were prepared to pay an extra pound, they would put a special guide on.

#### **GENERAL MEETING:**

The meeting was held on 28th May 1983 in the Television Room of Jenolan Caves House. . There were 16 people present. The following reports were offered to the meeting:

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

The President reported that the restoration of the Leffel Wheel would not be done by the apprentices of Wallerawang Power Station. (Can you help us with any suggestions? Ed.) He also passed around-a portfolio of black and white drawings. These drawings were of Jenolan and were presented to the Society by the artist, Mrs. Short.

#### **CURATORS' REPORT:**

The Curators reported that as the original catalogue of the Societies belongings has been misplaced they have started the process again.

#### MEMBERSHIP REPORT:

The Society now has a membership of 120.

We welcome — Mrs. F. L. Horne, Mrs. J. Pucci and sons, Mr. M. Girling and Mr. R. P. Stubbs and hope they, and the Society, benefit from their Membership.

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The following matters were also discussed:

- The social night held in Sydney on April 11, 1983 was a great success. The 36 people who
  attended were shown a tape and slide presentation, a display of artifacts from the Society's
  Museum Collection and a delightful supper. Thanks are extended to all involved.
- The price of the Trickett Historical Map was raised from 30 cents to 50 cents, as this was felt to be a truer reflection of their worth, although they're still a bargain buy.
- Members endorsed a move by Steve Opper, to have a plaque placed at the entrance to a high level area of Barralong Cave, the plaque would serve to inform cavers of the fragility of the cave past the plaque. It would also explain that a photographic record of the area thad been made and of the necessity not to proceed into this area, if this section of the cave were to be properly conserved (Conserved for what? Ed.)

The next meeting of the Society will be on August 15th, 1983. This is a Monday evening with a change of venue. The venue will be the Masonic Hall, 44 Beresford Road, Strathfield. The meeting starts at 8,00 p.m. (A plate of goodies for supper would be appreciated, Ed.)

#### **NETTLE AND ARCH CAVES**

#### **LOCATION AND HISTORY:**

The Nettle and Arch Caves are located in the upper, southern region of the Devil's Coachhouse, an old wooden ladder which connects the two caves is clearly visible to visitors walking through the Coachhouse. Both caves are very near to the Imperial and Chifley Caves and the latter has a direct connection with the Nettle Cave through the Sculptor's Studio and Architect's Studio. Entrance is presently gained to the Nettle and Arch Caves by descending a new stairway through Carlotta's Arch into the Arch Cave, although the original visitors' entrance was into the Nettle Cave via a set of stairs, which ascended from the eastern side of the Grand Arch.

The early history of the caves is poorly documented although it is probable that Charles Whalan discovered the caves in the early 1840's. The Nettle and Arch Caves were both tourist caves until 1932, and between the time of their discovery and closure considerable damage was inflicted on them by visitors. Little use has been made of the caves since 1932.

#### RECENT PROPOSALS:

For several years now it has been mooted that the Nettle and Arch Caves would be re-opened for public inspection. The first step in this direction was the construction of a new public access path from the Carlotta's Arch lookdown. The type of tour to be developed within the caves has not been finalized, although discussion has centred on the possibility of a self guided tour, similar to those developed in other cave systems.

To date little work has been carried out within the Nettle and Arch Caves, so that the form of development is still in the planning stages. Some work has been completed. A topographic survey of the caves has been carried out by Keith Oliver and Alex Opper and the geological 'resources' of the cave thereby defined. However no survey has been conducted of other resources within the cave.

During an incidental inspection of the caves in 1982 it was observed that the Nettle and Arch Caves would present to the cave visitor a wealth of material which reflected both the social and to a greater extent, the biological history of the caves.

The social attitudes of a past generation of visitors to the caves are reflected in a curious way in the damage present in the cave, e.g. the destruction of cave decoration and signatures on the caves' walls, and highlight the marked change in social consciousness over the past one hundred and fifty years.

Throughout the Nettle and Arch Caves the visitor also encounters signs of past faunal occupation which also tell a story. In February 1983, a survey was conducted to record the extent of the biological resources which included bone deposits, large areas of floor space covered with bat guano and signs of owl feeding. The aim of this survey was to inventory the biological resources within the cave so that these might be taken into account in the development of the caves.

The results of the survey will be reported in detail at a later meeting of the Society,

#### **QUESTION AND ANSWERS:**

THE ANSWERS -

The question posed in the last Newsletter was "How did the 'Shambles' get such a name?"

The word 'Shambles' means — a slaughter-house; also a meat market. In the city of York in England is a narrow street containing numerous butcher shops and the section of the Chifley Cave was apparently named after the narrow street in York — OR — as an alternative meaning, a place of great destruction and disorder. We would suggest the first explanation is the most likely as most of the visitors and cave guide(s) would be migrants from the U.K. or first generation Australians of United Kingdom parents.

Our par inviting questions on Jenolan Caves and the history of the area brought a very quick response from a member who asked three questions which we have investigated by reading old papers and by asking the senior staff at the Caves for help.

(1) "What is the history of the 'Grecian Bend' and how did it get its name?"

It is a small cave branching off to the right of the pathway of the Imperial Cave about 15 metres before the Bone Display at the sink-hole. It is a short passage leading down some steps and then a steeply graded dirt path about 10 metres long to a single small chamber, sparsely decorated in the higher section (maybe 4 metres to the roof) but with a nice pool deposit on

the left side of the floor. It would have been shown in earlier times when parties were much smaller in number — it can only accommodate 10-15 persons at one time.

The name — to quote a very large dictionary — "Grecian Bend  $^1$  an affected posture — fashionable among women of the 19th Century — in which the body inclined forward from the hips"  $^{\prime\prime}{}^2$  — A bustle." In the chamber there is a pillar with a bulge on one side — undoubtedly the cave was named after this formation which does look like the torso of a woman wearing a bustle

(2) "What is known of the 'Lily of the Valley'?"

It's a small low passage — dirt floor leading ahead when the Jubilee Cave pathway starts up the flight of steps to the right towards Cooks Cavern. The 'Lity of the Valley' section has never been developed to any extend — no lights — no hand rails or protective wiring have been installed. It would have been a very limited party inspecting a rather dull passageway, probably named after a small cluster of white helectites which could be likened to the small flower known as the Lily of the Valley.

(3) "How did 'Wray's Fernery' get its name and where has it gone?"

Despite many hours of research and questioning your reporters can find no reference to a 'Wray's Fernery'. However there is a small beautifully decorated little crystal formation known as 'The Fernery', just past the 'duck under' of the Jubilee Left Branch at the beginning of the ascent to the Alabaster Hall.

Thanks to N.M. for those interesting questions. We will do all that is possible to answer questions put by our members.

"CAVES INSPECTION" (Cont'd from last Newsletter)

#### SOME OLD FASHIONED SERVICE

When we got out of the bus two porters would run out and take our luggage into the vestibule. You would go up to the reception desk which was where the lift is now — the old lift used to face the stairway. You would be given a card with your room number — there were no keys in those days. The porter would pick up your bags, get in the lift with you, tell you the inspection times and times for meals, and put your bags in the room.

At night time, when you were having your dinner, the housemaid would come back on duty. She would take the quilt off the bed, fold the bedclothes back, and if your night clothes were handy she would put them out for you. Then when you went to bed you would put your shoes outside the door and they were cleaned for you.

In those days, there was a man on duty all night. At the top of every stairway there was a

phone, so that if there was any emergency you could call down to the night porters. That night porter also used to clean the ballroom and the lounge and other places.

When you were going the porters would be given a list of the people who were leaving on the bus. He would get the bags and take them down. You would leave at about four o'clock, or half past, have afternoon tea on Mount Victoria railway station and get back to Sydney at about nine or ten o'clock.

#### MR. FIRBANK

When a guide was listed for a cave but nobody had brought tickets he would have to go and do other work; this was called having a 'skinner'. Often, when I was in the Grand Arch I would meet a guide who had a skinner. Mr. Firbank, who was number one, asked me one day if I would like to go for a walk with him. I said "Yes, where are you going?" He said "I'm going to the Lucas, i've got to pick up some rubbish." So I went with him, the back way; we could not go the front way because there was a party in there.

#### BERT BECKMANN

The same thing happened with Bert Beckmann. He met me and asked me what I was doing. He said "Come for a walk?" So I went into the Temple of Baal with him.

The guides could tell you more, with only you there, than they could with a party. We used to sit down and have a talk, to fill in the time. On the day I went in with Bert we were looking up at the formation called Baal and I said to Bert "who puts the light up there when it goes off?" He said "I do". He used to climb up a set of spikes in the wall and there was nothing else to hang on to. I asked him if he didn't get nervous. "No", he said, "but when your foot starts to slip a bit your tummy goes all over".

In those days they had naked switches for the lights in the caves. Some guides would use a bit of rubber to move the switches, some would use their hats, others would use their handkerchiefs, but Bert didn't use anything. I watched him and the sparks would go flying. "Don't you get a shock?" I asked. "No", he said, "watch; my hands are dry".

Bert lived on his own in one of those little huts on the side of the hili above the boiler house. One day he invited me to go up and have a look at the wireless set that he had made himself. He turned it on and it gave a beautiful sound. It was loud and it could also get Western Australia — in those days that was some feat. But it had no cover; it just lay flat on a piece of packing case. I asked him why he didn't make a cabinet for it. "Got no wood." So I told him that I would send some up to him. I got the timber that I thought he would need and arranged with the people in the tourist bureau to have it sent up to him. The next time I was there Bert thanked me and said "I want you to have a look at the tail of my shirt". This puzzled me so I went up to his hut and saw that he had made a lovely cabinet. And there, where they used to put a piece of silk over the speaker, was the tail of Bert's shirt, washed and ironed.

Bert was guide number five and I think that he was the most versatile man they ever had. There was nothing went wrong in Jenolan that he didn't fix. If the possums were electrocuted he would be up there to get them down. If anything went wrong in the kitchen it was "get Bert!"

When the punt used to sink in the River Cave, Bert used to dive down, with no clothes on and put the chain underneath. He said it was too cold to have a costume on. One day he was diving to put the chain under when he heard the footsteps of a party coming through with a number two guide, Archie Taite. Archie was always up to some devilment and this time he had a party of girls. There was no place where Bert could get out and hide because there was just the path in and the path out. So all he could do was swim under the little bridge. He told me that he got hold of the bridge with his hands and threw his body up under it. Bert was shivering like one thing and in comes Archie with the girls. He saw Bert there and stood the girls right over him. "Look girls, it's (so many) feet deep and it's flowing slowly ..." He kept on talking. The manager and the engineer were there, so finally the manager said "Come on there, move on please, move on". That story was told to me by both parties.

#### THE WISHING POOL

In the Right Imperial Cave there was a wishing pool down at the underground river. People used to throw money in there and the guides used to have to go in and get it out, I asked Mr. Bradley if I could go and help and he said yes, I used to run back to the guides' office and get anything they wanted. While I was there one time a party came through but when the guide said "come on, let's go out" one of the fellows stayed back. The guide asked him to go up and the chap pointed at me and said "if he can stop here, why can't I?" But the guide said "he's one of us".

To get the money out we would put planks across the water. We would lean across the planks and use tins with holes in them to scoop the money out onto the plank. The water was so cold that you might be able to pick up a two bob in your hand, but you couldn't manage a sixpence or a threepence because your fingers were too numb. One day the guide I was helping took off and went into the water to get the money we couldn't reach. He was in there about two minutes and when he came out he had to run up and down the stairs getting the circulation back. We got two buckets of money out that day.

One day the guide was telling the party down there how the money went to the hospitals in Bathurst, Lithgow and Katoomba when one chap asked if people's wishes came true. A little voice said "mine did". The guide asked "if it's not too personal, madam, what was your wish?" She said "I'm on my honeymoon now."

#### RADIO 2GB's TOURS TO JENOLAN

In the 1930's, about once a year, 2GB used to have a tour to Jenolan. This would be announced over the air, and people could contact the station to join in. They would go up on Friday and stay till Monday. With them would go the radio personalities, 'Uncle George', 'Uncle Frank',

Wally Baines from the Tourist Bureau (a comedian who used to be on the radio), 'Bimbo', Mr. Steltzer and 'Auntie Val' who used to run the Bluebirds' League over the radio.

It was generally in May when they went, and we were up there at the same time on a couple of occasions. On Mother's Day Uncle Frank would go round the breakfast tables and give each mother, whether she was in his party or not, a Mother's Day poem.

On Saturday night we would have a first class concert. They had a couple of New Zealanders, Reg Morgan and Albert Russell, a good planist and a good singer.

Uncle Frank used to have a radio Sunday school. When he was up there on Sundays he would conduct the Sunday school from the Cathedral Cave. This time he had Reg Morgan and Albert Russell. They took a collapsible organ in; it would fold up just like a portmanteau so it could be carried. They also had Eileen Boyd, the famous singer. The Lithgow Brass Band were there and they played 'Nearer my God to Thee'; that was beautiful. One of the New Zealanders (I forget which) sang 'The Stranger of Galilee'.

Bert Beckmann told me that he took his wireless into the Temple of Baal and picked up the broadcast in there. So it went all the way by landline from the Cathedral Cave down to Homebush and back over the air to the Temple of Baal.

On Monday morning, before they left, the party would go up McKeown's Creek to the area where the wallaby enclosure is now. There they would have sports, races for the children, skipping for the girls; and they would give souvenir presents to the winners.

#### **GENERAL MEETING:**

Report on Meeting held on Monday, 15th August, 1983. The meeting was held in Sydney for the first time. The President, David Hearn chaired the meet, and there were 21 Society Members present.

- Colonial Dance The Society was granted permission to hold the dance in the Ballroom
  of Caves House on 24th September. See reports elsewhere in this newsletter.
- Barrolong Plaque Steve Opper reported that the Senior Guide, John Cully, had granted permission for the plaque to be placed in the high level area of Barrolong Cave. (For further details see August Newsletter).
- Curators' Report The report was received from Steve Opper who noted that during recent upgrading of the sewerage line at Jenolan, workers had discovered the original sewerage works. Steve said that this discovery was now being documented.
- Membership Report Membership of the Society is now 123. The Society welcomes two new members, JACKIE KATZ and FRANK WHETTAM.

Also please note some members are un-financial. If you are one of these, please rectify this situation quickly.

- Memoirs of the Late Dr. Roy Kinghorn These were tabled for inspection by the members present. They had been obtained by Mr. Heiron, for the Society. David Hearn noted that the material contained considerable information on the Flora and Fauna of the Caves area.
- The Old Bridge Bill Buckley pointed out that the old bridge on the eastern side of the Grand Arch, built in 1896 was originally built for horse travel. However, he said that due to continual upgrading of the road into Jenolan, the bridge deck now had a cover of 50 cm of bitumen which altered its character considerably. David Hearn agreed to seek some indication of the ownership of the bridge and its current listing by the Heritage Commission with a view to having the bridge restored to its original form.

The following are excerpts from Department of Mines' Reports between 1888 and 1895. They were obtained for us by S. McLean.

# 1888 - JENOLAN CAVES

Number of visitors 1,829, being an increase on the number for the previous year. A new accommodation house, capable of accommodating about thirty visitors, has been completed, yet during the summer months both this and the old house are occasionally uncomfortably crowded. On this account the erection of another building will soon become a matter of necessity. The owner of the existing buildings and lessee of the ground, Mr. J. Wilson, cave-keeper, has notified his intention of carrying out this work at an early date.

Great improvements have been carried out at these caves in the way of making the outside surroundings attractive to visitors. Plantations and walks have been tastefully laid out and suitable trees, shrubs, and flowers planted. Altogether, it is intended to make the cave surroundings as attractive and pleasing to the eye as possible, in order that visitors, when not engaged exploring the caves, will be able to pass their time pleasantly in viewing the scenery and vegetation around. The improvements at the bathing-hole have been greatly appreciated, and consequently taken advantage of by the visitors. Everything that can be done up to the present in the way of improving the interior of the caves has been carried out. The result is that access to the different caves is now comparatively easy and cases of accident very rare. It is intended to put up a cottage for the engine-driver and new stables during the current year; and also to complete the erection of turbine on the creek, for driving the electric light, in place of the present engine, which work has been unavoidably held over on account of more urgent and necessary works having been carried out in the meantime which exhausted the available funds.

## 1889 – JENOLAN CAVES

Number of visitors, 1,657, a slight decrease, as compared with the previous year, which may perhaps be accounted for by the number of people attracted to two of the other colonies by their respective exhibitions. The district people visiting these caves form a very small minority, whereas at most of the other caves they make up the greater bulk of the visitors. The most

important of the improvements carried out here is the erection of Turbine for driving the Electric Light. The work has been well executed, and a most satisfactory trial as to its power has been made. The turbine will replace the steam-engine at present in use and its motive-power being water a large saving annually in the cost of firewood, etc. will result. A new 100-light dynamo has been placed in position, which will, without delay, be connected to the existing lamps of the Imperial cave, and at an early date extended to a system of lamps intended for the Lucas and Easter caves. Thus by the new arrangement provision will be made for lighting by electricity a space three times larger than at present, and at a greatly reduced cost. The other improvements comprise the erection of a cottage for the engine driver, also the building of new stables, now in course of progress, and minor improvements in and about the caves. Tenders have been received for the building of a new dam on creek, capable of storing three months' supply of water for the Accommodation House, etc.

#### 1890 - JENOLAN CAVES

Number of visitors, 1,467. The erection of turbine for driving the electric light, referred to in my last progress report as being then in course of progress, was completed, and now drives, in place of the old steam-engine, the new dynamo, which is connected to the electric light wires of the Imperial Cave. The machinery was thoroughly tested in every respect, the dynamo being run up to the necessary speed, viz. 1,250 revolutions per minute, the turbine meanwhile passing less than half the available water, or exerting a force of about five-horse power, equal to lighting fifty lamps. Different circuits of lamps in the caves, with the light on, were then tested, and the lights were found to be far more brilliant and steady than had previously been the case. The turbine has now been in use for some time as the motive power for lighting the Imperial Cave. It was found by actual test that the turbine is capable of lighting over 100 lamps with the full supply of water turned on, although it is not intended to place over fifty, or, at the most, seventy-five lamps in one circuit, which arrangement will at all times ensure a brilliant light. In the Imperial Cave twenty-five lamps comprise a circuit.

During the year a new dam has been constructed across Camp Creek, with a storage capacity equal to three months' supply for the accommodation buildings. A three-inch main will be laid from the dam, with all the necessary connections for a proper water supply, and a hydrant fixed for use in case of fire.

The heavy rains in March last did considerable damage to the roads and creek embankments in the vicinity of the caves, most of which damage has been repaired, and the roads put in good order again. The new stable, capable of accommodating twelve horses, has been completed, and tenders invited for another six-horse stable for the exclusive use of the line of coach horses. Other general improvements have been carried out in and about the caves. A new system has been introduced at these and the other caves in respect of the sale of magnesium wire which, it is thought, will prove more satisfactory to visitors.

#### 1891 - JENOLAN CAVES

Number of visitor 1,575. The most extensive operations as regards improvements have been carried out in connection with the Jersey Cave. On account of the circuitous and intricate nature of the passage by means of which this cave was first entered, no small amount of scheming and labour was required before the present passage, giving free access to the cave was cut through

the immense solid boulders, piled up and wedged together in such a manner that to remove one would apparently cause a general displacement. The cave itself has been protected by standards and wire netting erected on either side of the track. Other improvements has been effected in the Imperial and Lucas Caves. Old wooden staircases have been replaced where necessary with iron ones and extra guard rails erected. The Cave House surroundings have been vastly improved by the removal of some old wooden buildings which formerly did duty as a stable and buggy shed, the land thus occupied having been added to the plantations.

#### 1892 - JENOLAN CAVES

Number of visitors 1,540. Most necessary improvements have been carried out in the Imperial Cave, Right Branch, which include the cutting of a track 4 feet deep, through gravel drift and stalagmitic flooring, from the "Vestry" to the "Lily of the Valley", now accessible to visitors, The erection of new guard-rails and netting at the "Alabaster Column", and "Mysteries". The replacing of old and light standards and netting by stronger material where necessary, and the building of twenty-four concrete steps. The improvements in the Wilkinson Cave have been completed, which include forty-two concrete steps, and the erect of hand-rail and netting throughout. The track to the Nettle and Arch Caves has been made good by building eightyfour concrete steps, and erecting an iron hand-rail alongside of same. A guard-rail has also been placed at the "Lookout" in the Nettle Cave. Twelve new steps have been built at the entrance to the Elder Cave, and the gate of same rebuilt in rubble masonry. On the 6th of April, Mr. F. J. Wilson, Assistant Keeper, reported the discovery of a passage leading from the Grand Arch to the Lucas Cave, which was inspected and approval obtained for having same opened up as an additional entrance to the Lucas Cave, It is intended to proceed with this work when the more urgent works, now in course of progress in the Imperial Cave, are compieted.

#### 1895 - JENOLAN CAVES

Number of visitors, 988. A number of visitors who did not take quarters at "Cave House". omitted to sign the register, and are not included in this return. In March last, as previously reported, the whole of the old accommodation house, including the first and second class dining-rooms, sitting-room, billiard room and table, twelve bed-rooms, kitchen, pantry, etc. the property of Mr. J. Wilson, keeper, were completely destroyed by fire. Visitors were somewhat inconvenienced thereby, but not to such an extent, as might have been expected, Quarters in the new building, usually reserved for visitors alone, had to be set apart for Mr. Wilson's family and servants. Fortunately, there is another place of accommodation (Wallace's) within easy distance; which was taken advantage of by a number of visitors, and, consequently, it has been well patronised since the fire. I may mention that Mr. Wilson and family suffered to a large extent, owing to the loss of all their personal effects. The buildings, but not the contents, were insured. It has been decided to resume the remaining buildings, and erect a new dining-room, kitchen, etc. and let the whole by tender on a ten years' lease. The Department of Public Works has commenced operations in connection with the extension of the Mount Victoria Road through the Grand Arch. The necessary ironwork having been forwarded, two men have been engaged temporarily to further proceed with the work of improving and opening up the Slattery Cave, good progress in which was made last year; but operations had then to be suspended on account of the shortness of funds.

## LEFFEL WHEEL

The possibility of a project to restore the Leffel Wheel was discussed at length. The President informed the meeting that the Wallerawang Power Station Engineers had been contacted in 1983 by Ernie Holland — at that time Ernie had been informed that it would not be possible for the job to be undertaken by the apprentices because of the Wheel's location.

However, the President reported that he had had more recent discussions with the Apprentice Master who thought the restoration could make a good project — but 3 factors would need to be considered:

- It would be necessary to clean up the area at the site of the machinery to improve access to the job.
- It would be necessary to remove the casting and associated parts to enable any restoration to be done.
- It may be impossible to safely replace the completed work back at the original site. Other locations may have to be considered.

Ken Buckley suggested that a working bee be held to clean up the site — this was agreed to by the members — Are you interested?

You are! Then the date is 31st March, 1984. Meeting at the Guides Office at 10.00 a.m. Bring the whole family and friends and have a picnic as well.

#### OLD MEN'S ACCOMMODATION?

Shaun O'Gorman advised the meeting that the Old Men's Accommodation (more correctly — The Men's Old Accommodation) and the workshops below were to be demolished in the near future. He suggested that the Society should have photos taken as an historical record of the building and its contents. It was also pointed out that the building was originally a series of stables for horses indicating a very old structure.

Barry Richards said that it contained some very old hardware in the form of window catches and fittings and he would endeavour to secure them for the society.

#### HYDRO ELECTRIC GENERATING STATION — Locally known as the "Hydro"

This plant has been shut down for re-conditioning and during the rebuilding and replacement of the generator the old switchboard will be removed and the station will be divided into two sections: 1 Section will house the old switchboard and generator unit and will be a museum. The other section will be the active power generating station and the interior will be viewed through windows from outside the building.

#### THE SIX-FOOT TRACK

# RON NEWBOULD RETIRES

Many people in the Society may not be aware of the fact that 'Ron Newbould, a Guide at Jenolan since 1963, is no longer employed by the Department of Leisure Sport and Tourism. Ron has been retired early for medical reasons.

A farewell for Ron and Jan was held on Wednesday 28th December, 1983. About 150 people attended the function which was appropriately held in the Grand Arch at Jenolan. Most of Ron's family attended and Mr. Bob MacKenzie represented Head Office. Mr. MacKenzie presented Ron and Jan with a perpetual motion clock with the inscription which read "To Ron and Jan, in appreciation for your family's contribution to Jenolan ". Among the guests who attended were Mr. Max Mould of Katoomba and Mr. Basil Ralston also of Katoomba, both former Guides of Jenolan. Everyone who attended had a good night I

For those of you who don't know much of Ron's past at Jenolan the following are a couple of achievements over a period of almost 21 years. Ron hasn't done too bad!

Ron started work at Jewolan as a Guide on the 13th March 1963. He didn't waste time, as on the 8th of June 1964 at 1.30 am, he and John Culley discovered a new cave, the Barralong. Ron kept busy and on the 12th of December 1964, took the Director of the Department, Mr. Gavern into Barralong Cave. Soon after he was taking an ABC film crew into Barralong. To add to all this, Ron wrote an occassional paper for the Society titled, "Discovery of Barralong Cave ". The Barralong Cave still lives an active life with present day Guides. The last time Ron was in Barralong Cave is a secret!

Ron was also strongly involved in the stean cleaning of the Orient Cave. Due simply to the pollution, Orient Cave had become nothing but a hole in the ground full of dust from peoples' clothing, and soot from the old boiler house. With the aid of a portable electric boiler to produce steam, and metres of hose, rope, cables and ladders, Ron, with the assistance of other Guides and a cave labourer John Pope (who later became a Guide) was able to clean the Orient from top to bottom. There were many days of work in the cave over a four year period from the 15th of March 1968 to the 30th of September 1972. There were in fact 408 days spent on cleaning and washing operations along. The Orient is again clean and pretty. Ron went to work again and wrote another occassional paper, "Steam Cleaning of Orient Cave".

Ron Newbould officially retired on the 29th of November, 1983. That gives a total of 20 years, 8 months, 2 weeks and 2 days as a Guide at Jenolan.

## THE NAMING OF JENOLAN

This year 1984 is the centenary of an important event in our history, the official naming of the Caves. In April 1884, W.M. Cooper, Surveyor of Public Parks wrote to P.F. Adams, Surveyor General and suggested that the name Fish River Caves was "incorrect and misleading". He suggested that other names used by some people such as Binda or Bindo could be better. The Surveyor General replied saying that if one parish was to include the Caves instead of two, the Caves would be in the Parish of Jenolan and that perhaps they (the Caves) should be named after the parish in which they are situated. The Surveyor General decided to let the Under Secretary of Mines, Harrie Wood, make the decision. Wood asked C.S. Wilkinson (Geological Surveyor) if he could think of any name. Wilkinson agreeing with "Jenolan", thought inquiries should be made to see if any more appropriate "native" name could be given.

A considerable amount of bureaucratic interchange followed with no-one seeming prepared to make a decision. Objections even came from the Legislative Assembly on June 13, 1884 because it was claimed that Fish River Caves was so well known, and there was already a Mount Jenolan near Capertee. The answer given was that the Caves were not on the Fish River watershed and the mountain was Geenowlan, not Jenolan near Capertee.

The information was referred to Mr. Cooper who at once replied "...in short, the present name of the Caves is a geographical absurdity..." and in the same letter said that the use of the present name however well known was not "...a sufficient reason for perpet—uating a gross misnomer,..."

Three weeks later, Cooper pressed the matter again because of the delay in lithographing the Map of the Parish of Jenolan which had been entirely due to the issue of the name of the Caves. If the Map was published without the change, the opportunity may not recurr.

By the end of July the name "Jenolan" had been approved. It appeared in the New South Wales Government Gazette of August 19,1884. p.s. The name "Jenolan" was originally used for a mountain near the Cox's and Jenolan River junction during the Trigonometrical Survey of New South Wales about 1828.

#### "CHAPTER II

#### THE NATURAL ASPECT OF THE ISLAND

For centuries Nature has been silently constructing show places beneath these mountains that rival anything human genius has been able to produce. The limestone caverns are marvels of delicate loveliness, such as nothing but the ages could create. Vivid recollections of my first visit to the Jenolan Caves twenty years ago come to mind as I write. The trip was a long, hard one, made by private conveyance. Upon reaching the Cave House, I was ushered into the bridal-chamber — lonely quarters for a bachelor girl — where reposed a suit of men's apparel in which to array myself for an underground expedition. The blue cotton trousers reached only to my shoe-tops, and there was an absence of the usual gearing which must lend a sense of security to that cut of garment. We carried torches, and provisions were also necessary, as the trip required either a full day or the entire night. Never shall I forget how the guide pointed out all sorts of fierce, weird, and unearthly things which took shape and form according to the degree of individual imagination. It was hard work, this wriggling along narrow passages and crawling snake-fashion through others, emerging with blistered hands, red face, and disordered locks; but such was the price of "seeing the caves" in those early days.

Much of this real enjoyment and wholesome fatigue has vanished. The Government has thrown up great highways, constructed railways, and hewn out motor-roads to facilitate travel for those attracted by this form of natural beauty. It has become a popular honeymoon trip, but the abbreviated garments of my first visit are no longer necessary. The present-day bride returns from her subterranean exploits free from any evidences of the trip. The caves are now well lighted by electricity, which reveals much that was formerly hidden. The colouring is so vivid that a fertile imagination may weave the fantastic forms into both the grotesque and beautiful..."

#### PROGRESS ON HISTORICAL PUBLICATIONS

John Dunkley has recently completed an important work in the form of an "Annotated Bibliography of Jenolan Caves". He hopes to have it published for J.C.H.A.P.S. in the very near future. John is one of several people interested in the production of a readable history about Jenolan. The Society hopes also to encourage the publication of other material related to Jenolan's geological history, again in a readable format. Warren Targett has been successful in gaining a position at a seminar for "Writers in Local History" conducted by U.N.E. The seminar is being held at Camden in August this year. Warren will represent the Society which is sponsoring his attendance.

#### HISTORIC POST CARDS

Michael Chilcott, Doug Short and Steve Moore have agreed to form a Publications Sub-Committee. Their first project is the re-printing of the historic postcards which sold very well in the past. It is also intended to re-print the Oliver Trickett Cave Map. Several colours will be used to make the map easier to read. Steve Opper is preparing the artwork for this project now, but we have a lot of old stock to move yet.

#### SIX FOOT TRACK

The Society has received letters from both the Department of Lands and Blue Mountains City Council acknowledging our request to attend the official opening of the Six Foot Track.

The original opening was postponed due to State Elections on 24th March this year. The present delay is due to legal impediments over the route through private land.

# **MEMBERSHIP BADGES**

Some of you may not be aware that the Society has an attractive Membership Badge. The emblem is a silhouette of the Grand Arch at Jenolan superimposed with the outline of a magnesium lamp of the type used before the advent of electricity at the Caves. A quantity of old stock badges are now on sale for \$1.00 each. New stocks will cost \$2.50. The badges will be on sale at Society meetings and at Jenolan.

#### LEFFEL WHEEL

The working bee to clean up the area around the Leffel Wheel was a great success. Those members who attended, spent an enjoyable day beside the Jenolan River with a picnic lunch. It was established that the turbine is basically a free standing structure attached to the foundation by four steel studs (bolts). These studs, plus a flange coupling to the original supply pipeline, if undone, will allow the whole device to be lifted out in one piece. We estimate the mass at about 200 kg.

Unfortunately, no casting numbers or serial numbers were detected, but Research Officer, Steve McClean has written to the Museum of Applied Arts and Sciences, the Public Works Dept. and the British Trade Commission to see if more details can be brought to light.

The Leffel Wheel will not be removed until we have sufficient details to allow for proper restoration and the permission of the Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism to do so.

#### RON NEWBOULD BECOMES SPECIAL HONORARY MEMBER

The General Meeting overwhelmingly supported the motion that Ron Newbould be made a Special Honorary Member of the Society in recognition of his efforts in promoting the Society and Jenolan's history. Special Honorary Membership is granted for a five year period during which time, Ron will retain all the rights of a financial member of J.C.H.A.P.S.

#### A CHANGE IN THE FACE OF JENOLAN

Demolition is now complete of the Men's Old Quarters which stood on the site near the Wallaby Hall (the second one!) until just after ANZAC Day this year. Although the building will not be missed by those unfortunate enough to have savoured the comfort of its spacious and modern rooms (or kennels?), the building turned out to have an important link with Jenolan's past. Warren Targett brought my attention to the fact that the accommodation section of the building was added on top of the original stables and coachhouse (workshops) about 1898. The timber used was salvaged from the last of the timber sections of Caves House when this was demolished to make way for the present stone wing (kiosk end).

With this knowledge, several lengths of cedar wall cladding were secured and these will be used to construct a display case (or two perhaps) for the Society. I also saved some nails from the site as these were hand forged by Jenolan's own blacksmith. He apparently could not meet the demand and some construction had been done in shipwright style with wooden pins.

This story contains a clear message not just to J.C.H.A.P.S., but hopefully to the Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism also. A lot more thought and research is needed before "unwanted" structures are cleared to make way for Jenolan's new image.

#### RALPH SYMONDS FILM SHOWN AGAIN

Thanks to the difigence of Mr. W. Heiron and his daughter June, the Society has again got a copy of a remarkable film on Jenolan Caves. The late Ralph Symonds made the film for his own interest and at great expense. An aircraft searchlight and cables were used to provide lighting inside the caves. The film is in colour and well preserved considering it was made over 40 years ago.

The late Jim Pemble took a personal interest in the safe copying of the original and in recognition of his efforts, the Society will have an acknowledgement section added to the film.

The film will be shown again at the General Meeting in Sydney on Monday, 13th August, 1984. The meeting will be at the Masonic Hall, 44 Beresford Road, Strathfield. 8.00 p.m.

#### **NETTLE AND ARCH CAVE RE-DEVELOPMENT**

On Saturday, 26th May, about 20 people, mostly members of J.C.H.A.P.S., were taken on a guided tour of Nettle and Arch Caves. The tour was escorted by Senior Ranger, John Culley, Acting Senior Guide, Ernie Holland and members of the A.S.F. consulting team lead by Ellery Hamilton-Smith. Mr. Hamilton-Smith took us through the Cave explaining how the team believed the re-development should be achieved.

Everybody was invited to comment and some did so. Many people were quite startled by the almost totally undeveloped nature of the cave. The realization that an opportunity exists to develope this wonderful cave utilising the most modern techniques, gradually emerged. About two hours were spent in the Cave.

At the General Meeting, Ellery Hamilton-Smith addressed the members and visitors and described in detail the philosophy behind their proposals. He also described some basic guide-lines within which they were working. The open nature of the caves makes it unique at Jenolan. The spectacular views down into the Devil's Coach House and Blue Lake area make the cave unique in Australia and indeed, in the world. The features of the Cave need to be a centre-piece of the project.

The biology of the Cave, the many bats, owls and spiders (all harmless!) provide a unique opportunity to explain the inter-action of caves with the outside world. These features must be carefully considered before work proceeds.

The complexity of the proposed re-development must be emphasized to the Department of Leisure. Sport and Tourism. It would be inexcusable if any mistakes were made and the knowledge to prevent this existed.

Michael Chilcott (Society Secretary) has contributed a paper on the biology of Nettle and Arch Caves to the A.S.F. team. Due to his professional involvement, Michael agreed to act as liason officer between J.C.H.A.P.S. and the A.S.F. team led by Ellery Hamilton-Smith. We will keep you informed.

After the meeting some people commented to me that they found it difficult to involve themself in the discussion. The consideration of technical and educational quality in Cave Development is imperative. However, we must also consider the interests and expectations of the visiting public.

#### J.C.H.A.P.S. INVITED TO CONTRIBUTE TO MANAGEMENT PLAN

The National Parks and Wildlife Service is currently preparing Plans of Management for Blue Mountains, Wollemi and Kanangra Boyd National Parks. The Society has been invited to provide any information on features of historic resource that we are aware of.

In the 1880's a member of the Whalan family tried to establish a Guest House at Kanangra Walls to attract visitors from Jenolan Caves. The ruins of this house are all that now remains.

A wooden dance floor was constructed in a cliff cave at Kanangra too. People travelled 60 km. (120 km return) by horse to attend night time dances here! Nothing remains of the dance floor today.

We will provide a report to the N.P.W.S. If you have any information, please send it to the Secretary no later than 13th July, 1984.

# **REPORT ON CENTENARY CELEBRATIONS**

On the weekend of the 18th and 19th of August, 1984, J.C.H. & P.S. took part in a Celebration of the Naming of Jenolan Caves.

The majority of activities were organized by the N.S.W. Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism for the two day celebration, J.C.H. & P.S. was successful in gaining approval to unveil a Commemorative Plaque to provide a permanent record of the Centenary.

Celebrations started in Caves House on Saturday Night. A costume dance was held in the Ballroom, Music provided by Warren Targett and Friends was enthusiastically received. Guests of Caves House were obviously well informed as some excellent costume dress was worn.

During the evening, a photograph of Jeremiah Wilson was unveiled by Janet Bryant. Jeremiah Wilson was the first official Caretaker and Caves Guide at Jenolan. He was appointed while the Caves were known as the Fish River Caves in 1866. Janet Bryant is the Great Grand Daughter of Jeremiah Wilson. The photograph hangs in "Jeremiah Wilson's Bar" near the first floor Dining Room.

On Sunday 19th, there were a number of activities. At 10.30 a.m., some 35 people gathered on the lawns near the Jenolan School for the unveiling of the Centenary Plaque. The Official Guests of J.C.H. & P.S. were Mr. Harold Coates, O.B.E., Patron of the Society and Mrs. Coates. The President of J.C.H. & P.S., Stephen Opper gave an introductory talk explaining the history of land subdivision in the Colony of New South Wales which lead up to the creation of the Parish of Jenolan in 1884. Mr. Coates was then invited to unveil the Commemorative Plaque. Mr. Coates expressed his pleasure at being invited to Jenolan for the event. He told how he had been born very near to Jenolan and had lived and worked in the district all his life. Mr. Coates also had some words of encouragement for J.C.H. & P.S. and commended the Society for the initiative in arranging for the Plaque. It is important, Mr. Coates said, to provide permanent and visible reminders of our history. This would foster an interest in history for future generations. The Plaque will soon be mounted within the Grand Arch in the gardens at the Biue Lake entrance.

A Special Caves Inspection Programme was prepared for the day. Historical inspections of Lucas Caves were conducted. During these tours "Jeremiah Wilsons" (alias Peter Culley and Keith Oliver) followed parts of the original caves paths such as the "Sole of the Boot" and "The Slide".

Perhaps the most spectacular event was at 11.30 a.m. when Ron Newbould (former Caves Guide) read a declaration proclaiming the official naming from Camp Rock in the Grand Arch. Then a mock battle between bushrangers and troopers erupted. The sound of muzzle loaded guns accompanied by smoke and flames was very realistic. The troopers won the day with the villians fleeing through the Devil's Coach House.

When tranquility returned to the Grand Arch, Stephen Opper conducted a "History of Electricity" walk for interested persons. Points of significance such as the Steam Engine Site, the original dam and Leffel Wheel were visited. People tagged on as the walk progressed and some 25 people were present at the Leffel Wheel Site. The year 1884 was when work commenced on the electric lighting of Imperial Caves.

Society Members and our guests Mr. & Mrs. Coates, then walked down the track to the Hydro. The walking track is now in excellent condition. The path has been re-located back to the original position along the river below the swinging bridge. Two new bridges are also in use and the walk is commended to you.


At the Hydro Station the walk concluded and a barbecue lunch enjoyed by all. Despite the cold weather about 30 people turned up for lunch. Many litres of hot tea and coffee were consumed to ward off the cold.

To conclude the activities, Mrs. Coates kindly cut the Centenary Cake which had been baked for the occasion by Theresa Opper. Mrs. Coates expressed her appreciation for the invitation and the efforts of the Society.

At about 1.30 p.m. our guests and some of the members were kindly conveyed by bus back to Caves House. The more stubborn of us braved the cold a little longer before making for home.

Thanks firstly to Mr. Harold Coates, O.B.E. and Mrs. Coates for attending. Their obvious enthusiasm was greatly appreciated. Thanks also to Senior Guide Ernie Holland, Plant Super-intendent Barry Richard. Thanks also to Christine Culley and Theresa Opper for lunch, Special thanks to Senior Banger John Culley for his assistance which made the day much easier for all of us.

Overall, the weekend was most enjoyable and it is a credit to those Society Members who travelled to Jenolan and braved the cold to make a success of the Centenary. Don't forget the General Meeting at Jenolan on 11th November.

# **JENOLAN CAVES**

As early as 1823, people have settled at Bullick Flats (known as Oberon since July 4, 1863).

James and Charles Whalan had properties in the district and they were given the credit for bringing about the recapture of the escaped convict James McKeowan. It is generally accepted that this event took place in 1838, in the area now known as McKeowan's Valley. Both James and Charles Whalan became the co-discoverers of what was later named Jenolan Caves. The caves had been referred to as "Fish River Caves", "Binda Caves", and "Bindo Caves" since the day McKeowan had been re-captured.

The caves became a much sought after haven for visitors because of the beauties and curiosities they had to offer. The first access to the caves was by way of the McKeowan's Valley after the usual stopover at Charles Whalan's house. During the 1850's, the Binda Cattle Station, which

was situated some thirteen kilometres north-west of the caves, became host to travellers from Mount Victoria, who would follow along an old cart track made by men taking bark to Binda and Hartley. John Lucas M.L.A. followed this same route in July, 1861, when he visited the caves. The final descent down Mount George to the caves was made on horseback or on foot because of its steepness, a descent of over four hundred metres and two kilometres distance. This access to the caves became very popular especially when the railway reached Mount Victoria in 1868.

"The Arch, Nettle and Elder Caves", which had been found in the 1840's, began to suffer from vandalism. In 1856 Mr. Jeremiah Wilson explored and penetrated deep in to the "Elder Cave". This encouraged visitors to do the same and vandalism increased. In January, 1860, Jeremiah Wilson was in the group that discovered and explored a new cave. This new cave was named after John Lucas M.L.A. in 1878, as "Lucas Cave".

On March 8, 1867, The Government Gazette quoted Mr. Jeremiah Wilson as being appointed as "Keeper of the Caves". For the year 1867, the sum of one hundred dollars (£50) had been voted for preservation and improvements, but fifty dollars (£25) was for Wilson's annual salary. Fencing materials were used to enclose a paddock for horses on Gingkin Point.

F. G. Finley (L.S.) first did a plan and report in March, 1869, and suggested that if a reserve were made the caves should be as nearly as possible in the centre of it. One of the earliest survey points at Jenolan Caves is situated in the vicinity of the "Carlotta Archway".

The Grand Archway became the most favoured place to shelter overnight. It was here in 1869 that a dancing platform was erected, as well as rough benches and seats. In the McKeowan's Valley a concrete cricket pitch had been constructed and this area became known as "The Playing Fields". The Department of Lands introduced in 1872 the first form of protection for the caves, by making it an offence for a person found damaging them.

Lamont Young and Henry Cambridge surveyed the Lucas and Elder Caves at Easter, 1878. Henry Cambridge was stationed in the area to survey the new "Zig Zag" road down the hill on the Oberon side. The "Zig Zag" road was finished by April, 1879, and this gave travellers the first easy means of access to and from the caves.

The Department of Lands transferred control of the caves to the Department of Mines in 1879.

Jeremiah Wilson was credited with the discovery of the "Imperial Cave" during February, 1879, and later in this same year Wilson built a small slab kitchen above the junction of the Surveyor's and Wallaby Creeks. The Department of Mines had Lamont Young inspect the caves and on December 15, 1879, Young reported and listed the nature and amount of improvements that should be made. Young had even suggested limiting parties or make

provision for the Keeper having an assistant, so as to protect the caves. The outcome was that tenders were called in December, 1879, for improvements to the "Fish River" or "Binda Caves", and such improvements to be completed by March, 1880. R. B. Baynes and Company got the contract and completed the work on time. The caves were closed for this duration. Frederick J. Wilson (Jeremiah Wilson's brother) was appointed as assistant to the Keeper in 1880. Jeremiah Wilson discovered the "Left Imperial Cave" in 1880, and during the ensuing three years discovered extensions to it.

During 1880, Jeremiah Wilson had a building forty feet long by fourteen feet wide constructed for accommodation purposes. As from January 1, 1882, regulations for the management of the caves and a summary of charges laid down for accommodation that was to be provided by Jeremiah Wilson came into effect.

The "Mammoth Cave" was discovered in 1882 by Jeremiah Wilson, who explored the many miles of passageways that go to make up this extraordinary cave system. Great interest was stimulated by the forthcoming international exhibition and business interests as well as Government Departments alike wanted to capitalise on the event.

Under the direction of Lt. Colonel E. C. Cracknell, Mr. James Cummings began the task of installing equipment in "Margherita Cave" and on July 22, 1880, they achieved great success with the illumination of the cave with electric light. Photographs were taken and developed within a short time. It is thought that this was probably the first usage of electricity for illumination in a cave anywhere in the world.

During 1884 arrangements were made with Cracknell for installing electric lighting in other areas of caves. In April, 1884, W. M. Cooper, Surveyor of Public Parks, had defined a bridle track from near Katoomba through to the Black Range and joined up with the old cart track (which had been improved) and travellers from Mount Victoria were using this.

The Tarana and Oberon people could see their interests being affected and they wanted the patronage of future travellers, so they rekindled their claim for a light line of rail from Tarana to the caves.

W. M. Cooper wrote to P. F. Adams, Surveyor General, in 1884 (April) suggesting the name "Fish River Caves" was incorrect and misleading. Cooper continued to seek the name to be changed to "Jenolan" after the parish in which they are situated. After a lot of debate finally official approval was granted and in the Government Gazette of August 19, 1884, the name was changed and is to be known thereon as "Jenolan Caves".

## PLAN OF MANAGEMENT FOR JENOLAN CAVES RESERVE AND ASSOCIATED DEVELOPMENTS

The Jenolan Caves Historical & Preservation Society (JCHAPS) held its quarterly general meeting at Jenolan Caves on Saturday 10th November, 1984. At that meeting a motion was discussed expressing concern at the obvious deterioration of the natural environment within the Jenolan Caves Reserve.

The text of the motion as adopted by the general meeting is set out below:

"The Jenolan Caves Historical and Preservation Society respectfully requests that the Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism give an undertaking to:

- a) Commence the production of a Plan of Management for Jenolan Caves Reserve and all associated developments.
- b) Defer all proposed development works' within the Jenolan Caves Reserve until such development is approved under a properly constituted Plan of Management.
- c) Engage the services of appropriate public authorities to develop a program to control and eradicate those exotic plants identified as endangering the survival of the natural environment of Jenolan Caves Reserve and the adjoining National Park. The program to be preferably in conjunction with the overall Plan of Management."

The members of JCHAPS wish to offer any assistance within our capability in achieving the above-mentioned objections.

In addition to the motion it was agreed to provide the following information which is the basis for the Society's request.

There are many factors contributing to the deterioration of the Jenolan Caves Reserve. As a non-professional body the Society is not in a position to provide a detailed scientific analysis of these factors. However from many hours of observation by members we confidently state that three significant factors are:

- 1) The spread and effects of noxious exotic plants originating almost exclusively from the gardens and plantations established around Caves House and environs in the past.
- 2) The effects of pollution of natural water ways caused by effluents from such sources as the sewerage treatment facility, the detergents and chemicals used in cleaning in the area and the industrial waste from maintenance and development programs.
- 3) Areas of disturbance to vegetation and soil resulting from construction and maintenance programs both past and present within the Reserve.

These three points are discussed below.

1) Many species of exotic plants have been introduced into the gardens and plantations around Caves House and have been contained there. There are however several remarkable exceptions to that general success.

Sycamore (Maple?) trees

Tree of Heaven. (Allanthus altissima)

False Acacia, (Robinia pseudoacacia)

Ornamental Hypericum, (Hypericum androsaemum)

English Ivy. (Hedera helix)

and Coral flower. (?) to name the most obvious.

These plants have spread dramatically to cover large areas of what was once virgin native bushland. They have been attracted to the cool moist gullies, a feature of the area. Now very few of these gullies remain without serious damage from invasion by exotics.

Add to this the effects of blackberry which is rampant in some areas of the Reserve and we do not believe it is an exaggeration to say that the Reserve could face destruction if something is not done soon. Every year that passes without action will see the affected area increase.

- 2) The environmental sensitivity of the Jenolan River is obvious and we believe that secondary treatment of all affluents to remove excess nutrients is fully justifiable. Downstream of the Caves area the river is badly choked by the growth of plants both in the water and along the stream edge. We believe this is largely due to the excess nutrients present in the water, a fact which has been established in areas other than Jenolan.
- 3) There are some relatively large areas within the Reserve showing the detrimental effects of the disturbance of the vegetations and soil cover. The construction of roads and tracks provides ideal conditions for the invasion by weeds and spread of exotic plants. The necessity of some of these roads and tracks points once again to the importance of effective control of noxious exotic plants.

The establishment of new facilities on both the Eastern and Western boundaries of the Reserve will now increase the pressure of the factors aforementioned. The recent construction of a track through virgin bushland to plough in a telephone cable is a classic example of the damage that can be done in the sort of terrain typical at Jenolan.

As stated at the beginning of this letter there are many factors to be considered in drafting an effective Plan of Management. We believe it is essential that such a plan is developed. Within the limits of our ability the Society will offer any assistance possible.

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

At the last J.C.H.A.P.S. meeting held at Jenolan Caves on 10th November, 1984, those present were privileged to hear our guest speaker Jim Smith deliver an interesting talk on the Six Foot Track.

The information offered in the talk was most enlightening for those who were unaware of the history and significance of the Six Foot Track. Jim Smith more than adequately summarised the fascinating material contained in his recent publication "From Katoomba to Jenolan Caves — The Six Foot Track 1884 to 1984".

A comprehensive history is provided of the track, including its significance to the early travellers in their efforts to reach Jenolan Caves. The Six Foot Track is thought to be the most difficult yet romantically picturesque routes to the caves. Delightful and interesting accounts are given by the early travellers of their efforts to reach Jenolan Caves using the Bridle Trail or Six Foot Track, as it is most commonly known. These tales portray the difficulties encountered, in addition to the breath-taking scenery; in particular, the legendary Nillie's Glen which once initiated the Six Foot Track at Katoomba.

From the descriptions given, Nellie's Glên can be imagined as a "Nature's Wonderland" in itself. This unique gorge of rare flora and fauna is described extremely well throughout the book. The descriptions maintain the following style and competence.

\*"Within the shadowed gorge are shelves and banks of ferns; they curtain the dark rock with pale, but vivid green, and the central stream runs over and round enormous blocks of fallen sandstone, scarcely less brilliant, in vests of yellow moss.

At the foot of the cleft the valley opens. Looking back at this wonderful rift in the huge mountain frontier, a rift so dark, rugged and Titanic, that it would seem a demon's work, were it not decorated like a fairy's summer palace, you stand, as it were, in the auditorium of Nature's Free Theatre."

The destruction of this beautiful and historic section, as well as the eventual deterioration of a major percentage of the Six Foot Track is sadiy recounted in the publication. For a large number of people that visit the Blue Mountains and Jenolan Caves today, the memory of these places can only be re-lived through the accounts given in the book.

However, conscientious efforts have been made towards the re-opening of the track. Jim Smith gives his own account of a traverse of the Bridle Trail in recent times (1983). Much encouragement and advice is given to those who may wish to attempt the track. Places and items of interest are prominently described, however, differences of opinion may arise as to the comments made in the book by Mr. Smith regarding the actual caves themselves.


This extremely well researched publication with its oustanding photographical reproductions is highly recommended to all who enjoy or have an interest in the Blue Mountains/Jenolan Caves.

#### REPORT ON THE ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Meeting was held in the Ballroom of Caves House. The following reports were offered by the various Committee Members.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

1984 has been a successful year for the Society. The major event of the year was the Centenary of the naming of Jenolan Caves celebrated during August last year. The brass plaque unveiled by Society Patron, Mr. H.G. Coates, O.B.E. is now permanently erected in the Grand Arch. The Society received wide publicity as a result of the celebrations via ABC Radio and articles in the press and other journals. The commemorative envelopes were well received and requests have come from as far abroad as Argentina.

Promising progress has been made on publications:

- E. Hamilton-Smith will publish a book on the photographs of A.H. Bradley (Guide) during 1985.
- J.R. Dunkley will also publish a history of Jenolan as well as an annotated bibliography
  of Jenolan.
- J.C.H.A.P.S. will make major financial contributions to these projects.
- Six post cards of historic interest will be printed for sale this year.

The Department of Leisure, Sport and Tourism has kindly given permission to use the now vacated "Graph" building at Jenolan to store the Society's collection. The centralization of material to this point is now complete and the important task of cataloguing must now begin.

#### RESEARCH OFFICER'S REPORT

The year just ending has proved to be a very fruitful one from a research viewpoint. Most if not all members of J.C.H.A.P.S. would be aware of the meagre historical details known about Jenolan since the rush of cave discovery during the early years of James Wiburd's tenure as Caretaker of Jenolan. Details of the period 1888 to 1906 were obtained last year from the Annual Reports to the Department of Mines for that period. After 1906 the position of the Department of Mines changed and reports on work done underground and on the surface at any of the cave systems in N.S.W. were no longer submitted or details recorded.

During the year also, a number of visitors to Jenolan have mentioned a past association with the caves and the area in general. When questioned about old photographs, souvenirs or anything as such, most have either lost the items or have disposed of them in some way. Two exceptions to this during recent months have been the offer of copies of photographs of aboveground features at Jenolan and the offer of a map of the caves that may pre-date the map drawn by Oliver Trickett in 1925. It remains to be seen if either of these offers are made good.

#### REPORT ON THE REGULAR MEETING

The Meeting was held in the Ballroom of Caves House on Saturday, May 25th, 1985.

#### CAVE MODEL:

Plans to have the model of the Chifley Cave moved to Caves House for display have not proceeded due to the need for repairs to the cabinet. Bill Buckley noted that a friend of his at Katoomba may be able to supply the glass, for the cabinet quickly. Barry Richards said that glass was already available in the storeroom at Jenolan. Peter Morgan should be approached to carry out repairs to the cabinet.

#### OCCASIONAL PAPERS:

It was noted that Ron Newbould's papers on Jenolan's history were tabled at the last meeting. The publication's committee now had these in hand and were examining the possibility of publishing these.

#### CENTENARY OF THE ARRIVAL OF JAMES WIBURD AT JENOLAN CAVES:

The Meeting was advised that Ron Newbould had prepared a document on the work of James Wiburd at Jenolan Caves.

It was suggested that a series of activities be planned to celebrate this event. (1) An historical inspection at the Red and White Temples (River Cave) was suggested as this was the area in which Wiburd finished his exploration work at Jenolan Caves. (2) The possibility of a photographic display of Wiburd's work be placed in the foyer of Caves House. (3) The conducting of a night walk around the Caves area.

It was suggested that these activities be held on the weekend of November 9th, 1985, the date of the November JCH&PS Meeting at Jenolan.

"In March, 1903 F. J. Wilson resigned to undertake the development of caves in Western Australia. Zealous and capable, he had shown great interest in discovering treasures in the limestone and opening them up for inspection. At the expiration of Wilson's leave, Guide J. C. Wiburd, who had come to the caves in 1885 was appointed caretaker in October, 1903.

#### DISCOVERY OF A NEW WONDER-WORLD:

Taking charge on the departure of F, J. Wilson in April, 1903, J. C. Wiburd had the authority and untrammelled interest that led to cave discoveries which today provide a unique scenic feature in Australia.

Perhaps the existence of the "River" branch of the Lucas Cave was known before the time of its reported discovery but credit for its exploration belongs solely to those whose work in it

received official recognition. Ofiver Trickett reported the first find as made by Guides J. C. Wiburd, J. Edwards and R. I. Bailey (a labourer) on June 6, 1903 seemingly when a large cave (the River Cave) with a "lake" in it was entered from the Lucas Cave. In mid-July, Trickett surveyed and photographed that part of the new cave about Tower Chambers.

Carrying out difficult work with unflagging energy Wiburd and Edwards made important advances, particularly in crossing the pool named the 'Styx'. Holes and passages had to be enlarged to admit air-tight tins and oil drums to support a 'punt' made of a pickle box on which to cross the water.

Beyond this permanent obstacle the explorers penetrated the main passage. In September, in the early hours of the morning Trickett was photographing and defining this subterranean highway through the new wonder-world. He had now crossed the 'Styx' on a rude craft bouyed up by oil drums and drawn by a rope stretched across the water; he found that — 'the passage over the water, the grandeur of the cavern of which the mammoth stalacmite is the central figure, the great height reached by the draped walls in another cavern and the unrivelled collection of helictites . . . . make the new branch one of the most important caves in Jenofan'.

Other treasure was yet to be found:

- Early in October, 1903 after working through red mud Wiburd and Edwards entered a beautiful cave in which they found an aborigine's skeleton.

The Skeleton Cave was opened to inspection in December, 1905.

- After weeks of arduous and dangerous work in the limits of narrow and winding approach the Temple of Baal Cave was found on February 20th, 1904.
- On Saturday evening July 30th, 1904, while Paderewski was making his Australasian debut in Sydney Town Hall. Caretaker Wiburd with Guides Bailey and Edwards discovered a series of vaulted chambers to be known as the Orient Cave."

All the above article, detailing a small part of J. C. Wiburd's time at Jenolan, is taken from portions of "Romance of Jenolan" by Ward L. Havard • 1933.

#### DE BURGH'S BRIDGE:

The subject of the restoration of De Burgh's Bridge at Jenolan was discussed. Mr. Heiron hoted that little progress had been made on this matter to date. He had spoken with the D.M.R. Engineer in Oberon who had informed him that the bridge was part of Main Road No. 253 and that restoration would be a long term aim. He suggested that JCH&PS write to the D.M.R. in Oberon suggesting that next time work was carried out on the road, the D.M.R. take the road back to its original level. This should be recorded through correspondence to the D.M.R. Divisional Engineer in Lithgow.

Mr. Heiron noted that the D.M.R. Engineer he had dealt with had provided photographs and specifications for the bridge. He asked that the Secretary write to the Engineer, Mr. J. Lomas, and express the Society's thanks to him for his work.

#### SESQUI-CENTENARY OF JENOLAN CAVES (1988):

Steve Opper reported that, to date, he had not received any suggestions for activities to celebrate Jenolan Caves Sesqui-centenary in 1988. He informed the meeting that he had spoken with Mr. Bob Crombie, General Manager of the Tourist Commission, and he had suggested that a JCH&PS representative in Sydney be nominated to liase with the Commission to develop ideas for the sesqui-centenary.

Some suggestions made at the meeting included: (1) A rerun of the Caves Express — locos still exist. (2) Vintage Car rally to Jenolan.

#### NAMING OF BUSH CABINS, JENOLAN CAVES:

The meeting was informed that a letter was written to the Minister for Sport and Tourism detailing JCH&PS's objections to the naming of the area where the new bush cabin accommodation had been built as Binda Flats. The letter was read to the Society.

It was noted that no reply had been received to the Society's letter. It was resolved that the Society should send a follow-up letter to the Department asking for a reply. The letter should set a deadline for reply and should be accompanied by a copy of the original letter. If no reply is subsequently received a letter should be sent to the Geographical Name Board.

#### WIBURD CASKET:

Peter Culley informed the Society that Wiburd's casket in Lucas Cave was deteriorating and required some attention. In particular the bottom was rusting and needed cleaning or replacing. He added that the Senior Curator had asked the Society to take some action on this. He suggested that the Society seek professional advice on this matter before proceeding.

It was moved that the Society act to ensure that the casket was restored in an appropriate way and that the Society seek professional advice on this from bodies with expertise in this field e.g. the Museum of Applied Arts & Sciences.

#### "CAVING AT JENOLAN" DISPLAY:

The meeting was informed that a display entitled "Caving at Jenolan" had been opened at the Geological Museum in Sydney and would be open to the public until August, 1985. The display would then be transported to Jenolan for incorporation into the Resource Centre to be built at Jenolan. Steve Opper, Mike Chilcott and Bill Buckley had represented JCH&PS at the opening of the display.

#### POWER LINES TO NEW BUSH CABINS:

The Society was informed that power lines were soon to be put through to the new bush cabins on the Five Mile Hill. It was advised that a 9m wide path was to be buildozed very soon through the bush to the cabins to achieve this.

It was moved that JCH&PS send telegrams to the Electricity Authority involved, the Tourist Commission and the Minister for Leisure, Sport and Tourism, objecting to the bulldozing of bushland for the power lines to the cabins seeking a deferral of this work and suggesting that the power lines be laid underground along existing access roads.

This motion was carried and the Secretary requested to act on this as soon as possible.

#### PUBLICATIONS' COMMITTEE:

The meeting was advised that a series of historic postcards had now been produced by JCH&PS. These would be offered for sale through the Society's newsletter and they would be offered to the Tourism Commission for sale through the Souvenir Kiosk at Jenolan.

A vote of thanks was passed to Doug Short for his efforts in having these printed. It was agreed that members be offered the postcards at 6 for \$2.00. (To place order see attached form.)

The meeting was also advised that John Dunkley had recently produced a 40 page history of Jenolan Caves.

#### WARD L. HAVARD - AUCTION:

The contents of the residence of Ward L. Havard were auctioned on a Sunday in April and two members of our Society attended on behalf of the members to bid and obtain objects for the Museum, Ward L. Havard was a noted historian - and a Member of the Royal Aust. Historical Society among numerous other activities.

On the 28th November, 1933 he read a paper before the members of the R.A.H.S. entitled the "Romance of Jenolan Caves" this was later printed with the permission of the R.A.H.S. and to this day is the only historical summary of Jenolan!

This 48 page booklet is a mine of information and is generally regarded as the authority publication of Jenolan History.

When it was published the price was "One Shilling" (it's printed on the cover).

At the aforementioned auction - eleven copies of the "Romance of Jenolan" were offered and your representatives were able to successfully bid for them at a cost of \$110.00 (\$10.00 per copy).

At the May meeting of the Society it was decided by the membership present to offer a copy to 10 members of the Society. (1 copy to be kept for historical records).

The price is to be \$25.00 per copy (a bargain, if you could see the price of a copy in a book shop) and an application form is attached to this newsletter: if more than ten applications are received a ballot will be conducted at the November Meeting and the winners will be advised and the results printed in the next newsletter.

Since W. L. Havard's "Romance of Jenolan" ends in 1933 the editor of this newsletter thinks it's time some writer/historian brought Jenolan history up to date — in time for the sesquicentenary in 1988.

#### NATURE'S MASTERPIECE - JENOLAN CAVES:

This large (approximately 20cm x 12cm) photographic album of Jenolan Caves which was first printed in the early 1920 was recently purchased by the Society for \$25.00. It, unfortunately is showing its age as the first page (a map) is missing, however the photos are in good order — we believe the photographer was Capt. Frank Hurley.

It was decided to offer by auction this wonderful book to the members and your bids are invited in writing on the attached form and all bids to be in the hands of the editor by the 9th November, 1985.

The result will be announced at the meeting to be held at Jenolan Caves at that date.

#### HERITAGE LISTING:

Julia Horne noted that the National Trust of Australia (N.S.W.) was probably interested in listing the Jenolan Caves Reserve on the Register of the National Estate. It was agreed that JCH&PS would write to the National Trust supporting any nomination of the reserve and offering its assistance in this process.

There was not a great deal of business transacted at the meeting due to the lack of reports or non-attendance of several officers.

The night proved to be more of a social evening with members having a good opportunity to talk about Jenolan.

Bruce Welsh, a member of our society and a representative of J.E.P.C. (Jenoian Environmental Protection Committee) also delivered a lengthy talk about the J.E.P.C.

Mr. Smith, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I deem it a privilege and an honour to be invited to perform the Official opening this evening of this building which will provide the Guides with much more functional and suitable accommodation for their important work.

Having been associated with the Caves for more than half a century I well remember the first Guides Office I saw in 1932, a small hut divided by a partition one room for the Senior Guides Office with a chair and table which filled the room and the other half for the amenities for the Guides with a small fuel stove for heating.

So by comparison the new premises are spacious and comfortable.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I wish to complement the Department, the Architect, and the Workmen, who built it.

I now have great pleasure in declaring it officially opened.

This speech was delivered before an audience of invited guests, staff and their families, totalling about 90 people — all inside at once — that should give some idea of the size of the building. It is timber clad on the area of the old shelter shed, beside the post-office — now the ticket office.

It has a high sloping roof which has enabled a mezzanine floor to be constructed — this is the farea for meals, reading and relaxation.

The building has every mod-con including two fierce gas heaters and as heat rises the mezzanine floor is now known as 'Tropical Heights'.

The ground floor contains a complete kitchen, a private office for the Senior Guide and reception area for visitors. The floor coverings are wall to wall carpet throughout except for vinyl in the kitchen area.

A shower, storeroom and "his" and "hers" toilet completes the building.

The name given to the building is "Negagarra" which means - "to ask and be told".

Among the visitors were some guides of previous years: Mr. Ossie Batchelador, Mr. Bill Marks, Frank Harmon, Noel Rawlinson, Peter Morris, & Bob Richardson.

#### **NEW ROUTES FOR OLD**

After the railway reached it in 1868, Mount Victoria was made prominent by publicity given it by Sydney interests. Tourists were urged to set out from here for the caves, to which coaches were run as near as it was possible to drive. That the final mile of the journey had to be made on foot or by hoise, descending one thousand two hundred feet, was some solace to the Western folk, for Tarana and Oberon were finding it hard to lure visitors so far from metropolitan comforts. In the early 'eighties Hartley sought the caves traffic, while Oberon, boding its eclipse, desired a light line of rail from Tarana to the caves. Yet the Tarana route still enjoyed the bulk of traffic, and Jeremiah Wilson ready with his coach and team of four greys, advertised Fish River Caves. One of the Wonders of the World....

On January 5, 1886, the *Bathurst District Times* announced "many Christmas visitors to the caves, some via Tarana, some via Mount Victoria, some via Katoomba, with grumbling and vowing vengeance on the last named routes...." Katoomba claimed that the difficulties of the bridle path had been exaggerated; Oberon remarked that "the dreary ride from Tarana is interspersed with smiling homesteads," while on the Mount Victoria route "there was a change of horses half way and the need of a refreshment house."

The strong mountain interests gained official favour for the more direct means of access, and the beginning of the present sweeping road known as the "Five Mile".

In May, 1887, a series of articles in the Bathurst District Times condemned this new way downinto the caves valley as a wanton disfigurement of the landscape, and a waste of public money to suit the purposes of city vested interests. The way from Mount Victoria, requiring in rainy weather (according to the writer) ten hours to travel its forty miles, was "stopped at a flat one and a half miles from the Caves House by the increasing steepness of the hillside, thus leaving a long . . . . tramp for visitors." To enable carriages to negotiate this end of the journey, the first idea was "to carry a new road by zig-zags (we believe) along the same hillslope that was traversed by the existing bridle path (down Mount George — W. L. H.), and so over the Devil's Coach House and down to the house. Mr. Wilson promptly interposed, as this route threatened to endanger the security of his charge," Then the route through the Grand Arch was hit upon, and the road quickly surveyed and planned. Official reports that the caves would not in any way be harmed were alleged to have "effectually deceived the public, who had fondly hoped that not only the rock tunnels . . . . but the open loveliness also of the sun-bathed ferns and climbing shrubs, and thick-leaved trees that adorn the valleys close at hand, would be preserved intact for the enjoyment of future visitors"

To give evidence against the assurance that the road from the waterfall to the Grand Arch would do no damage, the writer called upon all those who had seen the mountain side rising all but precipitously from the creek, yet veiled as far as the eye can see with moss and herb and climbing clematis till all sense of sternness was lost in a bright indefinable mist of sunsmitten leafage; they have seen the flashing of the stream among its boulders, rejoicing once more in the daylight, hurrying along by banks of maidenhair and rock ledges where the everlastings and the violets take shelter, bathing in its coarse long coral-red gum roots, dashing its spray upwards towards the bows of the wild fig... The tourist will hear of a lovely waterfall, a clear bathing pool, a verdant gully, a luxuriant vegetation: he will see nothing of all this but decay and ruin and horrible destruction.

This destruction, affirmed a leading article,\* for the enrichment of a few Sydney syndicates interested in moutain hotels, could be avoided by continuing the Mount Victoria route via McKeon's Valley.

At a banquet to ministerial visitors at Oberon in August, 1887, a speaker said that "it was proposed to run a railway from Rydal or Mount Victoria to the caves. If this were done it would destroy for ever all chance of a railway from Oberson!" Advertising his line of coaches between Tarana and the caves, F. J. Wilson said:

This route enables tourists to visit the caves without undergoing the fatigue of a long coach journey, as Oberon is midway, and comfortable accommodation and every attention can be obtained.

But it was in vain that the Tarana-Oberon route sought continued patronage. In the late reighties, unemployed completed the descent of the "Five Mile" to within a quarter of a mile of the Grand Arch. World travellers found it a wonderful specimen of road-making, where it swept downhill in broad curves through a magnificent monotony of deep gullies and rocky hillocks.

In December, 1895, operations were begun for extending the Mount Victoria road through the Grand Arch. The project, for which £1500 was granted, was entrusted to Mr. Brownrigg, Resident Engineer, Lithgow. From the "Turntable," the then terminus for heavy traffic, the new road followed a bridle-path for nine chains, then by a limestone bridge and approaches reached the eastern end of the Grand Arch. For some two hundred and fifty feet the path was followed under theArchway; along the creek, but above it, for two hundred feet, the road was carried by iron girders and buckled plates, in the form of a long culvert. Overhanging rock was distodged to give necessary width on this section. Emerging from the Archway, the road connected with the Oberon road, opposite a plantation, one hundred and fifty feet beyond the culvert. Finished in 1896, this extension eliminated the inconvenience of visitors having to walk a guarter of a mile to and from Caves House.

In the late 'nineties cyclists visited the caves, members of both sexes riding from Mount Victoria. Early in June, 1903, Mr. Mark Foy conducted a party in two motor cars from Blackheath. After delay occasioned by boggy roads and a mechanical defect in one car, the first car - an eight horse-power single-cylinder De Dion, driven by Mr. B. Beckman - reached the caves at eight p.m., having left Blackheath at eleven a.m. This trial showed the need for motors of greater power. The success of motor traffic was assured when, in September, 1903, a full load was taken in four hours from Blackheath. The Mountain Motor Car Company's line was then established. In January, 1906, horses broke the pole of a coach at the caves through taking fright at a motor cycle. Cars found it difficult to ascend the Pass of Victoria, and for a white a resident of Hartley Valley made a tidy sum with his horse hauling them up this historic road. This difficulty was largely responsible for the Berghofer Pass deviation, begun in 1907, which, it was said, "will be much appreciated by caves travellers by motors and other vehicles." From Mount Victoria on September 8, 1909, the first taxi-cab to make the journey left the Imperial Hotel. Early in 1910 "the pace of motor cars was terrific, drivers boasting of twenty miles per hour through Mount Victoria." There was a steady flow of visitors to the caves, travelling chiefly by motor. There had been long delays in the work on Berghofer Pass, a "white elephant on the shoulders of the ratepayers" it was said, but early in 1912 it neared completion. In September, 1912, the passing of the horse coach to the caves was reported. Traffic was handled entirely by motor. In 1913, the Pass of Victoria was in neglect; Berghofer Pass carried the traffic until 1920, when, hasting home with their passengers, drivers rushed their powerful cars up Mitchell's historic way, which once more came into its own. In 1915, the taking over as a

national work of the control and maintenance of the road from Hampton to Edith, with the caves between, was attended by marked improvement in the facilities of access to the caves. Bends in the "Five Mile" were widened, and hillside timber cleared to give unrestricted views of the road, which is now one of the great motor highways of the State. The enormous traffic throughout the 1920's necessitated the institution of traffic regulations governing the road. Overseas visitors are impressed with the skill of the tourist drivers in maintaining the splendid service, which is the feature of the journey to Jenolan Caves.

The article "New Routes for Old" is taken from the "Romance of Jenolan" by Ward L. Havard read before the R.A.H.S. on 28th November, 1933.

Dear Society Member,

I have taken this opportunity to bring you up to date on developments with the planning and management issues that have been the subject of considerable debate this year.

Some of you may be aware from media reports that the National Trust has recently "classified" a considerable area surrounding and including Jenolan Caves. The classification by the National Trust is not binding on the State Government but is a significant comment on the importance of the Jenolan Caves area to the community.

The National Trust Report, an extract of which is enclosed, makes specific recommendations about the sort of protection and recognition Jenolan should get at the State level. The Trusts' comments on the need for a plan of management and the broadening of the Trust concept support the arguments which this Society has been pursuing since 1984.

This Society has received a reply from the Hon. Janice Crosio,
Minister for Natural Resources, in response to a submission made in
respect of Jenolan Caves Reserve. Mrs Crosio has apparently made some
recommendations to the Hon. Michael Cleary, Minister for Sport and
Recreation and Minister for Tourism, regarding the deed for a plan of
management for Jenolan and the composition of the Trust for the Jenolan
Caves Reserve. I am hopefull that JCHAPS will be asked to take part in
the Trust when it is established.

Enclosed with this letter is a notice about the Australian Caves History Seminar which has been arranged through JCHAPS. Unfortunately the fact that our General meeting is on the night before may be a problem for those of you who do not stay overnight. I would certainly recommend the seminar if you have to choose and I am sure your abscence from the meeting will be overlooked.

Another year is drawing to a close and it is only two! years until we are to celebrate the Sesqui-centenary of the discovery of the reason for the existence of JCHAPS. Please send in your WRITTEN suggestions as to how we might celebrate this significant event. We have only next year to decide how we are going to spend 1987 arranging to celebrate 1988, if you get my meaning!!!

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#### Statement of Significance

Jenolan is one of the most important areas of natural and cultural history in Australia. The area includes one of the largest and most beautiful inter-connected cave systems in Australia and is an outstanding site of geological and speleological interest.


The Jenolan River, Blue take and a system of intimate Valleys and watercourses provide a magnificent setting for a distinctive range of native vegetation and fauma. The Caves Reserve was created in 1866, six years before the declaration of the world's first National Park. Since its reported discovery by James Whalan between 1838 and 1841 the area has attracted more than three million visitors. Caves House, and its associated outbuildings, adds to the area's cultural significance.

The area also contains a number of important industrial relics, including Australia's first hydro-electric power station and the remnants of the first electric lighting of caves which was installed in the Chifley Cave in 1887.

#### Boundary and Curtilage of Classification

The Jenolan Caves Conservation Area encompasses the Jenolan River, its tributaries and catchment from the River's source to its confluence with Buils Creek and includes the geological formations within and underlying the valley including the entire caves system, the native flora and fauna, buildings and relics of historic or industrial archaeological significance and other features of historic, social or scenic importance such as tracks, pools and views. The area is generally bounded on the west and north by the Great Dividing Range, to the east by the ridgeline incorporating Kia Ora Hill and extending to the confluence of Bulls Creek and Jenolan River; to the south-east by the ridge extending to Hount Whitely and to the south-west by the ridge extending to Mount Edwards.

The area includes Jenolan Caves Reserve (No 43615) for the "Preservation of Caves" and Wildlife Refuge No 67.



#### RECOMMENDATIONS

The heritage significance of the Jenolan Caves Conservation Area is undisputed. Rearing this significance in mind the National Trust makes the following recommendations:

- The Reserve Trust should be extended to include representatives from the Mational Parks and Wildlife Service, the Australian Speleological Federation, the Mational Trust, the Jenolan Caves Historical and Preservation Society, the Jenolan Environment Protection Committee and the Crown Lands Office.
- \* The National Trust recommends that the Government review the management of Janolan with a view to assessing which Government Department or Authority has the most appropriate statutory role, and administrative and management capacity, to protect, conserve and manage the resources of the Jenolan Reserve.
- \* A Plan of Management should be prepared for the reserve in accordance with section 37(v) of the Crown Lands Consolidation Act 1913, and all development within the reserve should halt pending its preparation, public display and adoption.
- An Environment Impact Statement must be prepared for any future major developments.
- The making of a Conservation Instrument over the Reserve by the Minister for Environment & Planning is supported by the National Trust.
- \* The terminology Caves Reserve should be used in promoting the Caves, and not Caves Resort. The latter term indicates the domination of tourism and man over the Reserve's natural environment. The Reserve is for the Preservation of Caves, and its use and enjoyment by man should be secondary to this prime aim.
- \* The advice of the National Parks and Wildlife Service should be obtained on the possible enlargement of the enclosure for the protection and breeding of the brush-tailed rock-wallaby as the present facility shows evidence of over-grazing and land degradation. The present sign, indicating the co-operation of the Fauna Protection Panel, is 20 years obsolete.
- Logging operations within the Conservation Area should be carefully controlled to
  ensure that erosion and siltation cannot degrade Jenolan River and the caves system.
- Careful attention should be paid to the choice of exotic and non-local native species
  used in amenity plantings. Naturalised exotics should be progressively removed from
  areas other than the Caves House Precinct.
- Unsympathetic facilities should not be sited in the Grand Arch and existing constructions of this type should be removed.
- The development of sporting facilities which promote activities not in sympathy with the natural environment of the Reserve should be curtailed and steps should be taken to promote the natural values of the Reserve in tourist promotion.
- An appropriate architectural style, complimentary to the 1898-1923 complex of buildings, should be adopted for all new buildings in the Caves House precinct. Buildings of conflicting design and/or materials should be progressively removed.
- Expert advice should be sought on the regeneration of natural areas within the Caves Reserve which have become degraded by weed invasion.

#### CAVE HISTORY SEMINAR

On the Sunday following the last JCHAPS meeting at Jenolan, this Society hosted a seminar on cave history in Australia. This event was stimulated by suggestions from one of our members, Dr Elery Hamilton-Smith and the visit to Australia of Dr Trevor Shaw, an English authority on cave history throughout the world.

The seminar was a resounding success, being the first of its kind held in Australia. Participants, including a number of JCHAPS members, presented papers on a variety of topics related to cave history in Australia, including work on cave fossils, and the caves of Bungonia, Wombeyan and the Nullabor.

JCHAPS is currently looking at publishing the results of the seminar for wider distribution. However, for your interest some thoughts expressed by Dr Elery Hamilton-Smith in his overview on cave history in Australia are presented here.

Spelean History in Australia: A Preliminary Overview Elery Hamilton-Smith

#### "Introduction

The first-ever seminar on spelean history in this country constitutes something of a milestone, and so this paper is written as a state-of-the-art review of what has happened and is happening in Australian speleo-history. Hopefully, others will be able to add important data which are at present unknown to me. I would also hope that the near future will see enough further study to make this paper out-of-date anyway.

Comments and further data are more than welcome; I would be very happy to incorporate more information prior to publication of the seminar proceedings, and so make this even more useful. Dr Hamilton-Smith listed several levels of historical study including:

- recording of people's first hand experience
- locating different kinds of source material
- compiling narratives of events as they occur
- developing a critical perspective on history

The paper concluded with a number of suggestions for compiling history and, in particular, history at Jenolan. These were:

- that every attempt must be made to record first-hand experiences before it is too late
- that any source materials must be adequately safeguarded for the future, particularly unique copies, original documents, and specialised collections.
- that the indexing of source material is in itself valuable and should be extended as much as possible
- in particular, that the Jenolan Caves Historical and Preservation Society, as the only historical society in Australia with a speleological focus, should as a matter of urgency establish a proper register of its own holdings and ensure their safe-keeping.

#### RESOURCES CENTRE NOW OPEN

A new Resources Centre has been established at Jenolan Caves to provide visitors with information on and interpretation of the Jenolan Caves area.

The Centre is located in the old Guides Office which has been restructured internally and fitted with new lighting and carpeting.

The central feature of the Centre is the model of the Left Imperial Cave (known as the Chifley Cave since 1952) made by cave surveyor Oliver Trickett. This is accompanied by a photographic display on Jenolan Caves prepared by the Geological and Mining Museum in Sydney. Both these and other exhibits make

Centre a most useful facility, one which has been needed for some time.

About 90 guests attended the opening of the Centre. The guest speaker at the opening, Dr Graham Taylor, was introduced by the Tourist Commission's representative at the meeting, Mr Paul Crombie. Dr Taylor delivered the following address which we thought might interest Society members:

" Thank you Mr Crombie for your introduction and welcome to Jenolan Caves. It is a great honour to be invited to open the Resource Centre, a pleasure which I would normally expect to be reserved for a parliamentarian. I assure you that I have no aspirations in that direction.

We are led to believe that Jenolan Caves were first seen by white man between 1838 and 1841 when James Whalan and two mounted policemen tracked the bushranger McKeown into the Devil's Coachhouse. But the geological history precedes this date by millions of years.

During the Silurian period, some 450 million years ago, a coralline limestone, similar to that now forming the Great Barrier Reef, was deposited in a shallow warm sea. This was followed by marine sediments and some volcanic material in the Devonian period. Subsequent tectonic events resulted in folding of the rocks so that instead of being flat-lying, they were now standing virtually on Uplift of the eastern coast of Australia and subsequent erosion of the limestone by streams resulted in the formation of the caves. Thus we have the three major ingredients for cave formation - limestone, water and time the same three ingredients responsible for the caves at Wellington, Abercrombie, Wombeyan, Bungonia and others throughout the world. Uplift and erosion also caused the magnificently rugged topography through which we travelled to get here. As a geologist, I often marvel at how the early pioneers discovered mineral deposits and natural phenomena in such environments as this. Undoubtedly,

McKeown must have felt fairly safe from the arm of the law.

This short lesson in geology is important because the same three ingredients are present today. It is a dynamic system and will in the course of time alter the cave system dramatically, and may even obliterate the caves entirely. That dynamic system also includes the native flora and fauna which increase the acidity of the water thus hastening the erosional processes. These factors are often overlooked by those members of the community who would advocate restricted access to the caves and reserve in order to preserve this natural resource. There is no denying that past practices have resulted in the destruction of many cave formations the uncontrolled spread of exotic vegetation and possibly the alienation of native fauna. Fortunately, these practices have now ceased and efforts are being made to restore the native flora and fauna.

In these days of consensus politics, efforts must be made to reach a balance between making this magnificent natural resource available to <u>all</u> who wish to visit and meeting the reasonable requirements of the environmentalists and conservationists, remembering of course the constraints of finance, the need to meet with reasonable safety measures, making best use of the facilities presently available etc. There is no place for the confrontation we experienced earlier this year, particularly as many of the accusations were without foundation. Such confrontation all too often leads to extremes such as wholesale alienation of the environment or access by the privileged few. Although presently held up by bureaucracy, the constitution of the proposed trust could represent all the interested parties.

It seems to me that it is all a matter of education and what better way to do this than a Resource Centre where all visitors to the Reserve can learn about the geological history of the area, development of caves and their formations, the human history, the environment and its preservation and speleology. Such material is presently scattered through a number of buildings and we have been most forunate to receive display material from the Geological and Mining Museum. The vision to convert the Guides' old office to a Resource Centre is to be applauded - it

not only means that much of the material can be displayed in one area but also that the guides now occupy a much more comfortable building.

When I first started exploring caves in the southwest of South Australia as a child, the only information available was the folklore dispensed by the one and only guide (whom I am positive lived in one of the caves.) A Resource Centre such as this will provide the information to satisfy everybody's thirst for knowledge - and the information will be correct. I hope that it will also be the focus for a number of self-guided tours and walks, so that visitors can see for themselves the various rock types, folds and faults, fossils, rock formations, flora and fauna of the Reserve. It will also have displays and provide literature for school projects.

Finally, I would like to make two suggestions which will have benefit.

- 1. The Tourist Commission make money available to allow selected staff members to visit other developed cave systems in Australia and throughout the world so that the development of Jenolan is to the highest standards.
- 2. That from the knowledge gained from such visits, consideration be given to relocating the Resource Centre at the entrance of the Reserve, where there is more room for an enlarged Centre and parking, and both the geological and human history started.

Mr Crombie, Ladies and Gentlemen, it now gives me great pleasure to declare this Resource Centre open. May it be of great benefit to those thousands of visitors who visit Jenolan Caves. Thank you."

#### AUMUAL MEMBERSHIP REFORT

#### SALES

The last meeting of the Society was informed that the JCR&PS bistoric postcards were now on sale through the Jenolan Caves Souvenir Kiosk. The final arrangements were that the NS% Tourist Commission purchased the cards for 40c each in bulk, resulting in an income of 3300 for the Society.

John Dunkley pointed out that a few technical bitches had been encountered in the production of his book. However, he said that the Society's Committee had agreed to carry on with publication and to seek assistance in financing this. He said that there was hope the publication would be achieved by June or July, 1985.

It was agreed that publication of the occasional papers should be pursued. The major thrust at this point would be to republish the steam-cleaning paper, as this was the most directly relevant to cave tourism and allowed guiding staff to mention JCHAPS in it in their tours. The occasional papers would cost approximately 90c each to produce and could be sold for \$2.00 each. After the original run, subsequent copies would be less per unit.

The Society is an agent for the Central Kapping Authority and various historical, regional, and tourist maps are available.

The Society also acts as an agent in selling various books which are of interest to members of the Society and the general public: "Six Foot Track"; "Cave Diving In Australia"; "The Caves of Jenolan 2: The Northern Limestone"; "The exploration and Speleogeography of Nammoth Cave, Jenolan"; "The Funnel Web Spider", are just some of the publications available.

Also available are reproductions of the now historical map by Oliver Trickett.

Society members may also purchase copies of the cassette "Warren Targett - LIVE at Jenolan Caves House" through the Society, thus giving the Society another small financial gain.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING 1986

#### President's Report

Steven Opper's report highlighted the need for a management plan for Jenolan Caves to be developed as soon as possible, and the need for the Society to develop further ideas for participation in the Bicentenary year of 1988.

#### Treasurer's Report

Richard Guy's report for the year ending 31 December 1985 showed that the Society had gross receipts for the year of \$4 123 and gross expenses of \$3 041. This resulted in a surplus for the financial year of \$1 082.

Major items in the Society's income for the year under review were the conference on Australian Caves History and the sale of items through the Guides' Office such as maps.

#### Curators' Report

In the absence of the curators, S Opper noted that 1985 had seen a number of new additions to the JCH&FS collection. However, he emphasised that although the collection was still secured in one location, considerable work remains to be done in cataloguing the collection. He also suggested that JCH&PS should consider advertising for material through newspapers in such centres as Sydney.

#### Relations with the New South Wales Government

It was agreed that letters be sent to relevant Ministers in the NSW Government to establish direct links between those Ministers and JCHAPS. It was recommended that similar correspondence be sent to the Fremier of NSW. It was suggested that these letters particularly make mention of the co-operation received by JCHAPS from the NSW Tourism Commission.

#### CONFERENCE PROCEEDINGS

The General Keeting held on 15 February 1986 was informed that the proceedings of the conference on Australian Cave History sponsored through JCH&PS in November, 1985, would be published through the journal "Helictite". Kr Opper noted that the cost of this publication to the Society would be between \$500 and \$600 which would provide the Society with 100 copies of the proceedings. He said that 40 of these copies were committed to be sent to people who attended the conference and that the remaining 60 would be available for sale by JCH&PS.

#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

On behalf of the Society I wish to thank the Menagement and staff of the Tourism Commission for your co-operation and assistance throughout 1985.

The past year has been quite productive, the November History Seminar being the notable success of the year. The debate and campaign for the future management of the Jenolan Caves Reserve continued with some developments, the most significant being the National Trust's classification of the Caves. The diversity of comments and the fact that the debate entered State Parliament is indicative of the scale of this issue. It is somewhat disappointing, though not surprising, that no tangible progress has been made in securing a plan of management for the area.

Many issues have been reised and no doubt are important in respect of Jenolan. However, as was clearly stated from the time of JCH&PS' submission in 1984, the as yet uncontrollable spread of exotic vegetation is the greatest threat to the survival of the natural environment within this Reserve.

In an obvious attempt at window dressing, a landscaping project began in the middle of the Reserve early in 1985. In spite of the efforts of those who had to do the work, this ill-conceived and poorly advised project has had no effect on the spread of exotics across the Reserve. Had advice been sought from the appropriate authorities, such as the National Farks and Wildlife Service, the effort now wasted could have had a real benefit.

The Fastures Protection Board and Department of Agriculture were not relevant to a project of this nature. It is significant that not one of the predominant species of exotic plants in the Reserve is declared noxious by the PP Board in this area. The Society must continue to bring the destructive nature of uncontrolled exotics to the ettention of the Government. I also urge you to write as individuals to the Ministers for Natural Resources, Environment and Planning, and Tourism. We must also continue to support other groups and societies pursuing related issues. These include the Australian Speleological Federation, Jenolen Environment Protection Committee, National Farks Associations, National Trust, Wilderness Society, and Total EnvironmentCentre. No single body will win this battle and it is a battle which must be won.

Looking shead, the Society must address the coming sesquicentenary in 1988. The co-operation of the Tourism Commission was assured by Er Paul Crombie, General Manager of the Commission, in his opening address at the history seminar in November, 1989. This expression of support is gratefully acknowledged. Flanning for the sesqui-centenary must be carried out in earnest. We should be mindful, however, of our present commitments to the long term planning and management issues.

Any so-called celebration in 1968 will be hollow indeed if existing issues and problems are not resolved. The challenge is clearly there for the State Government to follow-up its statements recognising the significance of Jenolan Caves. It is encumbent on Government to physically repair the effects of the threats identified at Jenolan, then ensure no new threats emerge. Surely a better target date could not be set. The sesquicentenery should be a time to celebrate and a date from which to advance. The destruction of Jenolan Caves Reserve must be stopped. We will all have lost if it is not.

In closing, I would like to thank all members of the Society for your support. JCH&PS isnot just an executive and committee, we are 160 individuals with a common cause. On behalf of the outgoing executive and Committee, I wish you all the best of success in 1986. Let us be optimistic about the future but not complacent.

"2 A History of the Six Foot Track

Early Routes to Jenolan Caves

From the mid-nineteenth century the Jenolan Caves became one of the most popular tourist attractions of inland Australia. In the early 1850's visitors to the Caves travelled on horseback or partly over rough buggy tracks from Bathurst, Oberon or Tarana. Later in the 1850's and 1850's visitors from Sydney who had travelled along the Great Western Road could rest overnight at hotels at Hartley or Bowenfels before proceeding along more direct tracks. In 1868 the railway line reached ht Victoria and hotel owners there constructed a rough buggy track to the Caves. As the Jenolan Caves are situated at the bottom of a very steep walled valley, the expense of completing the road all the way was too much for these early entrepreneurs. Instead, visitors had to walk or ride on horseback the last two and a half kilometres.

By 1872 the railway reached Tarana, reinforcing this town's long established prominence in the field of supplying accommedation to Caves travellers. The road from Tarana at this stage however, like the one from Et Victoria, stopped short of the Caves. Visitors had to walk or ride the last steep section. In 1879 this was rectified and Tarana became the only township on the railway line from which it was possible to ride in a coach all the way to the Caves. The town thrived on this monopoly for over a decade.

The Survey

... Cooper's route used existing tracks where possible, and according to Regalong Valley residents, brumby trails formed part of his route through the valley. He used an existing track along the Black Renge to the Et Victoris Road, and followed this road to the Caves. The final section of this was a bridle trail which crossed over the top of the Devils Coach House and passed by the Carlotta Arch..."

#### JCH&PS MUSEUM'S DRAFT COLLECTION POLICY

Just because an object is old does not mean it is historically significant. And if an object is not historically significant it should not be collected. The main aims of JCH&PS museum's collection policy should be to define areas of study significant to the history of Jenolan Caves and create an obligation on the Society that it collect objects directly relevant to those areas. A draft policy has been set out and discussion is invited - especially regarding Point 2 in which the areas of study are defined - at the Society's meeting in August.

- 1) The Society will collect, preserve, research and exhibit material which will enable it to illustrate and record an account of people and nature within Jenolan Caves Reserve.
- 2) a. The material collected by the Society must relate to those areas which contributed significantly to the Reserve's history. These areas are natual environment (with special emphasis on speleology), exploration, settlement, education, tourism and transportation.

Any money so obtained is to be used to purchase appropriate material for the collection.
  - 6) Loans, except for the purpose of temporary exhibitions, are to be discouraged.

- 7) Collection of objects for the Society's collection may be done by any member of the Society or staff of Jenolan Caves Resort and should be recorded in the Day Book. The actual selection and acceptance of objects can be made only by the Society's governing body.
- 8) The Society will record all objects added to its collections promptly using an approved registration system. Every effort is to be made to aquire all relevant information concerning material at the time of its acceptance.

# SESQUI-CENTENARY

As suggested in the last newsletter, a working party (WP) was established to co-ordinate the sesqui-centenary celebrations. The members selected for the WP are:

Janet Bryant Julia Horne Scott Melton Janet Pucci

It was also agreed to have the President be designated as an ex-afficio member of the WP. The first task of the group will be to establish liason with the Tourism Commission.

## MUSEUM COLLECTION POLICY

A draft policy was printed for discussion in the last newsletter. At the August meeting several amendments were made to the policy as it was discussed. Julia Horne will now prepare the first draft policy as a notice of motion to be dealt with at the November meeting.

The redrafted policy is printed herein.

#### JENOLAN CAVES PLAN OF MANAGEMENT

Just prior to the August meeting the Society was invited to comment on a proposed study brief for a draft plan of management for Jenolan Caves Reserve. Due to the closing date for our submission (15 August, 1986), the President and Secretary prepared a response on the Society's behalf.

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The JCH&PS submission was a comprehensive review of the proposed study and included a rewritten study brief incorporating a number of suggested changes.

The submission was endorsed by the members at the August meeting.

The study propsed by the Tourism Commission is very comprehensive and would result in a large collection of useful information. The main concerns identified in the Society's review are contained in the following extracts from the review:

"The tender as proposed incorporates into the management plan objectives, matters which are clearly the domain of future development applications and can therefore not be accepted as stated. The details of our objections are set out at the relevant section herein.

Closely related to the above is that fact that in several parts of the document we are given the impression that if necessary, the conservation requirements of the Reserve may have to be 'balanced' against the pressure of public usage. This is in direct contradiction of the purpose of the plan of management which is, quote: "To provide for the continued protection of the natural features and natural ecosystems of the Reserve."

"The plan of management should represent a reference document to be used in assessing any proposed activity within the Jenolan Caves Reserve. The plan would contain the results of an extensive environmental study to collect all available date on the Reserve and its resources.

"The plan will also contain detailed assessments of the constraints to and controls needed for activities which may be proposed in developing the resources identified by the environmental study.

Cont.

"The plan may also identify areas in which existing developments are inadequate or inappropriate. It may also identify appropriate management and development options consistent with the stated objectives of the plan of management.

"Under no circumstances would the plan of management propose specific development activities. Such matters will be the subject of specific development applications. Likewise, significant work programmes such as noxious plant control, etc, will be developed by reference to the plan of management."

The Society has been nominated by the Tourism Commission to sit on the steering committee which will manage and direct the study. Our appreciation of this position and our support for the Tourism Commission in preparing for a management plan have been expressed in our submission.

#### CAVES HOUSE CHANGING ITS COLOURS

Following research and investigations into original paint colour schemes used, the repainting of Caves House has begun. The opinion of members at the May meeting was sought after an enquiry from Mr Paul Crombie, General Management of the Tourism Commission. It was agreed that the choice of colour was a matter of aesthetics and to an extent, tradition.

The research done by Public Works indicated the original colours were cream with brown trimming. This colour scheme is the one being applied now. So be prepared when next you visit Jenolan, all will not seem as black and white as on your last visit!!

#### NOTICE OF MOTION

It will make it available to those who wish to see and study it unless the material's fragility means it is best not handled. The Society will decide whether the items are so fragile that they should not be handled.
- 4. Donations of relevant material from individuals and organisations are to be encouraged. The Society will not guarantee to exhibit any material accepted into the collection.

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- 5. If material is considered to be unusuable because it is outside the Society's area of concern or of poorer quality than other similar material also in the collection, the Trustees of the Society may dispose of such material by exchange, by donation to other historical societies or related institutions, or by sale to approved buyers only after it has first been offered to the donor. Any money so obtained is to be used to purchase appropriate material for the collection. The Trustees have no power to dispose of material on loan to the Society.
- 6. Loans, except for the purpose of temporary exhibitions, are to be discouraged.
- 7. Collection of objects for the Society's collection may be done by any member of the Society of staff of Jenolan Caves and should be recorded in the Day Book. The actual selection and acceptance of objects can be made only be the Society's committee.
- 8. The Society will record all objects added to its collections promptly using an approved registration system. Every effort is to be made to aquire all relevant information concerning material at the time of its acceptance.



# NOVEMBER MEETING REPORT

Both the Committee and General meetings were well attended despite being held during the day on Saturday, 8 November last.

The main items of business discussed are summarised below:

## THE 1988 SESQUI-CENTENARY

On Thursday, 6 November last in Sydney, members of the Society's working party met with the General Manager of the Tourism Commission Mr Paul Crombie and the Manager of Jenolan Caves Resort, Mr Malcolm Bryan.

The working party reported that a very worthwhile discussion took place. The Commission has agreed to look after the commercial aspects of the celebrations. In turn, the Society was asked to submit ideas to be researched for their commercial merit. The Society is still to pursue other non-commercial activities for the year.

John Dunkley has now arranged alternative finance for the book so that it can be printed. A print run of 1,000 copies is under way. The Society is still invited to contribute financially. The details of this will have to be the subject of the February meeting.

#### JENOLAN CAVES RESERVE DRAFT MANAGEMENT PLAN

Society Secretary Michael Chilcott has visited the Tourism Commission to discuss the present state of this matter. He was advised that the proposed Study Brief was being revised in the light of submissions made by various groups including JCH&PS. When the revision is complete, the Steering Committee will be convened to discuss the document before it is released to call tenders for the study. The Society will shortly be asked to nominate a representative to the Steering Committee.

#### NAMING OF BINDA FLATS

As the Society has had no response from the Office of Mr Cleary on this matter, a formal objection is to be sent to the Geographical Names Board. It was decided to raise with the Board the Society's concern at the lack of proper investigation before names are changed and/or assigned to features within the Reserve and Parish of Jenolan generally.

Local people and the Society should be consulted before any action is taken.

The main issues at present are:

TOP FARM - re-named Binda Flats.

INSPIRATION POINT - re-named Mt Inspiration Lookout

JENOLAN CAVES RESERVE - the name 'Resort' is being used too loosely. The Resort exists within the Reserve and does not replace it.

BINOOMEA RIDGE - this name has been assigned to the ridge down which the Six Foot Track descends to the caves. It is possible that this is not the original name. This will be investigated before we comment.

#### 1987 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

#### 1987 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I begin this year's President's Report by thanking all those people who have contributed to what has been another successful year for the Society. Many individuals have contributed to this success but I especially thank Michael Chilcott for his advice and assistance which has been invaluable to me and therefore to the Society.

On behalf of the Society I also thank the Management and Staff of the Tourism Commission for their co-operation at both Departmental and local levels.

There have been a number of highlights in the past year but the most significant of these is the Society's involvement with the action which will, hopefully, lead to the implementation of a management plan for the Jenolan Caves Reserve. Having had some feedback from other organisations pursuing this matter, I can assure you that the Society does not have a minority On the contrary, we have found that we are in a unique position to represent a broad range of interests. It is imperative that we remain objective and realistic in our submissions and representations. momentum in this management issue must be maintained and should come from the support and interest of the membership.

There is another facet to the subject of momentum as it applies to the Society and the future. It is all too easy for an organisation to become reliant on the activity and interest generated by a

special project. After the project is completed the organisation may lose direction or may even be forgotten.

As an insurance against the latter possibility the Society needs to create more physical reminders of its' existence. The museum concept is of course one possibility but we know how far off that may be. I believe that we must immediately act to expose the Society and we must do this by using our own resources and skills.

We have an archival collection, albeit small, and a little disorganised, but I suggest that within the next year we purchase appropriate display facilities and arrange to place them in public areas at Jenolan. The Society's name should be clearly and boldly displayed and all of this must be of a high standard.

The completion of John Dunkley's book and the publication of the proceedings of the first ever Australian Caves History Seminar will also make important contributions to developing the Society's image as an active, professional and relevant organisation.

Members have established liaison contacts with the Tourism Commission as a prelude to the sesqui-centenary and this coming year will require the interest and above all , the participation of many members.

I would now like to refer back to the 1986 AGM; you may remember that at that time several members of the executive of the Society were affected by the application of a three year limit to their term of office.

President's Report cont'd.

Subsequent detailed study of the Society's minutes to bring the Constitution up-to-date revealed that the three year term limit was not adopted as a constitutional amendment. I have since made clear my regret at this error.

At the time that action was taken it was not simply because it was thought that a rule existed. I believed, as did others, that all office holders should be prepared to place a limit on how long they stay in one position.

It is essential that new ideas and methods be introduced if an organisation is to avoid becoming stale and dominated by a small group of individuals, no matter how well intentioned they may be.

The existence of a hard and fast rule limiting terms of office should not be necessary and may even be detrimental in some circumstances.

For all of the foregoing reasons, I and other members of the current executive wish to introduce by example, the convention of a self-imposed three year limit to terms of office in this Society. For this convention to be effective all members must be aware of it, hence its inclusion in my report. It will also require the responsible action of members, particularly those holding office, in ensuring that other members are prepared for the time when changes in office should take place.

Another Unippet of History

Candles and magnesium flares were replaced by electriclight in 1887; first by battery operation and then by water-powered turbines driving generators - 100 years ago this year. Jenolan Caves Sesqui-Centenary Celebrations The Tourism Commission has incorporated some of JCH&PS proposals into its program of events for Jenolan Caves Sesqui-centenary in 1988. The program is reprinted below and we would be interested in learning of your responses to the program.

'James Mckeown will open and introduce all activities throughout the year, starting with him introducing the New Year's fireworks and barbeque which is held annually in the Grand Arch. It is proposed that Jeremiah Wilson do personal inspections each programmed weekend at \$20 a head.

Jan 16-17: Fireworks and barbeque in the Grand Arch Feb 13-14: Caving techniques demonstrated, abseiling, single rope techniques etc, to be held in the Devil's Coachhouse.

March 12-13: Memorabilia weekend - exhibition to be held in Caves House.

April 16-17: A weekend of specialised cave inspections. The inspections would be historically orientated; for example candlelight inspections, old way into the Baal, discovery of Lucas Cave etc.

May 21-22: Two novel means of transport to Jenolan will be offered for arrival at Jenolan on Saturday afternoon: steam train from Sydney to Mount Victoria, then coaches (possibly vintage cars) to Jenolan; six foot track bush walk/camp leaving Katoomba on Thursday. There will be a black tie Dinner and Dance at Caves House with music by a string quartet. On Sunday morning - a musical concert in Lucas Cave.

June 18-19: An introduction of the guides Jeremiah Wilson, Fred Wilson, James Wiburd, Robert Bailey and Jack Edwards. These guides would give a talk about their lives on Saturday afternoon with slides of the caves they discovered. On Sunday, there will be specialised inspections by these guides for up to ten people.

July 16-17: Special black tie Christmas dinner followed the next morning by an interdenominational church service in the Cathedral Cave.

Aug 13-14: Re-enactments of troopers capturing James Mckeown in the Grand Arch, the proclamation and discovery.

Sept 17-18: A series of walks around Jenolan, showing the way in by Mckeown's Valley, relating the history of the caves and Caves House.

Oct 15-16: A weekend of historical cave inspections - Jersey, Alladin, Elder, Red and White Temples, Wilkinson Branch.

Nov 26-27: Transport as for the May weekend but a barbeque and dance in the Grand Arch.

Dec 17-18: A weekend of speleological history throughout the world with continuous slide shows in the conference centre, equipment displays and children's participation exercises in the Devil's Coachhouse.

### JCH&PS MEETING REPORT

The third JCH&PS meeting for 1987 was held at Jenolan Caves on Saturday evening, the 14 November. The following points may be of interest to many of you:

- JCH&PS will reprint 500 copies of "Steam Cleaning of the Orient Cave", which will sell for \$2 each.
- . Two display cases which will be located in Caves House and exhibit objects from the Society's collection have been appropriately modified.
- . A motion was carried that due to Jenolan's sesquicentenary next year, the 1988 August JCH&PS meeting, usually conducted in Sydney, be held at Jenolan Caves.
- . The Society received a letter requesting information about Harry Smith, the first Manager of Caves House. Would anyone who has some information about Smith please send it to Julia Horne, who will pass it on to the enquirer.

The meeting spent some time considering and discussing two major matters facing the Society at present.

Draft Plan of Management
As explained in the last newsletter, JCH&PS
is represented on the steering committee to
choose a consultant to prepare a draft plan
of management for Jenolan Caves Reserve and
to implement the plan once it emerges.
Cameron McNamara, the consultants chosen to
prepare such a plan, have been seeking
information from groups connected with the
Caves. JCH&PS, or specifically, Steve Opper

(who is now the JCH&PS representative on the steering committee, replacing Michael Chilcott after his swift departure for Switzerland) prepared a detailed report on the areas of concern which JCH&PS have stressed since it first called for a plan of management in 1984. One of the major areas discussed in the submission was the destruction of the natural surface environment by the invasion of exotic weeds. To this end, Steve Opper will accompany a representative from Cameron McNamara on a tour around the Reserve, pointing out the areas where damage has already occurred or is likely to occur in the future.

John Dunkley, who is a subconsultant for Cameron McNamara, addressed the meeting on issues specifically related to the management of the caves in the Reserve. example, consideration needs to be given to such matters as to what extent "historical" signatures in caves are worthy of protection; whether caves are significant because of their historical or legendary associations; and to what extent is "restoration" appropriate, an example being the suggestion that the stream through the Grand Arch eventually be re-routed down its (apparently) original route through Flitch of Bacon Cave? JCH&PS members who spoke felt that "restoration" needs to be considered very carefully in each individual case, to prevent a situation where things are restored to their "original" condition, raising unanswerable questions of what is "original". Given the Caves were once under water, is that what they should be restored to?

Sue Edwards from the Society suggested that regarding the "historical" signatures, those in public view such as in the Grand Arch should be removed to discourage people writing on the walls but that those "hidden" in caves, where the temptation to "add" to the collection of signatures is much more controlled, should not be removed. She added that whatever the decision, a photographic record of all these signatures should be compiled now.

Once the draft plan of management is complete, it will be displayed for public comment for a period of time. We would encourage all members to think about the issues raised above (and any others) and to forward any ideas to Steve Opper, 29 Wyatt St, Goulburn, or Julia Horne, 9/3 Onslow Ave, Elizabeth Bay, 2011.

### "AROUND THE PARK

HUTS IN KOSCIUSKO NATIONAL PARK (By Janet Mackay)

Some two hundred huts and homesteads exist within Kosciusko National Park representing a history of stockmen, previous residents, miners, the Snowy Mountains Hydro-electric scheme, skiers and a number of other users.

Management of huts in the park is the responsibility of the NPWS but, to a large extent, the maintenance of the buildings is undertaken by the Kosciusko Huts Association and a series of voluntary caretaker groups.

In this article we would like to tell you a little about the huts and the management problems associated with them. Perhaps we can explain why some are in better condition than others, and dispell the myth that 'hundreds' of huts have been pulled down.

Unlike countries such as New Zealand and Norway, huts within Kosciusko have not been established specifically for the visitor. Rather, most have been built for some other use, to shelter workers constructing roads and dams as part of

the Snowy scheme, or to provide summer homes for the stockmen who brought cattle into the high country for the summer months. The huts and the areas around them today provide, not only a shelter for people walking, skiing, horseriding or driving in the park, but an insight into how the previous owners lived.

Oldfields Hut sheltered under the ranges bounding the ACT and NSW is accessible by foot, horse or in a good year, skis. It provides a classic example of an old stockman's hut. It is easy to relate to the lifestyle of the cattlemen when you spend some time in this area. On the other hand Four Mile hut in the Kiandra area lends itself to imagining life as a goldminer.

With the obvious age of many of the huts, and the severe climatic conditions in which they are located, deterioration of the materials of which they are constructed is a serious threat. To lose these structures would be a loss of part of the culture of the Snowy Mountains.

Through the combined but limited resources of the NPWS, KHA and the caretaker groups many of the huts are receiving the maintenance, and some are being restored. Recent examples of hut restoration works include Oldfields, Cascades and the Tin Mines complex. All these works are guided by management briefs which incorporate guidelines to retain the historic qualities of the particular building.

Historic buildings will not be replicated or copied, as this would suggest the building was original. Where useable materials from the old building remain they may be used in conjunction with the new materials of a similar type. All new materials are recorded as such in the management briefs. Coolamine Homestead is a classic example of such a restoration where existing materials have been supplemented by new timber etc., using-the old carpentry skills to ensure similar fabric and construction techniques. new timbers in those buildings you will find the year of replacement branded into the timber.

The KHA and caretaker groups carry out work on many of the huts, but it is easy for any visitor to assist with the upkeep of any of the huts they visit. Leaving the hut clean and tidy is essential even if the last party left the mess. Any garbage should be taken out, and should you have the time, dig out the excess ash from the fireplace to assist in the efficiency of the hearth. It is critical to ensure that the fire is completely out before you leave as the old buildings are quick to catch alight. If the hut is equipped with a pit toilet, use it. If not, please make sure you dig a hole for the purpose. Firewood should be collected from an area some distance from the hut, and of course, dead timber only. Respect barriers, signs and fences where they are installed, and if you want further information as to why an area may be closed to vehicles, contact any park office. is always a good reason.

In the past five years five huts have been removed or destroyed in certain circumstances. Fire has been the accidental cause of destruction of a couple of huts, whilst others have been removed for reasons related to the NPWS objectives of conservation. Albina hut is one such example. Located in the fragile alpine are close to Mount Kosciusko, and directly adjacent to the glacial Lake Albina, the pollution associated with the large number of visitors to the hut was severely compromising values of this area. With Seamans but close by and available for shelter, the decision was taken to remove Albina hut. Decisions such as this are not taken lightly, and involve public consultation.

There is a wealth of history to be learned from the old huts and homesteads of Kosciusko National Park, and much has been written about them. Should you wish to learn more or to assist with the maintenance of any structures, contact your nearest park office for further details."

#### JENOLAN CAVES PLAN OF MANAGEMENT

Members may have been wondering if the Jenolan Plan of Management had been lost and forgotten? Well! the answer is, not quite.

It had been hoped that the change of government in N.S.W. would not delay the release of the plan. It is not clear that it has but certain administrative interests within the Tourism Commission, coupled with the change of government, appear to be the cause of the delay.

The first draft was circulated to members of the steering committee about the 10th of March last. The format had been revised by Cameron McNamara. The plan now appears as three (3) separate documents in two (2) volumes.

Volume one, comprises the "Draft Plan" and a separate "Appendix" of "management action points".

The Draft Plan contains the results of all studies made of the area and issues, together with major recommendations on future management strategies and guidelines.

The Appendix lists under fourteen (14) headings, a series of specific actions which are recommended to address the problems identified by various studies. The actions are priority listed and costings are estimated.

Volume two contains the full details of "specialist papers". This document represents a substantial data base on the whole of Jenolan Caves Reserve. In particular, as the concept of 'limits of acceptable change' is implemented, the study papers will provide the benchmark for determining rates of change or the starting point for additional studies to establish such benchmarks.

#### Summary of results so far

Overall the Draft Plan addresses the major concerns expressed by JCHPS over recent years. The magnitude of the problem of deterioration of the natural vegetation and historic landscaping was clearly established. The magnitude of the required restoration is equally clear.

One of the most contentious issues to surface in the Draft Plan is that of future administration of the area. Some recommendations are made in the draft. These range from the present system of full Public Management through to full Private Management. Note however, that the caves and reserve are not included in private options.

During the course of steering committee meetings, JCHPS, National Trust and local management argued for the retention of full Public Management as a matter of historical integrity and continuity. It is unfortunately clear that in the present climate of government policy, such arguments hold little sway.

Architectural Study - a valuable spin-off from the planning process has been the production of an architectural study by Bob Moore. This was done as a separate contract let by Public Works.

Bob Moore's report is arguably the most significant historical project ever undertaken about Jenolan's built environment. The report contains a complete chronology of construction at Jenolan. Mr. Moore has even researched the personal history of the relevant architects and explains how this influenced the style of what was built at Jenolan.

 $\boldsymbol{A}$  collection of maps, plans and photographs details the visual changes and layouts of past years.

What next? - the plan was to be exhibited in April/May last. No further details have been made available. Cameron McNamara has handed over all documents as required by their contract. The ball is now clearly in the hands of the N.S.W. Government and the relevant Ministers.

The Draft Plan contains over 100 pages of text and 13 pages of maps and figures. It will not be possible to casually flick through it and review the proposals.

This Society has participated in the planning process since its' inception. It is fair to say that we have reviewed the documents to a very great extent. Individuals may have opinions about aspects of the plan but logistically, it is not possible to reconcile such matters through normal Society procedures.

If and when the plan is exhibited, it may be possible to provide more detail to members about potentially contentious issues. It is unlikely that the Society will produce a detailed review of the plan for submission to the relevant Government Department.

The Society's work really begins when the plan is adopted. Then it will be necessary to monitor implementation. This should give members plenty to do for about the next 10-20 years!

#### 3.2.2 Thematic Summary

The history and material culture of Jenolan caves thus illustrate a series of interconnected themes which indicate the present day historical and cultural significance of the site.

#### Theme 1: Perennial Nostalgia

The buildings comprising Caves House itself are rich expressions of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century rejection of the city and city life by the middle and upper-classes. This resulted in the embracing of the romantic pastoral ideal of the innate goodness of nature and country life, the championing of the morallyuplifting "strenuous life", together with a yearning for the rustic simplicity and picturesque homeliness of Old England. Jenolan Caves offered sublime and inspiring landscapes, caves seemingly fashioned by the hand of the Almighty, and a revitalising retreat from the ills and evils of the city. WL Vernon's traditional English-style buildings were skilfully designed to fit the picture, for they instantly conveyed the picturesque air of age-old solidity and respectability their patrons sought. Later additions by George McCrae were modified to suit new demands, but still successfully carried through these original themes. The powerful appeal of romantic nostalgia accounted for the homogeniety of the buildings designed betweeen 1898 and 1928.

The current revival of all things old and charming, and the consequent popularity of old-style guest-houses might be seen in a similar sense as a reaction against modern city life with its increasing complexity and anonymity. In view of the history and origin of Caves House, its new popularity is in a way nostalgia for nostalgia itself.

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Theme 2: Reflections of Social Structure

The history and material culture of Caves House and its associated buildings show something of the much more strictly delineated class structure of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The type of people who visited the caves from the early period were wealthy, educated and leisured people from Sydney or on world tours from England. The billiards room, smoking room, trout hatchery are particularly good indications of the type of guests for whom the resort was designed originally, and reflect the government's commitment to catering for the well-to-do in what was considered a proper manner. Contrasts between the size, materials, location and details of accommodation provided for guests on one hand and staff and servants on the other are also pronounced. The 1914 and 1923 wings represent the erosion of the resort's early elite function and image. The built environment to some extent also records the gradual popularization and eventual mass-appeal of the caves from 1920 to the 1980s, with its new modes of accommodation, roads, car parks, kiosks, toilets, picnic and barbeque areas, and so on.

Theme 3: Interaction of Natural and Cultural Environments
This theme will appear in a future newsletter.

Taken from Geeves, Sydney Morning Herald, 4 August 1983, supplied by George Nixon.

'It will surprise no-one to learn that vandals were active in colonial times. Jenolan Caves was one of their favourite haunts. And among the most ardent vandals was a Member of the NSW Parliament, John Lucas, for whom the Lucas Cave was named. After complaining the "visitors are so mischievous as wantonly to destroy these beautiful works of nature," Lucas and his party entered one cave by means of a rope and "brought up some very pretty stalactites." Lucas himself "brought back to Sydney some hundred specimens of the caves, some being four feet long." A Herald reporter was invited to Lucas's office to see the parliamentarian's limestone souvenirs: "Some of these are portions of the slender stems that are gradually formed, like icicles, from the roofs of the caves. Others which are broken off the massive stalactites resemble in shape large shells or knobs, the surface consisting of sparkling crystals." When H.H.Stephenson's English cricketers visited Bathurst in 1862. they were presented with "several unique specimens of stalactite formations...with which they were highly delighted."

#### ADDITIONS AND NEW ARRANGEMENTS AT CAVES HOUSE

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The palatial three-storeyed addition to the Caves House at Jenolan is rapidly nearing completion, and certain of the rooms, including the commodious billiard room, will be available for use at Easter. The additional accommodation which will be provided when the premises are complete will comfortably house 100 guests. The dining room is of handsome proportions, and chaste design. The present lease of existing premises runs out on June 30, and from the day of its expiry the Caves House - then complete in every detail - will be conducted by the Immigration and Tourist Bureau.

The Public Service Board (Messrs. Hanna, Wilshire, and Taylor) spent March 30 at the Caves, with Mr Palmer, of the Tourist Bureau, when certain matters incidental to the equipment and staffing of the Caves House were dealt with. During the afternoon the board were shown through the recently-discovered Orient Cave, which is by experts accorded pride of place for romantic grandeur and weird splendor amongst the mystic subterranean crystal palaces of the world's limestone caverns. This marvellous cave, which is really a series of vaulted chambers, each possessing a variety of distinctive features of unparralleled beauty, will shortly be opened to the public.

#### 3.2.2 Thematic Summary

The history and material culture of Jenolan Eaves thus illustrate a series of interconnected themes which indicate the present day historical and cultural significance of the site.

#### Theme 1: Perennial Nostalgia

The buildings comprising Caves House itself are rich expressions of the late nineteenth and early twentieth century rejection of the city and city life by the middle and upper-classes. This resulted in the embracing of the romantic pastoral ideal of the innate goodness of nature and country life, the championing of the morally-uplifting "strenuous life", together with a yearning for the rustic simplicity and picturesque homeliness of Old England. Jenolan Caves offered sublime and inspiring landscapes, caves seemingly fashioned by the hand of the Almighty, and a revitalising retreat from the ills and evils of the city. WL Vernon's traditional English-style buildings were skilfully designed to fit the picture, for they instantly conveyed the picturesque air of age-old solidity and respectability their patrons sought. Later additions by George McCrae were modified to suit new demands, but still successfully carried through these original themes. The powerful appeal of romantic nostalgia accounted for the homogeniety of the buildings designed betweeen 1898 and 1928.

The current revival of all things old and

charming, and the consequent popularity of old-style guest-houses might be seen in a similar sense as a reaction against modern city life with its increasing complexity and anonymity. In view of the history and origin of Caves House, its new popularity is in a way nostalgia for nostalgia itself.

#### Theme 2: Reflections of Social Structure

The history and material culture of Caves House and its associated buildings show something of the much more strictly delineated class structure of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The type of people who visited the caves from the early period were wealthy, educated and leisured people from Sydney or on world tours from England. The billiards room, smoking room, trout hatchery are particularly good indications of the type of guests for whom the resort was designed originally, and reflect the government's commitment to catering for the well-to-do in what was considered a proper manner. Contrasts between the size, materials, location and details of accommodation provided for guests on one hand and staff and servants on the other are also pronounced. The 1914 and 1923 wings represent the erosion of the resort's early elite function and The built environment to some extent also records the gradual popularization and eventual mass-appeal of the caves from 1920 to the 1980s, with its new modes of accommodation, roads, car parks, kiosks, toilets, picnic and barbeque areas, and so on.

Theme 3: Interaction of Natural and Cultural Environments. This theme will appear in a future newsletter.

#### 3.2.2 Thematic Summary

The history and material culture of Jenolan caves thus illustrate a series of interconnected themes which indicate the present day historical and cultural significance of the site.

Theme 3: Interaction of Natural and Cultural Environments

Jenolan Caves may be seen as a record of the interaction of man and nature. The two underlying factors which have shaped its European history are first the drawing power of the caves themselves and their surrounding landscape, and second the repelling/constraining effect of isolation, rugged terrain and the constricted space of the narrow valley site.

The first factor has drawn the area from its early phase of camping in the Grand Arch to the present extensive complex. The second has invariably made development difficult, and thus has led to ingenious adaptations and applications of engineering, technology and architecture. Zig-zag roads were painstakingly cut down the mountains, a passage cut through the Grand Arch. The site had to have its own source of power and so Australia's earliest hydro-electric system was installed; it has required numerous successive water supply and sewerage works schemes to cope with ever-increasing numbers of visitors. Builders and architects were always forced to build along the

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axes of the valley creeks and to economise with ... both sites and materials. It is therefore not uncommon for sites to have been used three and four times over the 100-odd year history; local limestone was used for the substantial buildings, and the re-use of older materials for new Buildings were usually buildings was also common. tailored to fit the constricted sites, for both aesthetic and practical reasons. Caves House is intentionally picturesque on its site nestled in the valley, surrounded by steep slopes. Later service and staff accommodation were invariably long, narrow and rectangular in shape to fit along the narrow valleys. Footbridges over the streams, running around and under buildings, were a characteristic visual feature of the built environment from 1880 to the 1960s, when some of the creeks were covered over. The drastic alteration of the natural vegetation by clearing, plantations of exotic trees and gardens of tended shrubs was also characteristic of the site since the 1880s, when the environment

It is within the sphere of natural versus cultural forces that the difficult present-day problems of Jenolan Caves and its management arise, for the caves still draw increasing numbers of visitors (250,000 per annum by 1986), while its natural features still present difficulties of access, accommodation, services and space, particularly when combined with attempts at preservation and conservation of the natural landscape, vegetation, fauna and the caves themselves.

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### A Short Story From The Late Walter Heiron.

As most of you will be aware Walter Heiron was a regular visitor to Jenolan for fifty years.

Recently Walter passed away and left us with his memories of his time at Jenolan. This is just one of many.

### BERT BECKMAN: GUIDE NO 5.

When a guide was listed for a cave but no body bought tickets he would have to go and do other work; this was called a "skinger". Often I would meet the guide who had the skinger .I met Bert and he said "Gome for a walk?". So I went into the Temple of Baal with him.

The guides could tell you more ,with only you there, than they could in " narty. We used to sit down and talk, to fill in time. On the day I went in with B ert we were looking up at a formation called Baal and I said to Bert " Who puts the light up there when it goes off?" He said. "I do. " He used to climb up a set of spikes in the wall and there was nothing else to hang on to. I asked him if he didn't get nervous. "No", he said," but when your foot starts to slip your tummy goes all over".

In those days they had naked switches

for the lights in the caves. Some guides would use a bit of rubber to move the switches, some would use their hats, other would use their handkerchiefs, but Bert didn't use anything. I watched him and the sparks would go flying. "Don't you get a shock?" I asked. "No," he said, "watch; my hands are dry".

lived on his own in one of those little huts on the side of the hill above the boiler house. One day he invited me to go and have a look at the wireless set that he had made himself. He turned it on and it gave a beautiful sound. It was loud and it could also get Western Australia- in those days that was a feat. But it had no cover ; it just lay flat on a piece of packing case. I asked him why he didn't make a cabinet for it. "Got no wood". So I told him that I would send some up to him. I got the timber that I thought he would need and arrange with the people in the tourist bureau to have it sent to him. The next time I was there Bert thanked me and said" I want you to have a look at the tail of my shirt". This had me puzzled me so I went up up to his hut and saw that he had made a lovely cabinet. And there, where they used to put a piece of silk over

When the punt used to sink in the River Cave Bert used to dive down , with no clothes on, and put the chain underneath. He said it was too cold to have a costume on. One day he was diving to put the chain under when he heardthe footstepsof a party coming through with NO2 guide, Archie Taite. Archie was always up to some devilment and this time he had a party of girls. There was no place where Bert could get out, there was a path in and a path out. So all he could do was swim under the bridge. He told me that he got hold of the bridge with his hands and threw his body under it. Bert was shivering like any thingand in comes Archie with the girls. He saw Bert there and stood the girls right over him."Look girls it's (so ..... many ) feet deep and it's flowing slowly...". He kept on talking. The manager and the engineer were there, so finally the manger said "Come on there move onplease:."

FROM "JENOLAN THE COLDEN AGES" an extract from the Bathurst Free Press, written by a discoverer George Whiting.

#### THE LUCAS 1860

At ten a.m on the morning of 4th January, two visitors named Nicholas Irwin and your present correspondent resolved to make an attempt to measure the height of a lofty pinnacle over hanging the creek. To do this it was necess ary to climb up the precipitous side of the mountain, to a magnificent natural arch, spanning a deep abyss between two mountains. After some delay we got safely to the summit. While here my attension was attracted by the appearance in the side of a precipice a great way beneath us and shrouded over by a great mantle of twenty or thirty feet of what seemed to be ivy. Resolving to attempt this spot Nicholas Irwin led the way and I followed him up, scrambling and sliding through the loose stones and thick bush around us, and ledby the apparent ivy. We gained the opening,

found the ivy was an evergreen olive all springing out of an ancient twisted knarled tree. We became convinced that we were probably the first human being's that had ever penetrated into this mysterious spot. The ground was covered in a soft loose mould. The spars and stalatites were of exquisite beauty in their pristine unbroken and undilapidated state, not the slightest trace or vestige of human beings ever having set foot there, for it would have to have crept through the next narrow been impossible opening without breaking the delicate spars or leaving some slight trace of passage . Unfortunately, having no candles we were compelled to return by the perilous way by which we descended. We immediately informed some others of the party and visits were made on two succeeding occassions to the same spot.

The party next day was C Whalan Jun, E Whalan, Rev W Mayne, RevT Skewes, J Wilson, A Whalan, C and W Armstrong J Harvey, J Hughes, W Stranger, G Whiting, J Falls, James Nolan, and E Armstrong, who are witnesses of the truth of these facts.

Two hours exploring by this large party only had the effect of exhausting all our candles and convincing us of the unexplored fathomless extent of this new discovery."

Whiting goes to some length to assure us that no other person had been there before. He provides description of what happened above the ground, but there is no mention of what was found inside. Given the exploration time of two hours, we can only speculate upon the extent of their discoveries.

## From the Secretary's Desk

The last meeting which was held in the Cathedral Chamber of the Lucas Cave was a huge success. About 40 members wound their way down to the Grand Arch before moving into the Lucas Cave. For those of us who had too much to eat for dinner the walk was most beneficial. Everyone gathered in a variety of positions on the floor or where-ever comfortable and the meeting soon got underway.

Our President Janet Macfarlane welcomed those members and guests present and thanked Nigel Scanlan for the use of the Cathedral Chamber. In addition to normal business the following important matters were discussed;

- \* M.A.A. Seminar At this stage it looks as though the M.A.A. Seminar will be held in May although the exact date is not known. The suggested timetable would be a Saturday session at Hartley followed by a Sunday session at Jenolan. The estimated cost for this weekend would be approximately \$20.00 to \$30.00.
- \* Grand Arch Redevelopment Plans are currently underway for the redevelopment of the area from Caves House down to the Grand Arch. The meeting agreed that the Society should have representation in any discussions in this regard. As a result the following motion was moved by Sue Hardy and seconded by Doug Short.

"That the Society's curators be appointed the Society's spokespersons to be involved in the discussions on the redevelopment of the area from Caves House down to the Grand Arch, incorporating all structures in that area." This redevelopment could see a possible re-siting of the Society's Post Office Museum back to its original position.

\* Clean-up Australia Day - Sue Hardy advised that she is co-ordinating the National Clean-up Australia Day activities at Jenolan. This event will be held on Sunday 24th March. Wear old clothes and meet at the Guides Office at 9a.m. Don't forget to wear a sturdy pair of shoes and gloves are a must.

\* Historical Bird Display - Several members have seen the restoration work that is currently being undertaken on this cabinet. This work is being carried out by Anthony and Sue Hardy. Anthony gave the meeting a brief run-down on the restoration process which was very interesting. The eventual aim is to have the cabinet restored to its original condition although its final display position is unclear. A vote of thanks was extended to Anthony and Sue for the excellent job they are doing with the cabinet.

The meeting was declared closed at 9-45p.m.

#### After the Meeting

Some members may be aware that the famous Australian opera star Donald Smith recorded two songs in the Cathedral Chamber being "Bless this House" & "At the End of the Day" which were at one stage available from the souvenir kiosk. The Cathedral Chamber once again reverberated to the sounds of opera music tonight. One of our own members Domino Houlbrook sang to the meeting a beautiful repertoire of songs. Perched high on the Pulpit the sweet sound of song was music to everyones ears.

After the sound of applause died down there were three options available to exit the cave. The first of these was to exit by the way everyone entered. The second was a trip to see the original way into the Lucas Cave by the Sole of the Boot with Anthony Hardy. Several people took this option and were glad they did. It is an interesting part of the Lucas Cave that not many people get to see from the inside.

The third and by far the most popular option was to join Peter Culley and Barry Richard on a tour through the Lucas Cave, part of the River Cave and then out through the Temple of Baal Cave and the Binoomea Cut. Believe me it is no fun carrying a bag full of minute books and a sheet out this way. All agreed that the tour was most enjoyable and thanks were extended to Barry and Peter for giving up their time to lead this tour.

## Jenolan Caves Accommodation Houses

From the time of the discovery of the Caves at Jenolan in 1838 until the erection of the first accommodation but in 1880, visitors slept in the Grand Arch. Ladies slept on the south side and Gentlemen to the north.

In 1879 Mr Jerimiah Wilson, the first caretaker and official guide (1866), erected a slab kitchen above the junction of Surveyors and Wallaby Creeks. In 1880 he commenced building the first sleeping accommodation, consisting of a corrugated iron hut containing one large dining room and five bedrooms. In 1884 one visitor wrote; in part—"the accommodation consisted of five bedrooms with seven beds, one sitting room with two sofas—we found twenty—five people there."

By November 1887 a large two storey wooden house had been built capable of providing accommodation for thirty people and had every convenience a traveller could want — except a license. Between 1887 and 1895 (date unknown) a second two storey building was built which outwardly was identical to the first. On the 14th March 1895 fire destroyed the original accommodation as an account of the fire reads "the new house alone was saved — none of the household effects were saved."

Wilson wrote on the 25th March 1895 to the Premier (the Hon. George Reid) and stated "as I am not in a position to rebuild — I have written to the Department of Mines asking them to resume and compensate me for all building and improvements on and adjoining my special lease. I have been keeper of these caves for twenty-eight years and have erected all the buildings — at my own expense."

Wilson retired in 1896 and in the same year approval was given for an accommodation house to be built on two acres of land specially dedicated for that purpose. The Northern wing, designed by the Government Architect, was completed in 1898.

This wing, constructed of limestone, forms the central area of the present complex. It was leased to Mr Harry Smith for a period of ten years.

1907 saw a contractor removing the two storey wooden building to make room for a new addition - the stone two storey wing. Completed in 1909 "its long verandah was most inviting to incoming guests."

In 1914 work was commenced on the third stage, the three storey addition. This addition contained more bedrooms and included the present Dining Room which was first used in September 1916, on the 27th.

Mr Harry Smith's lease expired after eighteen years and the N.S.W. Government took over the house on July 1st 1916 until it was leased by the Peppers Hotel group in July of 1990.

After a period of bushfires in 1919 a wet spell resulted in a major flood which inundated the ground floor of Caves House. Furniture was washed out and a piano was lodged half in and half out of a ground floor window. Water pipes were torn out and the sewerage and electricity failed. Several thousand tons of debris were deposited in the Grand Arch including mud, rubble and fixtures and furniture from Caves House.

As a result of these floods stormwater channels were built in the vicinity of Caves House. Various minor alterations were carried out to the House in the years to follow and 1990 saw a major renovation of the House commence. This renovation is being carried out by Peppers and as at the date of this newsletter the restoration work is progressing well.

Caves House will once again return to the way it was "in the olden days." For a detailed account of the current work please read on.

## What's happening at Caves House?

No doubt many members are curious as to what the Peppers Hotel Group have planned for Caves house. As you may be aware Peppers commenced their lease of Caves House on the 2nd of July last year and have begun their restoration of Caves House. Those who have visited Jenolan during the last six months will have seen certain sections of the house undergo a metamorphosis. The first section to be renovated was the Dining Room which has been given a fresh coat of paint, sections of the walls covered with a nice floral design wallpaper and new French style drapes hung. All restoration work is being carried out in keeping with the period.

The renovators then turned their attention to the foyer and the first flight of the grand staircase. The carpet was removed and the original wooden parquetry floor was polished to a nice finish. The reception desk was relocated closer to the wall, the large chandelier was replaced and a large Persian style carpet was laid out. A new strip of carpet was laid between the ground and first floor. The Piece de Resistance is the antique display cabinet which Peppers have generously allowed the Society use of for display purposes. Please refer to the Presidents report on page two for further details regarding this cabinet and associated display. Overall the standard of finish is of a high quality and the foyer looks very nice.

The Ballroom has just about been completed at the time of writing and has been made into a guest lounge complete with greyish-blue carpet and several comfortable sofas. In addition a fire place has been constructed at the end of the room and is actually a reversal of the old fire place in the office.

## HISTORICAL NETTLE CAVE INSPECTION

On Sunday the 10th February there will be a special inspection of the Nettle Cave, conducted by Ernst Holland. Please meet outside the Guides Office at 10a.m. There is a limit of 30 places on this tour and the minimum age is 8 years. Gloves are also recommended for the climb up. The Nettle Cave is an upper passage of the Devil's Coach House and there is a good view of the Northern entrance from the Nettle Cave.

The following is an extract from the book "Australia's First Century" and describes a visit to the Nettle Cave.

"For the trip one adopts the oldest and most compact clothes possible; no ribbons or trimmings must be left hanging to catch on a point of rock. The Guide takes his magnesium wire-lamp and a supply of candles, the visitors provide themselves with candlesticks (a peculiar form is in vouge with a saucer to catch the sperm drippings) and matches, and the procession starts. Down into the mouth of the Grand Arch we wind along, out to its lower entrance, and then, with a sharp leftward turn, mount some half covered steps to a grating that bars the cave mouth. This is the Nettle Cave. The reason is apparant at once: those tall weeds that edge our stairway can sting with great effect. Our guide opens a gate in the grating, lets us all in and bars it again. Then the candles are lighted - they will not be much wanted here, but it is as well to get into the routine at once - and we start off down a slope thick with dust. Here the formations are, as a rule, of great size, but covered with an impalpable yellow powder, and quite wanting in brilliancy; they are mutilated, too, to a large extent, by former visitors,, excursionists of twenty years ago, who were anxious to keep up their rifle shooting. Presently we come out into daylight in the side of a huge vault, and find ourselves a hundred feet or so up in the southern wall of the Coach-house, with the light streaming down through the summit-hole on masses of fantastic stalagmite; some imitating a lobster's back, others like drooping branches of willow, green from the rain."



#### FEATURE 1

## Jenolan Caves in 1872

by W. Slattery

The railway was been constructed through Tarana at this time and we supplied the Contractor with a lot of fencing material. On one ocasion a man named Pat Hartigan and myself were splitting timbers near the Duckmaloy one afternoon Jerry Wilson who was recently appointed Caretaker at the Caves came to our camp and said he wanted us to go with him to the Caves that evening when asked why so urgent he replied their is a Bullock team coming from Oberon with a load of flooring boards and we want help to get them down the mountain and then I want ye to get timber and strip enough bark to build a sheltershed at the Caves. We saddled up our horses rolled up our kit and away we went through the scrub about ten miles to the top of the Caves hill were we camped for the night in the morning the teamster voked up six bullocks we then cut down a small tree lashed the boards in to the limbs of the tree hooked the bullocks on to the tree and after four hours manuvering we landed at the mouth of the grand arch. Those boards were to build a dancing floor in the grand arch at that time parties used to reach the caves in horse back and stayed overnight they would pass the time dancing when not exploring the caves we camped at the entrance to the arch for ten days wilst getting the timber required for the shed during that time we done a bit of exploring. The arch on your right going in from Hampton was called the devils coach house about a mile up that creek there is a few acres of level ground this was called McKewins hole. This is were an escaped convict named McKern was arrested wich led to the first discovery of the caves. Their is a small cave on the hill

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closeby where this man lived and at the time showed signs of habitation there was also about half an acre of land that had been cultivated part of the fence was still visible. By what I leaned from the old hands at that time McKeon and another man escaped from a convict settlement at a place called the Hill about two miles on the eastern side of Muillins Falls.

Those escapees were a large for several years they came out occasionally and raided the settlers taking what they required. Eventually the police and a couple of the old pioneers went out determined to locate their hiding place after being out three or four days they camped overnight on one of the mountains in the vicinity of the caves early next morning they saw smoke rising out of this p[articular gully guided by the smoke they discovered McKeon working in his garden. The other man was not found but there was a mound of earth close by and it was surmised that he was buried there.

The above account is from the unpublished diary of William Slattery, who later operated a timber mill in Lithgow. The spelling and punctuation are reproduced as in the original, with the permission of his descendant, Trevor Evans of Lithgow. It was transcribed by Jim Smith who requests readers to locate "the Hill" and "Muillin's Falls". Jim can be contacted at 65 Fletcher Street, Wentworth Falls, 2782.

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#### FEATURE 2

## Annual Report 1893

Progress Report by Mr. W. S. Leigh. Superintendent of Caves. Department of Mines and Agriculture, Geological Survey Branch, Sydney, 14 February, 1894.

Sir.

I have the honour to submit the following progress report on the caves for the year 1893:-

During the year I have inspected the following caves in connection with the general supervision, improvement works, and new discoveries. &c., viz., Jenolan (four visits), Wellington, Bendithera, Wombeyan, and Cooleman.

The most important new discovery was made at Jenolan, where Mr J. Wilson, keeper, discovered on the 20th February, another large and distinct branch of the Imperial Cave, which, in point of beauty and interest, is equal to any other known cave in the group. It branches off from the "Right Imperial," near the "Gem of the West," and its passages, intersecting each other at various points, total over 2.000 feet in length.

Subsequently, further extensions, consisting of two small branches, were discovered in the cave.

#### Jenolan Caves

Number of visitors, 1.511. On account of the shortness of funds it was found necessary in July to suspend for the time being improvement works at these and other caves. Good progress had, however, been made in the carrying out of more urgent and important works. At the time operations were suspended the men were engaged in opening up the new cave, and so far the work accomplished is most satisfactory. I estimate it will take two men about four months to complete the necessary improvements in this cave. The ironwork for same has not yet been provided.

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It having been decided to light the Lucas Cave with electricity, a new dynamo and six are lamps and fittings were procured from the Western Electric Company, Chicago, for the purpose. The arc lamps, the first to be used at Jenolan, should, on account of its spacious chambers, produce a grand effect in this cave. The passages will be lighted with the ordinary incandescent lamps.

As the present dynamo in use for the Imperial Cave lights was driven direct from the turbine, it was found necessary in the new arrangement to remove same to a position suitable for driving from a counter-shaft, by which the new dynamo will also be driven. This portion of the work, which embraced the supply and erection of counter-shafting, pulleys, belting, &c., building of concrete foundations and erection of dynamos, was performed by Mr J. J. Paterson, contractor. The cables have also been laid to the mouth of the cave.

The other portion of the work, viz., the hanging of the lamps and the running of the wires. &c., through the cave, was to have been carried out by the Electric Light Department, simultaneously with the portion already done, but the Department has not yet been able to spare the services of the Chief Electrician, who has been entrusted with the work.

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## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

I have very much pleasure in presenting a report of the Society's activities during 1990.

Traditionally, four committee and four general meetings were held at Jenolan during the last twelve months. Following the general meeting on Saturday, 12th May, Basil Ralston, a former Jenolan Guide and author of Jenolan - The Golden Ages of Caving, was our guest speaker. Basil very kindly presented to the Society his original 1987 manuscript titles The Men of Jenolan and gave permission for the Society to reprint his poem Why do I do it? and a chapter Fun in the Lucas which were not included in the published version. We are fortunate to have sole selling rights of his book at Jenolan and to date have sold 278 copies through the Ticket Office.

On 2nd July, the Peppers Hotel Group formally commenced their lease of Caves House. I was pleased to represent the Society at a special meeting with Paul Rubie (Chairman, The Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust), Mike O'Connor (Chairman and Managing Director of the Peppers Hotel Group and Philip Riley (Executive Director Operations and Development for Peppers Hotel Group).

On Saturday evening, 14th July, a special meeting attended by members of the Guiding Staff and the Society's Committee was held in the Guides' Office. The aim of this informal meeting, chaired by Phil McGuire, was to re-establish the relationship between the Society and the Guiding Staff. It was agreed that more social functions be included in the Society's calendar ... bush dances, smoke concerts, etc. Following this meeting, I wrote personally to all 25 members of the Guiding Staff (including financial members of the Society) inviting them to our August general meeting and a social "get-together" afterwards in the Resources Centre. It was on this occasion that we formally welcomed Seamus O'Brien, Manager of Caves House, to Jenolan and to the Society as a new member.

The November meeting held in the Cathedral Chamber of the Lucas Cave was very well attended ... perhaps all meetings, even Annual General Meetings, should be held in the caves! At the conclusion of the meeting, Domino Houlbrook, a casual guide and member of the Society, sang for us from the heights of the pulpit. It was indeed a JCHAPS Newsletter

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very special occasion. But there was more ... three choices in fact. Return as we had come to the Guide's Office for supper; an inspection led by Anthony Hardy to the Sole of the Boot (the original way into the Lucas Cave) or a tour through the Temple of Baal and the Binoomea Cut accompanied by Barry Richard and Peter Culley.

On Sunday, 11th November, members of the Society catalogued items and helped with the Caves House foyer display. We are most grateful to Peppers for making the magnificent Victorian bookcases available to the Society for the display of artifacts and memorabilia. We also appreciate Peppers' encouragement in providing accommodation in the "historical wing" of Caves House on a no charge/pay for meals basis for members carrying out specific tasks at Jenolan on behalf of the Society.

In December, George Djordjewitsch was appointed General Manager of the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust and we look forward to a long and happy association.

During the year, the Society officially took over the control and running of the Resources Centre. We also agreed to maintain the updating of the Managers' Honour Roll, presented some years ago to Caves House by the late Walter Heiron. Peppers are keen to continue with this tradition and we are presently confirming past managers with the Trust. We have also undertaken to preserve the Native Bird collection and we than Anthony and Sue Hardy for the research and restoration work they have carried out with Hartcorp, consultants for the redevelopment of the Grand Arch Precinct that area from Caves House to the Grand Arch) involving possible resiting of the Society's Post Office Museum.

My sincere thanks to the Committee and members of the Society for their enthusiasm and support during 1990, particularly our hard working Secretary, Scott Melton; Treasurer, Dimity Short; and Membership Secretary, Maureen Sullivan. Additionally, we thank Scott for his efforts in producing the JCHAPS T-Shirts and sweatshirts and his logo design; Dimity, for providing raffles at our meetings; and Maureen, for attending to the suppers.

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To those members of the Committee who are not standing for reelection, we thank you for your support and hope you will continue to maintain an interest in the Society.

We very much appreciate the continued co-operation of Paul Rubie, Ernst Holland and the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust, Nigel Scanlon and the Guiding Staff, and Seamus O'Brien the staff of Peppers Jenolan Caves House.

One of the very positive results which has emerged from this year of change at Jenolan is the feeling of greater co-operation, friendship and respect which has developed between the Trust, Peppers and the Society. I am sure this augurs well for all, but more importantly, for Jenolan.

#### CURATOR'S REPORT

The main achievement for 1990 was establishing a display in the Resource Centre for which many thanks are owed to Janet & Les Macfarlane, Scott Melton and Steve Opper. We have removed some objects from the Seismograph station to the storage area of the Resources Centre in order to improve access to the Society's JCHAPS Newsletter

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collection, so that may continue to catalogue these objects. Detailed notes on how to catalogue the collection are available to any member who wishes to participate in this project and thanks go especially to Scott Melton who has continued to help greatly with this task. Peppers Resort has expressed interest in co-operting with the Society during its renovations, particularly in establishing a new resources centre. The Museum Association of Australia are willing to provide professional advice to the Society and Peppers about the sorts of requirements needed for such a centre. We await further developments.

A thought about the future. One of the problems with maintaining and developing the Society's collection over the last few years has been the lack of people who could put in enough time to really improve the collection. That most other historical societies often have a voluntary museum workforce of about 10 (mostly retired) people who devote 1-2 days each week to their museums, I think, highlights our problem, since most of our members have full time jobs and so, understandably, have much less time to devote to the museum. Our aim for this year should, perhaps, be one of persuading Peppers (if indeed they need persuading), that the history of Jenolan is an important reason why people visit the Caves. Indeed, not only is Jenolan a "masterpiece of nature", but it also has important cultural dimensions for Australian Europeans for over two hundred years. The Society has an interesting collection of artifacts which demonstrates this history and could be well displayed and utilised in any developments that Peppers are planning. These developments, then, should allow for professional advice on how best to display the objects, not only so they tell a story in a way that visitors will respond to, but also so the objects are properly cared for. Our contribution, not withstanding the objects, could be then looking after the displays, a job that could be done at each meeting every three months.



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# VANDALISM AT JENOLAN CAVES.

Regarding the Jenolan Caves, several cases of vandalism have recently be reported. Some excursionists have amused themselves by carving their names about the place. The Minister for Mines finds that the legal position of the department in the matter is very indefinite. To make matters clear Mr. Cook has given directions that the cave reserves of the colony should be placed under the Public Trust Act of 1897. This Act provides for the appointment of trustees who are empowered to make rules and regulations for the management and control of such trusts. In this manner it is hoped that any damage to the caves will in future be prevented.





A letter has been received from Seamus O'Brien, General Manager of Caves House. The following extract should be of interest to members:

Letters have also been sent from the Society to the Oberon Shire Council, the Management of the Trust and all Trust members regarding the development of the "Grand Arch Precinct". It is not planned to reproduce these letters here. The following, however, summarises their contents:

- \* The Society does not wish to see this area developed in a way that will compromise the historic panoramas of Jenolan and detract from the historic aspects of Jenolan's proposed World Heritage Listing.
- \* The Society is concerned that it appeared the plans for the redevelopment were close to being submitted for Development Approval without groups with a proven interest having the chance to comment on them.
- \* The Society was concerned about the style and location of any proposed buildings in the area and that any new building should be placed sympathetically within the valley and be of the same architectural character as Caves House and other earlier buildings.

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- \* The Society is aware that other groups, notably of the speleological movement, are concerned about the re-development from a scientific perspective, fearing that altered air flow may be damaging to the caves.
- \* The Society considers that it has a legitimate role to play in the proposed re-development of Jenolan and that it's comments and criticisms are made in good faith and the Society is willing to discuss any aspect of the proposed re-development with the Trust.

(The above is a precis of the salient points of a letter by Janet Macfarlane (President) to the Oberon Shire Council and by Steve Opper (Vice-president) to the General Manager and all members of the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust by the editor.)

### Caving - Western Australian Style by Scott Melton

"Stretch your wings Australia - let Compass look after you" is the catch cry of our newest domestic airline. Having been observed on an Ansett flight back in July with Phil McGuire (where we were accused of plotting to overthrow our leader, Janet) and on an Australian Airlines flight to Adelaide in August I thought it was time to give the newest airline a try. Perth was my destination to see what the Sandgroper State had in the way of caves and how they compared to Jenolan.

I arrived in Perth on the coolest September day for 18 years. The weather cleared by the next day for my 900km drive to Monkey Mia to see the wild dolphins which come in to visit and feed. It was interesting to see but it was a shame it is becoming very crowded with tourists. A highlight of the visit was a ride on a 21 seat hovercraft.

After Monkey Mia I drove back down the coast, spending a night in Kalbarri where I joined a scenic flight over the Murchison River Gorge and the coastline to the south of Kalbarri. My next stop was Cervantes where a visit to the Pinnacles Desert in Nambang National Park is a must. The pinnacles are eroded limestone pillars that stick up out of the yellow sand - some reaching a height of over 15 feet. Cervantes was also the sight of the oil spill from the Greek oil tanker Kirki.

Back to Perth for a few days to visit friends. While in Perth I visited Crystal Cave at Yanchep National Park. It is a medium size cave which is very close to the surface. Some nice formations were evident but with the dry conditions the pools in the cave were not

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full, loosing what is otherwise a nice reflection called the "Twin Cities".

To the South of Perth there lies a stretch of coastline about 100km long. In this area are some 350 caves, four of which are open to the public. The first cave visited was Yallingup which is a self guided and run by the Busselton Tourist Bureau. It is an interesting cave with a profusion of stalactites. I spend that night in Yallingup Caves House which like Jenolan Caves House now is, is run by private concerns. It is styled along the same lines as Jenolan Caves House but is not as large. It does overlook the ocean though. If in this part of WA it is well worth a stay.

The next cave visited was Mammoth Cave (seems like everywhere has a Mammoth cave!!). It is a large cave with a stream flowing through it. Lovely formations with a good assortment of straws and stalactites. At one point of our tour the guide turns of the lights and as your eyes grow accustomed to the darkness, they start to see a faint glow from the entrance which is called "The Break of Dawn" and is really quite effective.

Next stop - Lake Cave. Only a small cave but very heavily decorated. A feature of the cave is the "Suspended Table" which was formed of calcite spread across a dirt floor between two stalactites which was eventually washed away. The cave is lit with some coloured lights which are effective but don't show off the true beauty of the cave like white lights do.

Talking of lights - the management of Jewel Cave has come up with a novel system of track lighting which involves the use of fibre optic cables laid along the track. They are blue and when all the normal lights are out it gives you the feeling of walking through space. When on the platform the guide illuminates the chamber to reveal a straw formation which measures in at some 5.9m in length.

Ron Spackman, who is the Manager of the cave, related to me a story concerning the straw which I found interesting. During one tour a visitor pointed out to him the fact that the straw appeared to be swaying about 4 to 5 inches. At first Ron was disbelieving but observations revealed that it was actually swaying. Ron led the party out of the cave and then sealed both the natural and manmade entrances with tarpaulins; ins. Subsequent checking with the Meteorology Department revealed that there was an intense low pressure system located overhead at the time which was causing the

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cave to breath quite heavily. Given the length of the straw it is amazing that it did not break. Air tight doors are currently being installed.

Ron also informed me that the week before my visit there were several members of the Society and Guiding staff in the area for the Cave Management Conference. (This may be so but how do we know it was not another attempt at a coup. One that I was not even party to.) If I had known the conference was on I would have rearranges my itinerary.

The Margaret River area, which is the general name given to the caves area, is also home to some fine wineries. Let's suffice to say that I was hoping Compass could stretch its wings just a little bit further on the way home. After my visit to this area it was onto the old whaling town of Albany before climbing both Castle Rock and Bluff Knoll in one day. Never again!! Lovely view but very tiring (or is it just that I am unfit!!!). Called in at Wave Rock at Hyden before heading back to Perth and home.

All in it was an enjoyable two weeks away. I travelled over 4500km in this time but it can get very lonely travelling by yourself. Compass was excellent and I would have no hesitation in recommending them to anyone contemplating flying in Australia. The service is excellent and the aircraft new and well appointed. As mentioned, Yallingup Cave House is worth a visit. If you are planning a couple of weeks away I can recommend that you give some consideration to visiting the friendly state of WA.



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

#### ANNUAL REPORT 1894

PROGRESS Report by Mr. W. S. Leigh, Superintendent of Caves, for the Years 1894. Department of Agriculture and Mines, Geological Survey Branch.

Sydney, 11 January, 1895.

Sir.

I have the honour to submit the following progress report on the Caves for the year 1894: —

During the year I have inspected the following caves in connection with their general supervision, improvement, works, and new discoveries, &c., viz., Jenolan, Wombeyan, Yarrangobilly, Wellington, Bungonia, Abercrombie, and Rosebrook.

New discoveries were made at Jenolan, Abercrombie and Wombeyan. At Jenolan on the 16th February, a fresh passage was found extending due east from the "Alabaster Hall" in the Slattery Cave, which leads to some large and exceptionally pretty cavities.

The total number of visitors who signed the books at the different caves, inclusive of those to the Kanangra walls, near Jenolan, was 4,413, showing a substantial increase on the returns for last year.

#### Jenolan Caves

Number of visitors, 1,038. The work of improving and opening up the new cave, which was suspended in July, 1893, on account of the retrenchment scheme, was not resumed until June, 1894, when Guide F.J. Wilson, whose services as guide were not required during the winter, was temporarily engaged to proceed with the work. With the assistance of one of the other guides, when he could be spared for this duty, very fair progress was made, inasmuch that at the commencement of the busy season, when the work was stopped, about 300 feet of passages had been opened up, and the formations protected by erecting wire-netting.

The installation of electric lights, in the Lucas Cave, has been satisfactorily accomplished. The preliminary work, viz., the erection of

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dynamo and counter-shafting, &c., was completed in 1893. The remainder, embracing the whole of the work in the cave, was carried out during June and July last, by Mr. Fitzmaurice and assistants, of the Electric Light Department. The lights comprise six arc lamps, suspended in the large chambers, and about seventy incandescent lamps distributed throughout the passages. The arc lamps are well suited for this cave, the large chambers they illuminate being now seen to much better advantage.

The plantation and tracks at Jenolan, which got into a bad condition through dispensing with the services of the gardener, are now in a much improved state, the man having been temporarily re-engaged in September to put same in proper order.

Partial extract from the annual report of the Mines Department 1894.

Yes that's right music in the Cathedral (is that Warren's truck I can hear?) emanating from a CD player with a selection of 6 CD's (is Gracie Field on CD?). Nigel hasn't said what they are and I refuse to make bad jokes on the subject (at the moment anyway). Thanks for the info Nigel (lifted from the Guides Newsletter written by Nigel by the editor).

#### THE EDITOR'S CONTRIBUTION

Well here I am again. Number 4 of 4 for 1991. The next meeting will involve elections for the Committee and all that. This includes Newsletter

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Editor. I'll be running for, though possibly from, the position (I'm not sure yet) and so I though that I would give everyone a chance of considering having a go of being editor. I fearless leader congratulated me on becoming editor last year with the words - "It's one of the most hated positions in the Society". Well with that what could I do but resign. She wouldn't let me and so here I am still. Ahem. In fact the position is only as "bad" as you make it (or have other people make it). So what is the recipe for being a ICHAPS editor?

This is now christened as "Barry's Retreat" and is reached from the six-foot track by a clamber up the cliff near Carlotta Arch and through a short tunnel.

Then on to the Sole of the Boot entrance, with a short nature study of a Satin Bower Bird's run on the way, and more fine views across the Jenolan River valley. Finally underground and in the Cathedral, we were treated to the first of two musical performances. The new CD player, amplifier and

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stereo speakers were given a full work out, until our ears were ringing with the echoes. Next, after the group had descended rather sedately via the steps rather than down the mudslide, Cathie Draheim sang some verses from "Amazing Grace" with the tunnel providing a beautiful reverberating sound.

The rockpile was our next challenge, especially for the young ones. However there was much of interest, with one-hundred year old graffiti including signatures, dates and the outline of a (wooden) crutch. Our unexpected appearance like modern-day troglodytes caused much surprise to the members of the first scheduled tour of the day through the River Cave.

We wandered along beside the River and paid our obligatory respects to "Bertha" and visited Queen Esther's chamber. Some curious fungus growing on an empty cable drum fascinated both children and grown-ups. Then (for me) the highlight of the tour was the Red and White Temples. All the adults were induced to venture up the ladder to see the temples, with myself managing to sneak in two visits. On the return from the temples we saw the entrance to the Barralong Cave and remembered the efforts of John Culley and Ron Newbould in their discovery of a new and fragile cave system.

Finally, we climbed the steps through the Orient Cave and came out via the Binoomea Cut. The tour had taken 3 hours but thanks to the interesting and informative guidance of Barry we were sorry to leave the caves. Thanks also to Nigel for allowing us to tour the caves.

P.S. We hope to be able to tour the "north side" caves after the February Meeting.

# Tourism threat to fragile caves

There are fears development may spoil one of Sydney's favourite day trip destinations, the Jenolan Caves.

Proposals to maximise the tourism potential of the caves have made conservation groups auxious for the future of what the National Trust describes as a "unique and fragile ecosystem".

The caves area, classified by the National Trust, listed on the Register of the National Estate and proposed for a World Heritage listing, is the subject of a development application being considered by Oberon Shire Council.

Mr Stephen Davies, conservation director of the National Trust, said there was concern the council proposed to rezone the area for tourism and to approve the development application over the New Year without a full environmental impact statement.

Although the trust had been involved in the discussions with the council about the area, it had not been informed of the rezoning proposal.

Nor was the trust or any other conservation or caving group represented on the Jenolan Caves Trust, which manages the site. However, the Peppers Hotel Group (lessees of Jenolan Caves House) and the NSW Tourism Commission were represented.

Mr Davies said elements of the \$1.6 million development met with National Trust approval in principle - for example, the proposal to relocate the busparking area to preserve the habitat of the colony of rare spiders in the Grand Arch.

And while removal of the existing hodgepodge of kiosks and out-buildings was appealing, the excavations for a new tourist facility could pose a threat to the water system of the area.

Some consultants' reports have been commissioned by the proponents but the technical complexities meant that public groups who wished to comment on the proposal would need expert advice.

Since the development application was being exhibited by council until January 3, open public examination of, and comment upon, the proposals was made even more difficult.

This, Mr Davies said, only emphasised the need for "a full environmental impact assessment process".

The National Trust's call was echoed by the Nature Conservation Council of NSW, which represents 92 conservation groups.

While approving the principle of opening natural areas to tourism, the NCC "is adamant that this be done in a way which does not compromise the natural environment".

By rezoning as a tourist site, the area "will be wide open to abuse".

The National Trust's president, Mr Barry O'Keefe, QC, says an Environment Protection (Scientific) zoning would be more appropriate for the area.

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He called on the Minister for Conservation and Land Management, Mr West, to reconstitute the Jenolan Caves Trust to give representation to conservation and heritage interests as well as development and tourism interests.

# Committee seeks legal advice on Jenolan Caves plan BY GERALDINE O'BRIEN, Heritage Writer

The Jenolan Environment Protection Committee has sought legal advice over proposed developments at Jenolan Caves.

The developments, which involve demolition of the huddle of kiosks and outbuildings, and construction of new tourist facilities, are not in the long-term interests of the area, the group says.

Its chairman, Mr Bruce Welch, said the Jenolan Environment Protection Committee had been "fighting inappropriate development within the Jenolan Caves Reserve for many years, and we are not going to give up now".

Like the National Trust, which expressed concern this week about the proposals, the committee has called for "proper representation" for conservation and heritage groups on the Jenolan Caves Trust, the manageing body for the caves area.

The trust includes representatives of the NSW Tourism Commission, the Oberon Shire Council, the National Parks and Wildlife Service and the Peppers Hotel Group, holders of the 99-year leas on Jenolan Caves House.

The trust chairman, Mr Paul Rubie, of the NSW Tourism Commission, told the Herald yesterday that the trust was formed two years ago as an interim measure and that a new trust would eventually take control of the area.

He said a scientific committee which advised the trust included representatives of speleological organisations and that a Peppers representative was included because "we have to stay in touch with the, but they only have one vote on the trust".

Mr Welch said, however, that the whole area was now tourst-driven and that his organisation opposed "any development in the limestone area which ultimately affects the caves, the very attraction that brings people there in the first place".

"If we has to wreck the resource in order to make it financially viable, perhaps we shouldn't be trying to make it financially viable" he said.

He said building work altered the drainage system which, in turn could eventually stop water percolation through the rock and ultimately stop the limestone from forming.

Jenolan attracts 250,000 visitors a year, with a ceiling of 280,000 proposed. Income from the caves is about \$2 million a year.

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Mr Rubie said the trust was spending \$300,000 to \$400,000 a year in the area on weed and noxious animal eradication.

He said that while Jenolan Caves, if found in pristine state today, would not be developed, "we have inherited a historical situation and we're trying to meet as practically as possible the balance between development and conservation".

"We can't just switch the tap off and Jenolan Caves has to be a commercial enterprise because no funds are coming from anywhere else. The slogan of "no development" is one of the idealisms of the past."

The National Trust has said it is not opposed to development in principle

but that it objects to the lack of a proper environmental impact study of possible effects on what it calls this "unique and fragile ecosystem".

Mr Stephen Davies, conservation director for the National Trust, told the Herald this week the trust was concerned that Oberon Shire Council proposed to zone the area for tourism and approve the development application over the new year.

The trust believes that area should be zoned Environmental Protection (Scientific) and that the Jenolan Caves Trust should be reconstituted to represent heritage and conservation interests, a call backed by the Nature Conservation Council of NSW.

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# NEW DISCOVERY AT JENOLAN

### A MARVEL OF BEAUTY

(From our own Correspondent)

The Mines Department officials at Jenolan continue to open up the hidden beauties of the great mounds of limestone deposits in this district. Caretaker Wiburd and Guides Edwards and Dailey started off on Saturday night in search of new caves and were not long in making the most important and most beautiful discovery yet found at Jenolan. I venture to say that there is nothing here to equal Saturday's find, nor do I think is there in any other part of the State. It contains huge stalagmites fully 35ft. high and about 4ft. in diameter at the base, tapering off to a needle point. The walls which are completely covered, are "draped" with exquisitely delicate formation; and the greater proportion of the floor is pure white which had to be crossed by the party in bare feet, so as not to destroy it. In the centre of the floor is a great pool of water surrounded with snow-white crystal formation. The water therein is many feet deep but so clear that the bottom can be seen by the aid of a magnesium lamp. The cave, which is very extensive in size, is simply superb, and is beyond a doubt the finest discovery ever made in the nature of caves.

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# **JCHAPS ANNUAL REPORT 1991**

I have very much pleasure in presenting a report of the Society'd activities during 1991 ... in fact the Society's 20th Annual Report.

In accordance with our constitution, four committee and four general meetings were held at Jenolan during the past 12 months. Recognising the need to hold more meetings and activities in the cave environment, your committee, with the cooperation of Nigel Scanlan and his staff, endeavoured to do so in 1991.

Our General Meeting in May was held in the Temple of Baal Cave and in August we met in the Chifley Cave. We returned to the traditional meeting at Wallaby Hall in November when Patrick Larkin, a member of the Society, was our guest speaker. Patrick, a barrister and vice president of the Australian Speleological Federation, addressed the meeting on "From Bat Cave to the High Court - The Mount Etna Controversy". In February, we gathered for the first time at the Binda Cabins.

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We have been treated to some very special caving trips during 1991, led by the "best". On Sunday, 10th February, under leadership of Ernst Holland, appreciate group inspected the Nettle Cave. This was to be matched on Sunday, 5th May, when a fearless group led by Derek Elmes had their "trip and a half" to the Alladin Cave. Trip leader, Robert Lindsay was ably assisted by Cathie Draheim (or was it her son Aubrey) on our caving trip to the Elder Cave on Sunday, 11th August. An extended trip of the "south side" caves was conducted by Verbosity himself, Вапту Richard, on Sunday, 10th We are most November. grateful to all our leaders for their extremely interesting, informative and exciting inspections ... with a special thanks to the Reserve Trust and Nigel Scanlan for making them possible. We also appreciate the special trip reports that have appeared in our newsletters and we thank the contributors.

Clean Up Australia Day at Jenolan was on Sunday, 24th April 1992

March, was supported by members of the Society and at the conclusion of the day's activities Barry Richard led a tour of the River and Baal Caves.Throughout 1991 Anthony and Sue Hardy have painstakingly restored the Native Bird Collection which is again on public display. Our sincere thanks to them both for their dedication and our very best wishes to Anthony who has joined the NSW Ambulance Service after about seven years on the Guiding Staff at Jenolan. Presently Robert Lindsay is carrying out restoration work on the old Cave Program Board.

1991 has not been an easy year for our enthusiastic Research Officer, Joan Edwards. For a period during the latter part of the year, the Resource Centre, which was officially handed over to the control of the Society during 1990, was used without notice as a temporary Trust Office thus restricting Joan's work and necessitating the closure of the display centre. However, more recently, Joan, with the assistance of Sue Hardy and Barry Richard (two of our

curators), have spent a considerable amount of time and effort reorganising the centre with suitable displays.

Although we have not been informed officially, it is understood that the Resource Centre is to be used as a building site office during the proposed Arch Grand Precinct redevelopment. We must continue to represent the Society responsibly through th Resource Centre but it does seem futile to expend time and funds on displays, etc. at this point in We are extremely grateful for all that Joan and her band of helpers have under difficult done circumstances.

Although the Society had a seemingly quiet year, much was happening behindd the scenes. Our Secretary, Scott Melton has worked tirelessly on the revue of the Society's constitution and together with Sandra Heany has prepared a draft of proposed amendments.

Throughout 1991, Steve Opper (Vice President) and I have made submissions on behalf of the Society to the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust and Oberon Shire Council regarding the proposed

redevelopment of the Grand Precinct and the Arch proposed rezoning of the Jenolan Caves "Preservation of Caves" to "Tourism". Whilst the Society supports the need to improve the area between Caves House and the Grand Arch, it objects to the siting of a two storey building at the western end of the portal of the Grand Arch, firmly believing that it compromise the historic aspects of Jenolan and detract from the historic aspects of Jenolan's proposed World Heritage listing. The Society supports the positive environmentally and responsible aspects of the development proposal. our objection to the rezoning of the Reserve, the Society stated that we believed the whole of the Reserve should be rezoned for environment protection and requested Council to prepare a draft Local Environment Plan (LEP) to bring about such a change in zoning. My personal and sincere thanks to Steve for his constant support and extensive knowledge of Jenolan that was of great assistance in the preparation of the Society's submission.

In August, the Society was pleased to receive notification from Peppers that all mem-

bers of the Society staying at Caves House would receive a 20% discount. This discount is not restricted to meeting weekends was introduced to encourage all members to visit Caves House on a more regular basis. The previous arrangement for Committee members staying in the "historical wing" for the cost of meals only still applies but restricted those is to members carrying out specific tasks at Jenolan on behalf of the Society. In thanking Peppers for their continued encouragement and support, we welcome the newly appointed Manager of Caves House, Mr Richard Edwards, and look forward to a long and happy association.

I am pleased to report that Basil Ralston's "Jenolan - The Golden Ages of Caving" continues to sell well through the Ticket Office with 552 copies sold to date. The **ICHAPS** fudge was introduced in 1991 and is also available though the Ticket Office steadily adding the the Society's funds. **JCHAPS** T-Shirts Sweatshirts have proved to be extremely popular with members and we thank Scott for his capable marketing efforts. The Society's lapel

and cloth badges are noe available for purchase. We again thank the Reserve Trust and Richard Guy for assisting with the sales of Basil's book and Phil's fudge through the Ticket Office.

My sincere thanks to a truly superb Committee ... your enthusiasm and support during 1991 has been most encouraging. I have already thanked many of personally throughout this report and it would be remiss of me not to mention others, particularly Treasurer Dimity Short; Membership Secretary Maureen Sullivan; Activities Officer Phil MacGuire and Newsletter Editor Derek Elmes. Special thanks again to our dedicated and hard working Secretary, Scott Melton.

I am not seeking re-election as President in 1992 and extent my best wishes and loyal support to the incoming President and Committee for 1992. To those members of the Committee who are not standing for re-election, we thank you for your support and hope you will continue to maintain and interest in the Society.

We very much appreciate the continues cooperation of the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust in particular that of Ernst Holland, Nigel Scanlan and the Guiding Staff and also extend our gratitude to Peter Judge and the staff of Caves House.

I closed my report last year with the following - "one of the very positive results which has emerged from this year of change at Jenolan is the feeling of greater co-operation, friendship and respect which has developed between the Trust, Peppers and the Society. I am sure this augurs well for all, but more importantly, for Jenolan".

I must therefore in closing this year express my extreme disappointment that redevelopment of the Grand Arch Precinct proceeded with no evidence of any attempt to inform groups such as the Society with a proven interest and ability constructively participate in the management of this Public Reserve. That this occurred after the adoption of the Plan of Management based on a constructive and co-operative process with such groups is both suprising and disappointing.

The Jenolan Caves Reserve is a place which has proven to hold great significance to a wide cross section of people. We hope that the individuals and Government Departments entrusted with the management of this Public Reserve will not lose sight of this fact.

# "Kia-Ora" Guest House Destroyed By Bushfire Caves House Threatened

One of the biggest bushfires the district has experienced in some time is raging at present between Jenolan Caves and Jenolan Pine Forest. "Kia-Ora" guest house was completely destroyed. Mr and Mrs Corney, who had taken it over before Christmas lost practically everything they owned, whilst the fire fighters had difficulty saving the home of Mr Wilcox on the camping reserve.

Oberon, Rydal and Lowther fire brigades were in attendance and in all 200 men were present, including police and men from Lithgow. Later 200 military trainees arrived to help stem the tide.

A fire break for miles round the State Forest (12 miles from the Caves House) was burnt, and this saved the position there.

The fire started in bush near McEwan's Creek, on the Oberon side of Caves House, and before dawn "Kia-Ora" (a guest house owned by Mr H G Daley, and valued at £4000, with accommodation for 60 people) had been burned with all its furnishings. Fortunately, there were no guests in the building at the time. The lessee (Mrs E G Corney), her husband and son ran to safety in their night attire.

Before noon the five miles of winding road leading down to Caves House from the Mt Victoria side was blocked with blazing trees and until yesterday afternoon was impassable.

Meanwhile, Caves House was being seriously menaced. Fourth-officer Barber, of Sydney fire headquarters, ordered firemen to the scene from Katoomba, and sent fire officers from Sydney to take their places at Katoomba. The Oberon fire brigade was also joined by hundreds of other men from Blackheath and Katoomba, while everyone at Caves House helped with beaters and bushes to check the progress of the flames.

Breaks were burned around the main building, which was built in 1898 and had been added to until 1927. The breaks minimised the danger, and Lithgow police, who had taken charge, last night held the opinion that the danger had passed.

# JENOLAN CAVES

### THE RECENT DISCOVERIES

Mr. O. Trickett, Superintendent of Caves, has furnished the Minister of Mines with the following report respecting the Jenolan Caves:- "I have examined and measured the new branches of the Lucas Cave, discovered by Caretaker Wiburd and Guides Edwards and Bailey on July 30. They are 10 chains in length and rise about 200ft above the level of the underground waterway. The caverns are surpassingly beautiful, and are decorated from end to end. There are 'shawls' 8ft. in diameter, massive fluted columns 30ft. high, clear pools with crystal floors 15ft. in diameter, and 'shawls' with translucent white bands alternating with very dark bands. The variety of tints exhibited by the formations is not quite equalled in any other cave at Jenolan. For beauty, variety, and grandeur it is difficult to imagine anything to surpass the caverns of the two new branches of the Lucas Cave."

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# Karst Conservation

"Following a six month 'incubation period' the National Parks & Wildlife (Karst Conservation) Amendment Bill passed both Houses of Parliament in early December 1991. The innovative move to safeguard cave systems of karst on private land without acquiring the overlying land found widespread support in Parliament as a sensible method of cave conservation with widespread application.

"Now that the Bill has been enacted, successful implementation will require NPWS to draw up conservation agreements with co-operative land owners. Over the last six months, the Minister for The Environment has consulted with speleological groups to examine the ramifications of the amendment and investigate likely karst candidates for conservation agreements."

Jenolan Caves Historical & Preservation Society Constitution

"That section twenty be amended to read:-

### 20. Amendments to Constitution

This constitution may be amended by a three fifths majority of those in attendance at a General Meeting, provided twenty eight days notice of the proposed amendment has been circulated to all members."

"That section twenty one be amended to:-

### Dissolution

The Society may be dissolved as follows:-

- a) The Society shall be dissolved in the event of a membership of less than four persons (but must not be less than three) or upon the vote of a three quarter majority of members present at a special General Meeting convened to consider such a question;
- b) Upon resolution being passed in accordance with paragraph a) of this rule, all assets and funds of the Society on hand shall, after the payment of all expenses and liabilities, be handed over to such registered or exempted charity or charities as a simple majority of the members at the special General Meeting so convened, or at a subsequent special General Meeting may decide."

"That section twenty two be amended to read:-

# 22. Winding Up

"In the event of the winding up of the Society the assets of the Society shall be disposed of as follows:-

- a) Items of historical and scientific interest shall be offered firstly to the Library of New South Wales, secondly to the Royal Australian Historical Society, thirdly to the Australian Museum and fourthly to The Powerhouse and Earth Exchange Museums;
- b) All other assets excluding money shall be publicly auctioned:
- c) All monies realised and all other monies less the expenses of winding up shall be given to the Royal Australian Historical Society for the furtherance of its aims."

"That section eighteen be amended to read:-

# 18. Resignations

Any member may resign their membership by sending their resignation in writing to the committee and paying up any arrears of subscriptions due by them for the preceding two years and upon such resignation being accepted by the Committee, they shall cease to be a member."

"That section nineteen be amended to read:-

### 19. Vacation of Office

The office of a member of the Committee or of a Trustee shall become vacant:-

- a) Upon their death:
- b) If they are found guilty of a criminal offence:
- c) If they become bankrupt or make any arrangement or composition with their creditors generally;
- d) If they become mentally ill or a person whose person or estate is liable to be dealt with, in any way under the law relating to mental health;
- e) If they resign their office by notice in writing to the Committee, and subject to its acceptance;
- f) If they are absent for more than six months without leave of the Committee from meetings of the Committee held during that period;
- g) If they cease to be a member of the Society:
- h) Upon a resolution being passed by a two thirds majority of members present at a properly constituted special General Meeting called for the purpose of removing them from office;
- i) If they hold any office of profit under the Society;
- j) If they are directly or indirectly interested in any contract or proposed contract with the Society."

"That section fifteen be amended to read:-

# 15. Committee responsibilities

The Committee is charged with the following responsibilities:-

- a) To administer the Society in line with the objects of same:
- b) To meet at least every three months unless more frequent meetings are required as determined by business to hand. It will be preferable to hold such meetings coincident with the quarterly General Meetings of the Society;
- c) To be accountable to all members of the Society:
- d) To appoint sub-committees as the need may arise;
- e) To act in an appropriate manner at all times.

In order to be elected to a Committee position, a member must be of legal voting age."

"That section sixteen be amended to read:-

# 16. Election of Committee Members

Elections shall be by secret ballot and any equality in voting shall be resolved by lot. Nominations are to be in writing, signed by the nominee, proposer and seconder. Notininees should preferably be in attendance at the Annual General Meeting however, their absence will be accepted if fourteen days written notification of their absence is received. Nominations may also be received from the floor of the meeting.

The ballot papers shall show the candidates names in order determined by lot."

"That section seventeen be amended to read:-

# 17. Quorum

The quorum at a General Meeting or Annual General Meeting of the Society shall be ten financial members.

The quorum at a Committee Meeting shall be five members of the Committee."

"That section fourteen be amended to read:-

# 14. Office Bearers

At the Annual General Meeting of the Society a Committee comprising of the following shall be elected:-

- a) President;
- b) Two Vice Presidents:
- c) Secretary;
- d) Assistant Secretary:
- e) Treasurer:
- f) Assistant Treasurer,
- g) Membership Secretary;
- h) Two Curators;
- i) Research Officer;
- j) Newsletter Editor;
- k) One representative from the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust and one representative from the lessee of Jenolan Caves House;
- 1) Six additional members.

At the Annual General Meeting a Patron will be elected."

"That section twelve be amended to read:-

# 12. Expulsion of Members

Any member may be expelled from membership of the Society by the Committee if in the opinion of the Committee, after affording such member an opportunity of offering the Committee an explanation of their conduct either verbally or in writing, that the conduct of the member is such as to be detrimental to the best interests of the Society, provided that:-

- a) Such expulsion shall not be effective unless it is confirmed by a majority of members present at a special General Meeting of members convened to consider the expulsion;
- b) Such General Meeting is held within a period of one month from the date of the decision of the Committee to expel the member;
- c) At such special General Meeting the member whose expulsion is under consideration shall be allowed to offer an explanation of their conduct verbally or in writing at the option of such member;
- d) The voting of such special General Meeting shall be by ballot if not less than five members present shall so demand;
- e) It shall be in the power of the Committee to exclude such member from participation in the affairs of the Society until such special General Meeting shall be held."

"That section thirteen be amended to read:-

# Trustees

The position of Trustee of the Society shall be as follows:-

- a) Three Trustees (who may be members of the Society or Committee) shall be elected at a properly constituted General Meeting;
- b) All property of whatever kind belonging to the Society shall be vested in the Trustees and they shall have custody of all deeds and documents of title relating to the property of the Society and shall be responsible for the same and shall deal with and dispose of all the property of the Society whether real or personal for the time being vested in them and the income thereof in accordance with the violation of the trusts upon which the property is held."

"That section ten be amended to read:-

## 10. Audit

All financial records and transactions of the Society are subject to audit as follows:-

- a) The auditor or auditors shall be selected at the Annual General Meeting. They shall examine all accounts, vouchers, receipts, books, etc., and furnish a report thereon to the members at the Annual General Meeting. Audits shall be conducted at regular intervals of not more than twelve months;
- An Auditor shall not be a member or closely related to a member of the Committee;
- c) Subject to paragraph d) hereof notice of the intention to nominate an auditor to replace the current auditor shall be given to the Secretary at least twenty one days before the Annual General Meeting. The Secretary shall send a copy of the nomination to the current auditor at least seven days before the Annual General Meeting. The current auditor shall be entitled to attend the Annual General Meeting and if they so wish be heard at same;
- d) Where the current auditor submits their resignation, or notifies the Secretary of their intention not to seek re-selection as auditor, paragraph c) hereof shall not apply."

"That section eleven be amended to read:-

# 11. Minutes

The Committee shall cause minutes to be made of:-

- a) All appointments of office bearers and members of the Committee;
- b) The names of members of the Committee present at all meetings of the Society and meetings of the Committee;
- All proceedings at all meetings of the Society and meetings of the Committee.

Such minutes shall be signed by the chairperson of the meeting at which the proceedings were held or by the chairperson of the next succeeding meeting."

"That section nine be amended to read:-

Society Funds and Accounts

The following applies in respect of Society funds and accounts:-

a) All monies received by the Society shall be deposited at the earliest possible date to the credit of the Society's accounts. Receipts for monies received shall be issued promptly. The Treasurer must be notified at the earliest convenience of all deposits made to Society accounts.

The Committee may authorise appropriate investment of a proportion of the Society's accumulated funds in a recognised financial institution. Where possible, these investments should be Government guaranteed:

b) All payments \$20.00 or greater made by the Society shall be paid by cheque signed by any two of the President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Payments less than \$20.00 may be paid by cash but must be accounted for in writing and forwarded to the Treasurer by the 25th day of the months of March, June, September and December:

c) All Society members authorised to make payments must present an itemised claim sheet to the Committee for payment approval. Where possible, receipts or other evidence of payment should be provided.

Authorisation to make payments may be granted to members as determined by any two of the President, Secretary and Treasurer. The following Committee members shall be deemed to have this authority upon their election to office; President, Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Membership Secretary and Newsletter Editor;

- All accounts shall be presented to and passed for payment at a Committee meeting and full details of such approvals shall be entered in the minutes of the meeting;
- e) The Treasurer shall be required to submit quarterly financial statements for the preceding quarter prior to each general meeting. Also, the Society's financial records are to be closed off as at 31st December each year and an audited statement of receipts and expenditure be prepared for presentation at the Annual General Meeting in February of the ensuing year."

"That section eight be amended to read:-

# Subscriptions

Subscription to the Society shall be as follows:-

- a) The subscription shall be determined by the Committee and be reviewed annually at the Annual General Meeting subject to the increasing costs of conducting Society business. Until determined otherwise, the current subscription rates shall be as per item b);
- b) The annual subscription to the Society will be:-

Single - \$10.00

Family - \$10.00 for the first adult and \$3.00 for each additional member of the

same immediate family living at the same address.

Student- \$4.00 until the age of eighteen upon which evidence of full time study

must be produced to remain eligible for this rate. Upon reaching the age of twenty five full membership rates are payable. The date of birth of

student members is to be supplied.

Pensioner- \$5.00

Child

under five- Free

Five year membership of the Society will be offered to interested persons at four times the annual subscription rate. Persons availing of this option will be advised via the Society Newsletter upon expiry of such membership.

Life membership of the Society may be procured for a sum of \$500.00. Recognition of this payment will be made by the inclusion of the members name on a special honour roll to hang in an appropriate location at Jenolan Caves.

Concession Cave Inspection Tickets will be forwarded annually to all members upon payment of annual subscriptions dues. Such tickets will automatically be forwarded to Life and Honorary Life Members. Those members accepting the five year option will receive their tickets upon payment/renewal of their membership. This concession is not available on public holidays, public holiday weekends or during school holidays. They are only available for those cave tours for which a child's concession is available;

- c) Any new member who joins the Society within three months of the end of the financial year of the Society shall be deemed to be financial for the ensuing financial year;
- d) Any member who does not renew a subscription within six months of the expiration of same shall be deemed to be unfinancial and shall automatically cease to be a member of the Society. Should a member wish to renew their membership within a period of two years of it lapsing they shall be liable for all outstanding membership fees due to the Society. Notification of the expiration of membership shall be by way of a cross placed on the society's newsletter posted to the members last known address. A lapsed member rejoining after two years will be deemed to be a new member."

"That section seven be amended to read:-

# 7. Meeting Procedures

The following meeting procedures shall apply:-

- a) The President shall preside as chairperson at every General and Annual General Meeting of the Society, but if that person is not present within fifteen minutes of the time appointed for the holding of the meeting or is unwilling to act then the members present shall elect one of their number to be chairperson of the meeting, a simple majority sufficing;
- b) The chairperson may, with the consent of any meeting at which a quorum is present and shall if so directed by the meeting, adjourn the meeting from time to time and from place to place but no business shall be transacted at any adjourned meeting other than the business left unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place. When a meeting is adjourned for thirty days or more notice of the adjourned meeting shall be given as in the case of an original meeting. Save as aforesaid it shall not be necessary to give any notice of an adjournment of the business to be transacted at an adjourned meeting;
- c) At any General Meeting a resolution put to the vote of a meeting shall be decided on a show of hands unless a poll is (before or on the declaration of the result of the show of hands) demanded by the chairperson or by at least three members present. Unless a poll is so demanded a declaration by the chairperson that a resolution has on a show of hands been carried or carried unanimously, or by a particular majority, or lost, and an entry to that effect in the minutes of the proceedings of the Society shall be conclusive evidence or the fact without proof of the number or proportion of votes recorded in favour of or against the resolution. The demand for a poil may be withdrawn:
- d) If a poll is duly demanded it shall be taken in such a manner and either at once or after an interval or adjournment or otherwise as the chairperson directs and the result of the poll shall be the resolution of the meeting at which the poll was demanded but a poll demanded on the election of a chairperson or on a question of adjournment shall be taken forthwith;
- e) In the case of an equality of votes, whether on a show of hands or on a poll, the chairperson of the meeting at which the show of hands takes place or at which a poll is demanded shall be entitled to a second or casting vote;
- f) Each financial member of legal voting age present and voting at a General Meeting of the Society shall have one vote:
- g) Meetings shall be conducted in an orderly fashion and are not to exceed two hours in duration with a maximum extension of fifteen minutes to allow for the conclusion of urgent business."

"That section five be amended to read:-

# 5. General Meeting

A General Meeting shall be held on the second Saturday of the months of February, August and November and on the first Saturday of the month of May, unless determined otherwise by the Committee. At least twenty eight days notice of such meeting shall be given to each member in the Society's newsletter, posted to their last known address however, accidental omission to give notice to any member shall not invalidate the meeting.

Unless determined otherwise by the Committee these meetings shall commence promptly at 8.30pm."

"That section six be amended to read:-

# 6. Special General Meetings

Any two members of the Committee may at any time convene a Special General Meeting of the Society. Such meetings shall be convened by the Secretary upon the written request, stating the reasons for the request, of any two members of the Society to the Committee. Such a meeting shall be held within a period of one month, where possible, from the date of the receipt of the request. Should the Committee deem the request not to be of a serious nature, the Committee has the power to holdover discussion on the request to the next General Meeting."

"That section three be amended to read:-

# Membership

The following shall apply in respect to membership:-

- a) Membership shall be open to all persons subscribing to the objects of the Society and paying the prescribed fee. The Committee shall have the right to refuse membership to any person if just cause can be shown;
- b) A register of members shall be kept showing in respect of every member their name, address, phone number and the date membership commenced. Further, that the ages of junior members or student identification numbers be provided on application for membership;

# MORE CAVE DISCOVERIES

Some more caves have (says the Evening News) been discovered in the Burragorang district, which naturally surpass in beauty any ever discovered before. Every fresh discovery always eclipses all former ones. But honestly, is New South Wales in want of any more caves. The Jenolan Caves have been pretty well written to death, and if we are to have a series of such caves, and they are all to form subjects for long and prosy descriptions by prosy writers, why the patience of the New South Wales public will revolt, and it will become penal to discuss fresh caves. Discovering caves seems to be becoming as common a weakness - an amiable weakness, we admit -- as writing poetry, and the two offences in future will have to be dealt with on a common footing. At present the Australian poet and his admirers are a district nuisance. Formerly we could never get up in the morning without being informed that some gifted amateur had issued a new waltz. Now that craze has died, and we cannot go out without being pelted with a new book of Australian poems. If cave-discovering goes on at the same rate, legislation will have to be adopted. The Burragorang Valley, by the way, is supposed to have suggested the description of the place where the stolen cattle were planted in "Robbery Under Arms."

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# Annual Report 1904

The following is the report on the Limestone Caves, by O. Trickett, L.S., M.S.:--

# JENOLAN CAVES

The Government Printer reported that the issue of the Guide Book had been sold out at a profit. In view of this successful result a new issue is now being prepared which will include illustrations of the "River Cave".

In February a cottage was leased for the use of Guide Edwards.

After running successfully for thirteen years the Leffel Wheel, used with the electric light supply, has been thoroughly repaired.

Extensive damage was caused by floods during the winter to the tracks leading from the camping grounds, and to the creek retaining walls between the Caves House and the Grand Archway. The necessary repairs have been effected.

On the 20th February, Caretaker Wiburd and Guide Edwards discovered "The Temple of Baal," and on the 30th July, assisted by Guide Bailey, they found the Orient Cave. These are surpassingly beautiful and extensive branches of the Lucas Cave, leading from the "River" series of caverns. In the course of exploration the guides exhibited a perseverance and a courage in overcoming perilous obstacles which is highly to their credit. Temporary means of access to the new cave are being rapidly provided. This includes a punt, which has been provided on that part of the underground waterway named "The Styx." Permanent stairways will be added from time to time.

From the 1st June the admissions to the Caves was increased to 2/- for a first visit and 1/- for any subsequent visit by each person.

The Rainbow and Salmon trout placed in the Jenolan River are doing well, and may soon be expected to give excellent sport.

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# Letter to the Editor (1)

# THE DISCOVERER OF JENOLAN CAVES

Sir, - In your issue of the 17th instant I see a scrap from Mr John Dobbie, J.P. re the discoverer of the Jenolan Caves. He says that the person credited with the discovery was not the actual discoverer. So far he is right. Mr. James Whalan, my uncle, as far as is known, was the first to see the limestone cliffs at the Jenolan Caves, while in search of the bushranger McEwen, who, he knew, was located in the vicinity, having been tracked near there by a man named Jerh Beale. My uncle, being too intent on the pursuit of Mc Ewen, did not even go down the hill to the archways. On his return, knowing my father, Mr. Charles Whalan, was fond of scenery of that kind, he told him as near as he could where the caves lay. My father then started with a servant named Nicholas Urwin and rode all day looking for the place described. Just at nightfall they saw the entrance to the Grand Arch. The hill below them being too rough to get down, they decided to camp where they were and to make the decent in the morning, which they did, exploring the Grand Arch, Devil's Coach-house, and Nettle Cave. This was in the early forties, as I remember seeing my father's name in the Grand Arch dated 1842. After that time my father and brothers, Charles and Edwin Whalan, conducted parties to the Caves for many years. Now, Mr. Editor, if my father was not the actual discoverer of the far famed Jenolan Caves, he was certainly the first to explore them and bring them before the public. Trusting you will insert this letter, I remain yours, etc.,

# THE DISCOVERER OF JENOLAN CAVES

# TO THE EDITOR

Sir, - In your issue of the 31st March 1899, I see a scrap from Mr. A. S. Whalan re the discovery of Jenolan Caves. James Whalan is the real discoverer of Jenolan Caves. It was after he captured the bushranger McEwen, who robbed his team of the bullock bows and chains as a place known as Coogie Flat, near Gingkin. Mr James Whalan, with the assistance of a police officer and Jerh Beale, tracked McEwen to the top of the range above his camp when they saw the smoke of his fire. They camped for the night; the descent was made in the morning, when they captured McEwen, whom they secured and handed over to the authorities. James Whalan returned to his camp to try to find some of his property, which included bullock bows and chains, horses, and a steel mill which were used fat that time to grind wheat for the Government men told off to James Whalan to serve their time. When he got to the hut where they had taken him he followed the valley down to within about 34 of a mile of the caves. He left his horse and walked down, it being impossible to get his horse with him. He then went through the archways; finding he could not get down the river further he went about the daylight caves and returned to his horse, and could not get any of his property. When it was reported McEwen was taken, a stockman at Lowther got a blackfellow to take him to McEwen's camp, and he took the steel mill away between the time Whalan had taken McEwen and when he returned to look for his stolen property. Whalan heard of the mill being taken and went and identified it by a No. 8 on one of the bolts. When McEwen robbed Whalan he always packed what he took on Whalan's horses. When he got near his camp he killed the horses so that they would not track the horses back and find him. I was told this by Whalan's stockman, James Campbell, afterwards in 1855; so that James Whalan was the real discover of Jenolan Caves, in 1841, and the first man to enter them. When he returned he told people that he had been at the end of the world in the Devil's Coach-house, so that is how it got its name. Jerh Beale, who tracked McEwen, told me all they had done from starting to track. They did not see the caves until after the capture of McEwen. Mr. J Whalan searched several times for his bullock harness and his horse. When I heard that McEwen took the bullock bows and chains I did not believe he carried them so far, but when exploring about fourteen years ago I found the bullock bows, six bows, two pairs of iron hinges, and two harrow pins, planted in a cave. There are scores of people who have seen them in the cave since I discovered it. This is the true account of the discovery of Jenolan Caves, and as I have been exploring them since 1855, I have collected the particulars from eye witnesses

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as to James Whalan's work and the robbery at his house by McEwen. I have taken great delight in the exploring of the caves and everything in connection with their discovery, etc., before my time here. Kindly publish the above in the interest of the readers of your valuable paper, of which I am a constant reader. - Yours, etc.

## Note from the Editor:

It is interesting to wonder about the discovery of Jenolan Caves or perhaps the way the terms "discovery" and "first person" were used last century. Wilson, in his letter for example, does not mention the possibility the "McEwen" or the "Stockman" (who appropriated the steel mill) may have "discovered" the Caves, nor whomever placed the articles that he thinks may have belonged to Whalan in a cave which he (Wilson) "discovered". And there is of course the favourite of Australian history (and of most colonised nations) - the use of "first person to enter" or "first person to see". While I'll be the first to argue that the likes of Wilson, Wiburd and others where the first to enter and see the vast majority of the caves at Jenolan, I will equally argue that at least some of the inhabitants of the continent over the last 40,000 would have seen and entered some of the caves and arches at Jenolan (and if they hadn't why is there a Polish sailor in the Pool of Cerberus Cave?).

# THE ROCKLEY GAME.

## THE JENOLAN CAVES

Tarana and Wattle Flat Rockley Clubs accepted the kind invitation of Mr. J. S. O'Hara to pay a visit to the famous Jenolan Caves, and returned to town on Sunday afternoon, having spent a delightful week. # President's Report

For the 1993 AGM

It gives me great pleasure to present the 21st Annual Report.

In this regard I am in the final year of doing a doctorate and know I will be pressed for time and inspiration and it is therefore with regret that I announce that I will not be seeking re-election for any office other than general committee member for the coming year.

The display area is, as we all know, very small and therefore limits what can be done to reorganise the exhibition. As a result the display area remains virtually unchanged but still seems to hold interest for visitors. of much greater concern is the inability to store the Society's posessions safely and in a well organised manner.

There is no short term solution to the problem, nor a definate long term solution. Clearly many artefacts donated to the Society have been damaged, lost, borrowed and not returned or whatever as we come across references to items which are no longer to be found. The Society must seek a solution to this problem. Unless this is done very soon far too much will be lost forever.

We have applied for, and received approval for a grant of \$500 from the Royal Australian Historical Society for organising and cataloguing our photographic collection. The work is progressing very slowly, as with many volunteers, income producing chores must take precedence over voluntary work. In addition it took some time to devise a suitable method of organising the material. To benefit from the grant many more hours of sorting & mounting will need to be done, then a detailed catalogue prepared on a database.

We will need help at the time of the May meeting to finalise this project.



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# A salute to our pioneers

This unique photograph of the

resident of Hampton, features

late Tom Dodwell, popular

Tom driving a horse drawn grader on the Jenolan Caves Ad in the 1930's. Tom's beautifully groomed horses were named Nelson and Gyp Nelson was a distinctive greywhite work horse bred at Palmers Oakey, Tom buying him from Alf Boyd and keeping him for many years until Nelson died at Hampton. Many local residents worked in the road maintenance gang which covered the area from Rover Lett bridge at Hartley to Jenolan Caves via Good Forest, Lowther, Hampton and through to Five Mile Hill and Jenolan Caves and then up the Two Mile Hill on the Oberon Rd - much steeper and more winding than the "Five Mile". in the early 1900's and during World War 1 Mick Luchetti patrolled the road with Dan Kelly in charge of the southern section. When Mick Luchetti died, Dan Ryan was assigned Mick's portion (Dan Ryan is the maternal grandfather of Lithgow's Mayor, Gerard Martin). During these years Tom Dowdell worked the horse drawn grader, travelling the full length of the road. Following Dan Ryan, Pat Cutten took charge of the

road gang - the road then being maintained by one body of workers covering the entire length. Pat remained in charge until he resigned to returned to work on the family fam. Harry Ryan held the job of ganger until his death when Pat Cullen's brother Bill took charge. Bill had worked at a construction gang at Hartley for two years, starting there in 1949. He was then transferred to the Caves Road maintenance crew while his brother Pat was the ganger. The Caves Road, at that time, had a gravel surface from Glenroy Bridge to Jenolan Caves. During Bill Cullen's time as ganger the decision was made to seal the road through to the Caves. The maintenance gang had to do all the preparation and aligning of the road and then assist with the sealing. After this mammoth task,

The maintenance gang had to do all the preparation and aligning of the road and then assist with the sealing. After this mammoth task, the road to Oberon was reconstructed and sealed. The same gang of men toiled to prepare and seal the steep and dangerous section of road known as the "Two Mile". In 1968, the Great Western Highway from Mt. Lambie to Mt. Victoria Pass badly needed attention so Bill Cullen was given another gang

and new equipment and transferred to the Bowenfells depot, Included in the area covered by Bill and his gang was the section of road from the town boundary at the too of Scenic Hill to Bell. Bill Cullen retired in 1971 and now lives in Hassans Walls Road. He will be 87 this year and is one of Lithgow's most respected citizens. (Thank you Bill for this information 3 Other old timers to work on the Caves Road were Johnny England, Phil-Stone, Wally Edwards, Tom Pate, Mick O'Neill and Harold Phillips Who also drove a horse drawn grader. Joe Dowdell worked short contracts on the road with the horse and dray, while Tom Curran was a familiar sight on the Caves Road driving his motor truck. This account of the road workers on the Caves Road is a salute to those hard working men of the pick and shovel days in the hard times, toiling on the roads to feed their families and pay their way. Thank you to cousin Mary Dowdell for the gift of this photograph.

# "That section twenty be amended to read:-

#### 20. Amendments to Constitution

This constitution may be amended by a three fittes majority of those in attendance at a General Meeting, provided twenty eight days notice of the proposed amendment has been circulated to all members.

"That section twenty one be amended to:-

#### 21. Dissolution

The Society may be dissolved as follows:-

- a) The Society shall be dissolved in the event of a membership of less than four persons (but must not be less than three) or upon the vote of a three quarter majority of members present at a special General Meeting convened to consider such a question; and
- b) Upon resolution being passed in accordance with paragraph a) of this rule, all assets and funds of the Society on hand shall, after the payment of all expenses and Babilities, be handed over to such registered or exempted charity or charities as a sample majority of the members at the special General Meeting so convened, or at a subsequent special General Meeting may decide."

"That section twenty two be amended to read:-

#### 22. Winding Up

"In the event of the winding up of the Society the assets of the Society shall be disposed of as follows:"

- Items of historical and scientific interest shall be offered firstly to the Library of New South Wales, secondly to the Royal Australian Historical Society, thirdly to the Australian Museum and fourthly to The Powerhouse and Earth Exchange Museums;
- b) All other assets excluding money shall be publicly auctioned; and
- c) All monies realised and all other monies less the expenses of winding up shall be given to the Royal Australian Historical Society for the furtherance of its aims.\*

I plead with readers to excuse the quality of the reproduction of this important document. I'm afraid that my son has not yet passed kindergarten cut and pasting!

It is now 100 years since the discovery of the Jubilee Cave by Jeremiah Wilson. To celebrate, the Jenolan Caves Reserve Trust in conjunction with JCHAPS will be holding commemorative celebrations during the period beginning with the JCHAPS meeting 13th November 1993 culminating with the SBS Youth Orchestra Concert 27th & 28th November 1993.

Amongst other activities there will be special Historical Inspections of the Jubilee Cave including The Lilly Of The Valley by torchlight and Alladin Cave tours. # Jubilee Cave Centenary ...

1893-1993

First entered on the 20th of February 1893, by Jeremiah Wilson, the far reaches of the Imperial Cave were to become known as the Jubilee Cave. Jeremiah and his brother, Fred, were to spend many months pushing the exploration of the cave, and themselves to the limit. It was in exploring one of the Jubilee's many side passages that Jeremiah lost the light of his candle, plunging him into darkness. After he did not return, Fred began to search for his brother, eventually finding him in the passage now known as Wilson's Despair.

" I thought I would never see the light of day again" (J. Wilson)

Wilson continued his exploration of the cave that was to gain the reputation of being the most beautiful and finely decorated of the caves at Jenolan.

"To name one formation in the Jubilee would be like naming one star in the Milky Way." (Anon.)


The narrow and winding passages, combined with the distance into the mountain from the Grand Arch, have led to the chequered history of the Jubilee Cave. Development of the cave, for visitors, was stalled as early as 1893 due to retrenchments of cave staff. The official opening of the cave was in 1897 but did not include all the sections that today's visitor enjoys. The most notable of these were the passageway known as The Gem of Jenolan and Victoria Bower. Many years later the cost of renewing the fencing and installing new electrical cables was too great so the cave was closed. Reopened in 1971, with new electrical wires and old fences replaced, the cave's intricate decorations could again be seen by the visitor to Jenolan.

"The visitor will leave the Bower with a feeling that nothing in Nature can exceed it in beauty." (Trickett)

The mystery of exploration is as strong now as 100 years ago. Cave Divers and members of the Sydney University Speleological Society, swam the Underground River and crawled through squeezes in search of their goal of finding the unknown connection between the Jubilee Cave and the Spider Cave. In 1988, after two years of pushing themselves, as the Wilson brothers did, the cave divers found a way between the two caves. Above them, the guides and electricians were once again replacing the old wires with new, whilst visitors marvelled at the intricate hand of nature in the most beautiful of the caves at Jenolan.


#### CURATORS REPORT

# ROWDYISM AT THE CAVES OF JENOLAN

Under this head "A Visitor from England" writes as follows:-

"At the beginning of the present week, my wife, I and two gentlemen paid a visit to the far-famed Caves of Jenolan, being strongly urged to do so by friends in Sydney. Of the drive from Mount Victoria, and of the Caves themselves, I should find it difficult to sufficiently express my admiration. My object, however, in writing to you is to express my deep regret that so wonderful a place should be allowed, even occasionally, to become a gathering-place for noisy rowdies, and that no order whatever should be preserved either in the Inn or the Caves.

During our two day's stay, a large party of ill-behaved people from Bathurst were present, whose conduct went far to destroy any enjoyment derived from the visit. One man of the party seemed to act as ringleader in rough horseplay, and distinguished himself as we were going through the Imperial Cave by bawling blasphemous parodies of Sankey and Moody's hymns. During the evening the same person, with the hangers-on of the Inn, under-guides, and others, kept up such a shouting and noise till after midnight as to render any rest to travellers thoroughly tired utterly impossible.

But this was just the beginning of annoyance. When the other inhabitants of the Inn were in their bedrooms, these persons began violently to ring a large bell outside the Inn door, used for summoning guests to meals, and this went on at intervals, without let or hindrance, for more than an hour. When this was over, the bell was taken down and tied around the neck of a cow, which was driven behind the Inn, close under the main line of bedrooms, and so for the remainder of the night a loud jangling was kept up, and sleep effectually banished."

The Minister for mines is much surprised at the alleged rowdyism reported to have occurred at the Jenolan Caves, & has called upon the caretaker Mr. Wilson, who is in charge of the caves, for a report upon the matter.

Mr. Abigail seems inclined to think that the affair has been exagerated, but if the allegations are substantiated, we understand that the Minister will take steps to render a recurrence of such conduct quite impossible.

Mr. Abigail declares that the arrangements in connection with the comfort of tourists at the caves appeared to be in excellent order during his recent visit, and furthermore, that Mr. Wilson appeared to be very vigilant in the performance of his duties.

The Minister, however, feels that the comfort of tourists is, of course, a matter of great importance at the caves, & expresses himself anxious to have all causes for dissatisfaction at once reported to the department, to be investigated & dealt with.

In connection with the caves, it may be interesting to many to learn that the Inspector of Forests has left Sydney for the Fish River district for the purpose of designing a plantation between the caves & the house.

Larrikanism at Health Resorts

A correspondent who signs himself "J.I.H", writes:-

"I noticed in your issue of today a letter and leader on same, regarding the conduct of certain individuals at the Jenolan Caves. I am sorry to say such conduct is not confined to that locality, as I have experienced."

Our correspondent says that in the mountains, whilst sojourning at an Hotel during the Easter recess, "We were favoured with a visit from a number of Sydney larrikans, calling themselves gentlemen, whom I understand belong to a government department." The conduct of these gentlemen (sic.) writes our correspondent, until the period when they were ejected bodily from the hotel, consisted of the following acts;

Trying to open the doors of bedrooms where ladies were sleeping, using blasphemous and disgusting language when they failed, throwing water through windows at occupants of bedrooms, coming to the public table in a semi-drunken state, using obscene expressions there, and consuming their food with the aid of their fingers in preference to knives and forks, and generally creating as much noise as possible, one night until 4 o°clock am, when the solitary constable was called in to quell the disturbance.

The next day they were ejected, and when they learned that a police magistrate was stopping at the hotel, sent the Mayor of an up-country town to the landlord to hush the matter up. People usually go to such places up the mountains, for health's sake and quiet; and if such conduct is tolerated, they will not on future occasions go where they have experienced such conduct.

FIRE AT THE JENOLAN CAVES. BLOCK OF BUILDINGS DESTROYED NARROW ESCAPE OF THE INMATES

(By Telegraph)
(From our special correspodent)

JENOLAN CAVES, Thursday. A fire broke out here this morning. It was discovered about 12:40am. All the buildings were destroyed excepting the new house, which was saved after great exertion. The fire ran through the building so quickly that little was rescued, several visitors losing all. Keeper Wilson and several of his family escaped in their night-dresses.

After two hours hard work the fire was got under control. None of the household effects were saved. The building and effects were partly insured. The visitors and residents are safe.

The flames lit up the mountains all round. Only for the good water supply all the buildings would have been destroyed. The neighbouring families gave valuable assistance in checking the flames.

# Extracts from 1993 President's report submitted to the 22nd Annual General Meeting, 12 February 1994

...The past year has proved to be one of the busiest and most successful years in Jenolan Caves Historical and Preservation Society History. Marked by the greatly improved relations both within the Society and between the Society, the Trust, Peppers and other organisations.

In May in association with Sydney Speleological Society members of JCH&PS were well represented at the launching of two significant caving publications.

Early in December, yet another book launch took place with the republication of The Wizard of Jenolan by Nuri Mass. The publisher, Harry Hughes kindly donated several copies of the book, one of which has been placed in the Society's archives.

The most significant event was the Centenary celebrations for the discovery of the Jubilee Cave held in November.

A new project for the coming year the Leffel Wheel has been designated the most significant industrial archaeological site in Australia. As such the Society in conjunction with the Trust and other interested parties have commenced discussions regarding the preservation/ restoration of this valuable site, and 1994 should see the Society active in this project.

The Grand Arch precinct and transport access to Jenolan continues. Options were displayed on the weekend of January 22/23 1994.

The process of incorporation and redrafting the Constitution continue. These processes are long but no doubt will be finalised in the coming year.

In mid 1993 we discovered that the National Library had recorded an interview with Mrs Pearl Smith, the daughter of Fred Wilson, and niece of Jeremiah. We obtained a copy for the Society. In late September we contacted

the nursing home to try and make contact with Mrs Smith's son who was also on the National Library tape. The result was an invitation from Mrs Smith to visit her. Armed with flowers and a video camera we visited this amazing 105 year old lady and marvelled at the clarity of her memory and her keen interest in what Jenolan is like now. Mrs Smith said she was honoured that we came and that the people of Jenolan, guides and historical society members, were interested in her. Clearly the honour was ours and it remains the most outstanding event of 1993.

# Projects for 1994

The main tasks would appear to be:

- continue with photographic copying and cataloguing
- · record far more oral history
- encourage, help and guide such as the University of New South Wales Speleological Society which is looking at recording historical signatures as their main project for 1994
- · tackle the storage problems
- continue to encourage new members, participation and links with similar organisations.



# THEN .....

# 1894

Visitors are conducted through the Caves by the Caretaker or a Guide, for which service no charge is made; but the admission of a visitor to any Cave is by ticket only, which may be obtained at the Jenolan Post Office. Until further notice, charges for tickets will her-

- For an ordinary week-day of Caves other than the Temple of Baal, River Cave and Jubilee Cave (and the Orient Cave when opened), 2s each person.
- For an ordinary week-day inspection of the Temple of Baal Cave, River Cave, Jubilee Cave (and Orient Cave when opened), 3s each person
- For each Sunday and week-night inspection, 3s each person

These charges are for the use of artificial lights. No visitor is permitted to inspect any Cave until the prescribed form of ticket has been collected.

Third Edition Guide to The Jenolan Caves O Trickett 1915"

"In 1894 a total of 1038 visitors signed the Visitors' Book at Caves House.

By far the largest number came from New South Wales (572) and other Australian States (215), while 50 arrived from New Zealand and 164 from Britain. Other countries represented included France, Germany, Africa, America, India, China, Samoa and Fiji.

Among the comments recorded that year were the following:

"Grand sights! Grand Guide! Grand Everything!"

"Every cave is a palace or a gem; every stream is musical, and the scenery is poetry materialised"

# AND NOW

With the approaching anniversary of the discovery of Barralong Cave, I thought it would be pertinent to repeat some interesting facts found in early editions of the Society's Newsletters:

"The prolific Ronald Newbould read a detailed account of the discovery of the, officially named, Barellan Cave. He pointed out that the discoverers of the cave called it Barralong. The meeting subsequently resolved to request that the official name should be changed to that given by the discoverers"

July 1974

"In the May general meeting Ron Newbould read his digries describing the discovery of the cave which he and his co-discoverers named Barralong. The cave was later named Barellan by the Department of Tourism. This meeting was probably the first time that many people had heard the use of two different names. The meeting decided to ask the department to restore the original name and authorised our patron, Ald. H.G. Coates, M.L.A., to approach the Minister for Tourism.

Negotiations took some time, but Mr Coates persisted and we are now happy to report that the Minister has approved that the cave be known, in future, as the Barralong Cave.

The meaning of Barralong is the same as Barellan, namely "meeting of the waters".

The annual general meeting of the society decided to publish Mr Newbould's Barralong diaries."
